ORGANIZE COMMERCIAL CLUB

Enthusiastic Meeting Held at the Court House Last Saturday

A meeting was held in the court house at Hansford last Saturday for the purpose of organizing a Hansford County Chamber of Commerce, or Commercial Club. A fairly good attendance of representative citizens of the community responded to the call for the meeting. Frank R. Jamison and Hamlin Palmer, secretary and traffic manager respectively, of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce, were here from Amarillo and each made an interesting talk on the importance of organization and cooperation and what can be and has been accomplished by similar organizations, especially the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce. After the addresses a temporary organization was effected by electing H. J. Thayer president and Fred W. Brandt secretary. A committee on permanent organization and by-laws, composed of A. F. Barkley, R. L. McClellan and W. W. Grooms was appointed by the president. A committee composed of Lyman J. Hillhouse, Fred W. Brandt and R. L. McClellan was appointed to make arrangements for the Hansford county people to attend the Perryton celebration in a body and to provide banners and other advertising matter. It was agreed that the organization should have a salaried secretary and the election of this important officer was postponed until the next meeting, which will be held on Saturday afternoon, August 30. Mr. Thayer is putting some pep into the work and with the assistance of a secretary, there is no doubt about the organization being ably managed.

There is much work ahead of the Hansford County C. of C., and the business men, stockmen and farmers seem to be willing to put their shoulders to the wheel and push it through. Among important matters and doubtless those which will receive first consideration, might be mentioned:

Roads. Hansford county must have better roads. The county commissioners are doing all in their power to start a movement for better roads in this county, but they are handicapped on every hand and need the assistance of the citizens of the county in this very important matter. This assistance can be given in no better way than through the Commercial Club.

Mail routes. There is only one postoffice and only two mail routes in Hansford county. Comment on the lack of service along this line is unnecessary.

Rural telephones. A committee on rural telephones can, within a very short time and with very little labor and expense, establish telephone communication with every community in the county.

Exhibits. Hansford county should have an exhibit at every fair within 500 miles this fall. We have prize winning products and the advertising is worth much to the county.

Boosting. The county needs a systematic method of advertising. Mr. Jamison suggested a plan which the commissioners will no doubt give due and proper consideration, but a local committee is needed to add the local color and work for the benefit of Hansford county alone.

Many important matters there are to be attended to, and without organization and cooperation the work will not be done.

AN EXHIBIT AT DALLAS FAIR

Hansford County Will Exhibit Her Products at State Fair

Hansford county will have an exhibit at the Dallas Fair, to be held in October. The Commercial Club has taken the matter up and appointed a committee to see about assembling and arranging the exhibit, and it will be taken to Amarillo and there turned over to the Panhandle Plains Chamber of Commerce, which is making an effort to have an exhibit at the Fair from every county in the Panhandle, to be known as the Panhandle-Plains exhibit. But no county's exhibit will lose its identity. The name of the grower and the county where the product was grown will be shown with each exhibit. The committee is now busy securing the exhibits and every farmer in the county is asked to contribute something toward making it the best display of farm products at the Fair. We have the goods and should be able to pull down some prizes. All we need do is to select the exhibits carefully and arrange them properly, and we will win.

Do it today. Select a bundle each of wheat, oats and barley and bring or send them to Hansford at your earliest convenience. They will be cared for here and arranged in a manner that will make the best possible showing. The exhibit of bundle stuff should be made up at once, before the wheat is threshed. In the matter of the threshed grain there is no particular rush, but this, also, should be attended to as early as possible. Bring in a sample—not less than one-half bushel—of your best wheat, oats and barley. They retain their natural color and freshness better by being allowed to remain on the vine.

farmers find it necessary to haul some of their grain to the Rock Island in order to raise funds to pay harvesting and threshing expenses. But it is practically out of the question to haul any wheat and at the same time prepare the ground for fall planting. The Hansford Chamber of Commerce has therefore taken up the matter of getting additional freighters, and a general call has been sent out to men with teams to come and help. If additional help can be secured in this way it will certainly be a relief to the present situation and we hope to see much good result from the effort.

Boosting for a Good School

The Headlight is informed by E. J. Thayer, secretary of the local school board, that the contracts with the three teachers have been received and that they will be here ready to begin the 1919-20 term of school on September 8. Prof. A. O. Andrew, the principal is a graduate of Kansas University and is an experienced school man. He will move his family here within the next few days and take up the work of building up a good school for Hansford. Miss Lillian Williams of Dalhart will have charge of the intermediate grades and Miss Florence Cobble of Rusk, Texas, is the primary teacher. The board has endeavored to secure capable teachers and every one should work for the success of the school.

When the calf gets scours it is an indication that something is wrong with the feeding. It has either been overfed, been given milk that is sour or cold, been fed sweet milk one meal and sour the next, or the pails or troughs are dirty. Indigestion is the cause of scours, so in treating the trouble the first thing to do is to correct the conditions that brought on indigestion. Then give a dose of castor oil in milk and follow with the formalin treatment. This consists in giving one tablespoonful of formalin solution, made by adding one-half ounce of formalin to 15 1/2 ounces of water, in each pint of milk fed. Only half the usual amount of milk should be given at a feed for a few days, when the amount can be increased to normal again. There are other remedies but this has been highly recommended.

Off to Perryton

A large number of Hansford county people are going to Perryton today to take part in the big celebration which will mark the beginning of that town. The citizens of Ochiltree and vicinity have made great preparations for this event and expect to entertain an immense crowd. An excursion train will be ran from Shattuck, and special attractions for the day will be a ball game between Shattuck and Guymon, air plane, broncho busting, free barbecue, dancing, "movies," etc. The Hansford crowd intend to let their presence be known and to inform the visitors that a similar celebration will be held at Spearman in the near future. 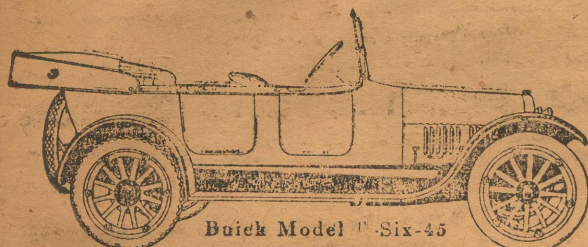

627,572 Cattle Dipped

Cattle dippings last month totalled 627,572 in the state, according to figures compiled by L. J. Allen, director of the drive against cattle ticks. Pittsburg county established a new record for the state by dipping 146,537 head of cattle.

In a district composed of twenty-three counties which was released from quarantine last year only two herds of cattle were found to be infested with the ticks during June. Allen said this is a remarkable record and proves that tick eradication is succeeding.

Opposition to dipping in the southeastern counties of the state is still prevalent, he said. It is the first year that cattle have been dipped there and after a campaign of education the farmers are expected to realize the value of tick eradication, Allen said.

The dipping record for counties in June follows: Coal, 96,464; LeFlore, 88,377; Carter, 70,927; Cherokee, 10,144; Haskell, 17,162; Johnson, 4,112; Latimer, 35,823; Love, 6,954; Muskogee, 8,623; Sequoyah, 19,274; Adair, 4,259; Garvin, 142; Hughes, 27,832; McClain, 80; McIntosh, 8,014; Marshall, 2,312; Murray, 5,520; Okmulgee, 1,032; Osage, 9,750; Pontotoc, 9,343; Pottawatomie, 298 and Seminole 3295.

After making a thorough investigation of the buildings and surroundings of the Negro Agricultural and Normal University at Langston, Governor Robertson declared that he will recommend to the next legislature that the institution be relocated at some more desirable and suitable place, if some method cannot be found whereby the location can be changed without legislative enactment.

While paying tribute to the management of the institution under the direction of President Marques, the governor severely criticised the buildings and surroundings, which he termed as wholly unfit for use.

The ground surrounding the institution, the governor declared, is poor and entirely unsuited for agricultural development. Every building, he said, is in bad condition and the dormitories are in bad condition and poorly furnished.

The last legislature appropriated but the governor said yesterday that \$85,000 for new buildings at Langston. He probably will oppose the spending of this money until the institution has been relocated.

May Move Negro School.

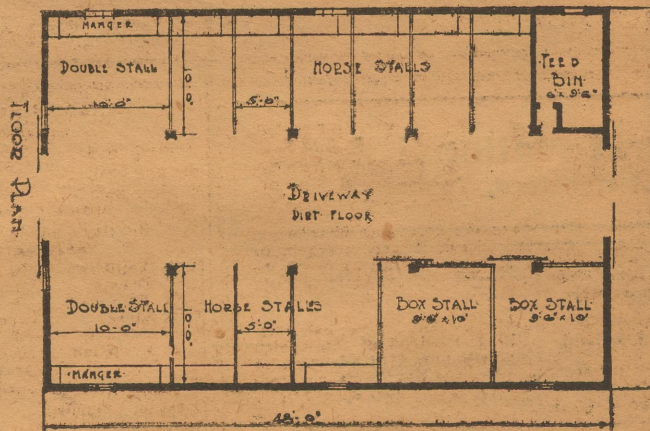
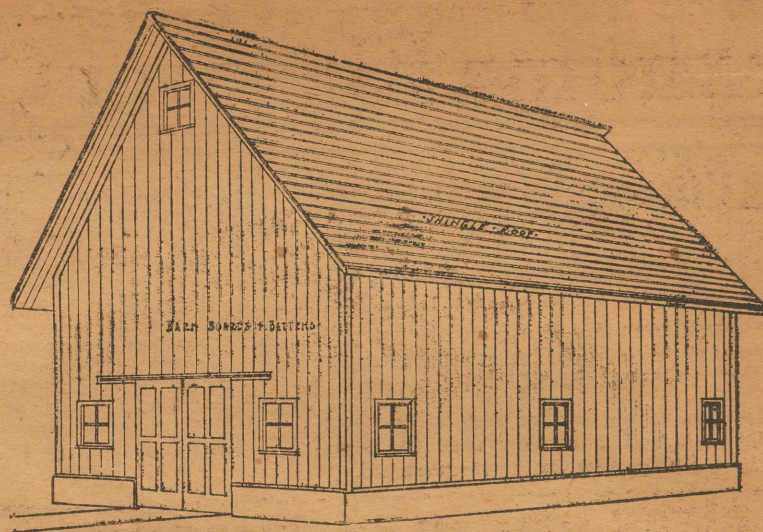
R. E. Echols, corporation commissioner, declares that he is preparing for early submission to the other members of the commission the draft of a proposed order designed to bring about a sweeping investigation of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in Oklahoma, with the view of rate adjustment, service improvement and the establishment of a satisfactory wage scale for operators.

A petition for a writ of mandamus to compel Frank E. Carter, state auditor, to issue a warrant for \$1,666.60 back salary claimed to be due him was filed by J. M. Aydelotte in district court. Aydelotte was chairman of the state board of public affairs. Payment of the claim was refused. Carter said, because the increase was granted after Aydelotte was appointed and that under the law an appointive officer is not entitled to receive an increase in pay provided by legislation following the date of his appointment.

In addition to its regular mining courses the State School of Mines, at Wilburton is now offering free eight-week courses in the use of automobiles and tractors, electricity and storage batteries, oxy-acetylene welding and cutting, oil geology and refining and a short course in mining. The School of Mines has been closed for the past two years because of a veto of its maintenance appropriation by Robert L. Williams, former governor, but will reopen for work September 20. Meade S. Johnson is president of the school.

The commissioners of the land office adopted a resolution authorizing the expenditure of \$5,000 by the attorney general on prosecuting the suit of the state of Oklahoma to sustain its claim of title to the Red river bottom. The money is to be used for the employment of the necessary legal and clerical assistance and for the payment of the costs of such additional surveys as will have to be made. Attorney-General Freeling said that he plans to begin the suit at the earliest possible time on account of the extensive oil development there.

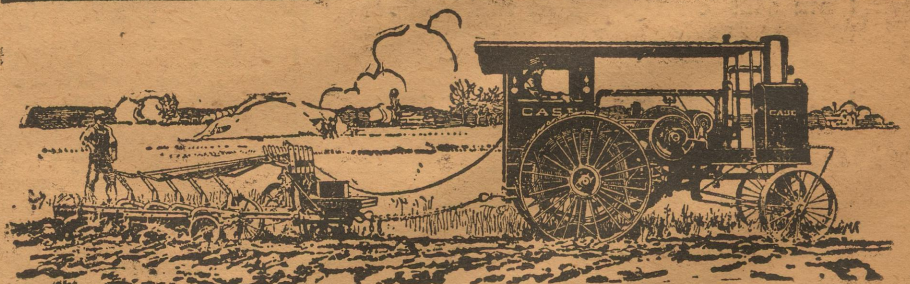

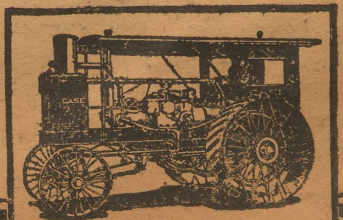

NEW W. S. S. CERTIFICATE

Treasury Department Authorizes Denominations of \$100 to \$1,000 for Investors.

The Kansas City Federal Reserve Bank has ordered from the Treasury Department a supply of the new Treasury Savings Certificates, series of 1919, which on July 2d were authorized by the Department in denominations of \$100.00 and \$1,000.00. They are in registered form and are in addition to the 1919 War Savings Certificates previously issued. War Savings Stamps of the denomination of \$5.00 are convertible into these new securities which bear the same rate of interest as the Savings Stamps, 4 per cent, compounded quarterly. The \$100.00 certificates are convertible into the \$1,000.00 certificates and the limit of investment of \$1,000.00 for each individual, which is the feature of the Savings Stamp issue, is retained in the new certificates.

Treasury Savings Certificates in the denomination of \$100.00 (maturity value) may be purchased at the post-offices of the first and second class and such other postoffices as the Post-office Department may designate for that purpose. Both the \$100.00 and \$1,000.00 denominations may be purchased at incorporated banks and trust companies which are agents for the sale of War Savings Certificates.

The new certificates will be issued only in registered form and shall bear the name of the owner inscribed by the agent at the time of purchase and will not be valid unless the owner's names is thus inscribed. The certificates will not be transferable and will be payable only to the owner named thereon except in case of death or disability of the owner.

The new issue is exempt both as to principal and interest from federal, state or local taxation, except estate or inheritance taxes, surtaxes and excess profits and war profits taxes.

Treasury Savings Certificates will be redeemed at face value on January 1, 1924, and will be issued for the remainder of 1919 at the following prices:

REGISTER W. S. S. CERTIFICATES

Lost or Stolen Certificates Will Not Be Replaced Unless They Are Registered.

A War Savings Certificate which has been lost or destroyed will not be paid nor will a duplicate thereof be issued, unless the certificate has been registered in accordance with the regulations and instructions issued by the Postmaster General, announces the Treasury Department at Washington.

In the event of the loss or destruction of a registered certificate, the registrant may apply to the postoffice where the certificate was registered either for a duplicate certificate or for the payment thereof. After the issuance of the duplicate certificate, the original becomes invalid. No duplicate certificate will be issued after maturity of the original.

War Savings Certificates may be registered without cost at any post-office. Unless registered, the Government will not be liable if payment of any certificate is made to a person who is not the rightful owner.

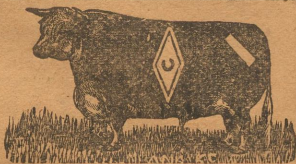

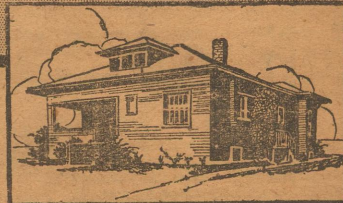

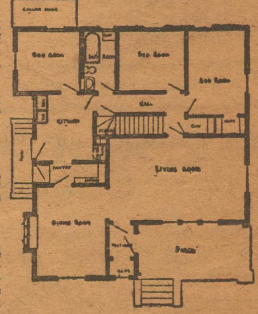
