Will Move the Wheat

Washington, October 22. — Assistant Director General Brice Claggett was today named by Director General Hines to take immediate personal charge of the situation in West Texas and the Panhandle and work out a comprehensive plan of relieving freight congestion and moving the wheat crop. The action was taken following the visit of Congressmen Parrish, Jones, Lanham and Hudspeith of Texas to the railroad administration to demand that action be taken or they would carry the matter to the floor of congress and obtain relief through legislation. Congressmen Jones and Parrish did most of the talking. Jones showed telegrams from the Panhandle Plains Chamber of Commerce and the Panhandle Grain Dealers' Association to prove that only a small part of the grain crop had been moved. Hines promised a program that would move the crop in thirty days. British vessels are arriving at Galveston now to take on cargo and a fleet of Swiss owned vessels are to be diverted from New York to Galveston to relieve the situation. Congressman Parrish took exception to the recent report of W. T. Tyler, director of operations, that the congestion is a temporary one. Hines admitted that Tyler was wrong and conceded that unless a systematic plan of operation was worked out the situation in West Texas and the Panhandle would grow worse. He directed Assistant Director General Claggett to go to work on the plan at once. — Amarillo News, October 22.

A Well at Spearman

F. W. Wilsey, of the Spearman Land Interests, came from Canadian Thursday to complete arrangements with the well-at-Spearman committee of the Hansford County Chamber of Commerce, for the drilling of a public well at Spearman. The contract for the drilling of the well has been let to E. R. Wilbanks & Sons, who are moving their rig to Spearman and will "spud in" Monday or Tuesday of next week. The Spearman Land Interests will finance this proposition, which will mean the expenditure of something like \$3,000, and make the town of Spearman a present of the well and equipment. The well is to be drilled to a sufficient depth to insure an abundance of water and the equipment is to be first-class in every particular. A large storage tank will be installed, the water will be pumped through 3-inch piping by a seven h. p. gasoline engine and everything pertaining to Spearman's water supply will be the very best that can be procured. The well will be located on lots 8 and 9 in block 8. No charge will be made for the water which comes from this well. Mr. Wilsey, in making this splendid gift to the town, was particular to so arrange the contract that no individual or organization can profit by the sale of water from this well. Now that the well is assured, the Chamber of Commerce will doubtless see that the equipment is properly cared for and the storage tank kept full of water. In taking this step in the beginning toward laying the foundation and making of a worth-while town of Spearman, the Spearman Land Interests have certainly did the fair thing.

Road Machinery Here

The road-building machinery recently purchased by the commissioners of Hansford county to be used in the improvement of our public roads, arrived the first of the week and is now being put through the initial tests and experiments by experts sent out by the company which sold the equipment. They are working on the road leading east from Hansford, near the J. D. Cotter farm. The equipment consists of one Twin City 40-60 engine, one Russell elevator grader and one Mogul grader. This machinery will be given a thorough practical test, and if found to be satisfactory, will be accepted by the commissioners. Leo Dacus has been employed as engineer and J. H. Buchanan as elevator man. The experts will remain here several days, getting things in perfect working order, demonstrating and explaining the mechanism of the different machines. Judge Townsend informs us that they are doing splendid work with the new equipment, and he, as well as all other good roads enthusiasts, is highly elated over the progress being made and the bright prospects for better roads for Hansford county. John Graham and Cap Richardson are progressing nicely with the work of cutting down the hill and making a good roadway out of the Palo Duro valley on the road leading east out of Hansford. Let the good work go on and on until every public road in Hansford county is a good road. Poor roads are an expensive nuisance and an abomination in the sight of the Lord. All honor to our capable, progressive board of county commissioners, who have started this great movement to pull Hansford county out of the mud. They are deserving of much credit.

Jamison, secretary of the Panhandle-Plains chamber of Commerce, he must have started something with the railway officials:

Washington, Nov. 25 — Director General advises me half million bushels wheat loaded into ships at Galveston within last four days. Vessels enough on hand to load one million more. Also, that there are one hundred and thirty-three grain box cars enroute west of Newton and Wellington for the Panhandle division, with one hundred and fifty more enroute to same point east of Newton and Wellington. In addition to this, special trains of empties are to be run from Galveston to Panhandle through Sweetwater, Texas."

Mr. Jamison says: "The above telegram has just been received from our Congressman, Marvin Jones, showing the exact condition with relation to the moving of our crops. Please give this matter as wide publicity as possible. Mr. Jones is giving us his undivided attention in this hour of our great need and we are duly appreciative. RED CROSS DRIVE TO OPEN NOV. 2

OFFICIALS LOOK FORWARD TO PLACING DIVISION FIRST "OVER THE TOP."

WOMEN WORKERS ENROLL

Campaign Managers Say That Present Drive Is One for Membership, Not Funds.

When the Third Red Cross Roll Call of members is completed on Armistice Day, November 11, it is expected that 2,000,000 persons in Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma—the states comprising the Southwestern Division of the Red Cross—will have answered "here" and have been enrolled as annual members of the organization.

Inasmuch as this is a decrease of 385,619 members under the record of last year, when 2,385,619 members were obtained during the Christmas Roll Call from a population of approximately 13,928,000, Red Cross officials look forward to putting the Division first "over the top" with comparatively little difficulty. The nation-wide campaign this year is expected to yield more than 20,000,000 members. As in all previous campaigns, the fee for yearly membership is \$1.

Red Cross Sunday,
The campaign will open formally Sunday, November 2, which has been designated "Red Cross Sunday." On that day the story of the Red Cross will be told from pulpits all over the nation. Special programs will mark morning and evening services.

Vigorous preparations are being made, as evidenced by the rapid enrollment of thousands of women workers who will serve as volunteer canvassers during the campaign. More than 1,000,000 such workers are to be obtained throughout the country, whose aid will determine to an appreciable extent the successful termination of the coming campaign.

Reports reaching the Division office in St. Louis tell also of the co-operation being extended by hundreds of soldiers, sailors and marines, who are able, many of them, to tell "first person" stories of what the Red Cross did for them while the fighting was going on. These chaps are being enrolled as speakers, writers and active workers. In addition, "four-minute" men, lawyers, newspaper men and others qualified are scheduled to address audiences during the campaign on the subject of the Red Cross appeal, Advertising Campaign.

Enthusiasm in the campaign is being stimulated by the appearance of thousands of posters, window displays, Red Cross flags and other adjuncts of the country-wide advertising campaign now being carried on. Newspapers are carrying page, half-page and smaller advertisements bearing the Red Cross message, while periodicals, magazines and billboards, as well as street cars, trains, mercantile establishments and department stores are doing their quota of Red Cross advertising. 

AROUND THE WORLD WITH THE AMERICAN RED CROSS. In Serbia.



As far back as the first winter of the war, the Red Cross sent to Serbia a sanitary commission that effectively checked the scourge of typhus, but after the United States entered the conflict, the Red Cross was able, in August, 1917, to send a full commission that carried on extensive relief operations among the suffering refugees of the tortured nation. Hospitals were established, the refugees fed, clothed and given medical attention, the army supplied with much needed dental treatment, farm machinery, and seeds provided to help the Serbs redeem their land to productivity, and, not least, measures undertaken for the succor of the children. The terrible condition into which these helpless victims of the war had fallen is well portrayed by this photograph of a little Serbian girl wearing the rags and expression of hopeless dismay that were all she possessed when the Red Cross came.

SOLDIERS TO DIRECT DRIVE

SAILORS, TOO, IN SOME CASES WILL RUN CAMPAIGN.

Willingness of Returned Fighters to Direct Red Cross Roll Call Encouraging.

Returned soldiers and sailors in a large number of Red Cross Chapters of the Southwestern Division of the Red Cross—Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma—have accepted the directorship of the Third Red Cross Roll Call, Nov. 2 to 11, according to a recent announcement.
