All Who Sell Food Or Manufacture Chili Must Be Licensed.

Retail grocers and other food dealers who sell to hotels and restaurants are to be licensed, according to a recent regulation of the Federal food administration. Sales to hotels and restaurants are considered wholesale regardless of the amount, according to the regulation, and such dealers must secure license as food dealers.

Manufacturers of chili must also be licensed, according to the bulletin. This clause includes restaurants, lunch counters and other eating places where chili is made.

License may be secured from the food administration at Washington.—Star Telegram.



AID PROMISED FOR TEXAS DROUTH AREA

Austin Feb. 16.—Between Federal Reserve Bank Means Will Be Supplemented By Government Funds.

> Washington, Feb. 7.—Ample aid is promised by Secretary McAdoo in caring for financial needs of the drouth-stricken section of Texas, through the Federal Reserve Bank at Dallas, and if that is not sufficient deposits of Federal funds will be made in national banks from the Treasury.

Frank Kell of Wichita Falls and W. H. Fuqua of Amarillo Dallas will go to Washington came to Washington last week as representatives of Governor Hobby seeking a greater amount of Federal money for banks in the affected sections. It was explained that the already large deposits in West Texas banks would be quickly absorbed by the cattlemen and farmers when it became opportune to restock their ranches. The large deposits, it was explained, resulted by reason of farmers and stock raisers disposing of their herds on account of drouth conditions.


