For elements of endurance we believe Field Marshal Haig of the British Army has shown more ability than any man the war has produced. For three years General Haig has stood at the head of the Englis Army in France, Flanders and Belgium and the suffering that he has seen has sent many of his staff to the grave, the madhouse or the hospital, and it is said that he alone remains of those in immediate command when the campaign forced him to the fore.—San Saba News.

Whether Marshal Haig showed great strategical ability or not, certianly he showed splendid courage, fortitude and fidelity. The campaign he made in the summer of 1916, in which he sent his army time after Tire Hospital, San Saba, Texas. time through the knee-deep mud of Flanders and against the best artillery and infantry defenses the enemy had, testified to the heart-breaking assignment which he was endeavoring to cover, and which was so costly in terms of life and money and so fruitless of gains. That summer of anguish was of no avail, for the small advance made at such pains was more than wiped out a few months later by the Germans, who came forward in irresistible masses and overbore the dogged British. The high tide of Haig's career was not when the men under his command hurled their might against the Hindenburg line, in the last great drive, and burst it asunder, but rather in the dark hours of April, 1918, when the field gray flood was pouring back over the plains and hills which had cost the men of the British Isles such tremendous sacrifices to have and to hold. "We are fighting with our backs to the wall, and must retire no farther," Haig said to his sorely tried soldiers. It is to their glory and the glory of British arms forever that they did not retire farther. They held against the utmost pressure which could be brought to bear against them, and then, three months later, they began the advance which freed Ostend and Zeebrugge and Lille and spelled ruin for Imperial Germany.—State Press in Dallas News.





from year to year for the preceeding seven years. The plants in this field are of a pure strain of Mebane, very uniform and of a stocky well branched type. The bolls are well distributed and closely set to the limbs and are of good size and shape.

The field at this time is very free from Boll Weevil and other insect pests and seems to be free from plant

This cotton has been grown under irrigation using the least possible amount of water necessary for complete development and the seed will be as well adapted for planting under limited rainfall conditions as under heavier rainfall or irrigation. Respectfully,
