If any statement of the menace of polygamy were necessary to bring home to American readers the immediacy of the subject, some recent statements from the editorial columns of the Far Eastern Review would seem to be suitable. The Caucasian population of the world is doubling its number once in a hundred years; the dark-skinned races, which now outnumber the white population two to one, are doubling their numbers every twenty-five years.

At least such is the case in Korea, where the most recent figures are available. The editor of the Far Eastern Review figures out that at the present rate of increase the Caucasian element in the world's population will have shrunk in a handred years to scarcely 5 per cent. The oriental demands male children, as many of them as he can produce. The editorial in question says: "So long as the oriental man is able to arrogate to himself the right to possess plural wives, just so long will polygamy prevail. But there is a way out and one which is becoming broader and more easy to tread each year. And, starting out with this idea, he has designed a machine which will actually weave such a fabric. RECLAIM MANY SUNKER SHIPS

Hundreds of Vessels in British Waters Have Been Salvaged—Possibility of Raising the Lusitania.

Most welcome is the announcement from London that since January, 1915, 407 ships sunk by the Germans in British waters have been salvaged; 147 of them, by improved methods, in five months of the present year.

Britain's coast, like our own, is edged by a broad belt of shallow wa-

ter. For 200 miles of the channel's length no spot reaches a depth of 100 fathoms; much of it is quite shallow, which accounts for the chop that makes so many who cross it briefly unhappy. From our own Norfolk one gets well

out of sight of land before reaching out of sight of land before reaching water too deep for salvage operations. Depth increases more rapidly off the Irish coast, but even the Lusitania lies near the 50-fathom line, below the shatter of the storm, yet near enough the surface so that many practical wreckers have said that it would be possible, though exceedingly difficult, to bring her forth to a nautical resurto bring her forth to a nautical resur-

EXPLORER'S WORK IN AFRICA

Frenchman Sheds Light on Vast Region Hitherto Comparatively Un-Known-Needs Railway.

Feat of Underwater Pepairing on Wrecked Steamer Is Given High Praise by Shipping Men.

One of the most remarkable feats in the history of American labor, according to Capt. Louis Turner, representing marine underwriters, was the submarine repairing of a steamer salvaged off the California coast by a diver named Theodore Wicks. The success of this man in his perllous work made it possible to raise the vessel for further important service in the government's war program, where shipping is so urgently needed.

There were fully 100 patches of temporary nature to be put on the shattered sides of the vessel while it was bumping about on the rocks, making it by all odds the biggest job of the kind ever attempted on the Pacific coast. The biggest patch was ten feet wide.
