
25 Widows File Pension Applications.



BRITISH TRANSPORT TORPEDOED AND ON THE ROCKS





Veneux Nadon, par Moret-sur-Loing, Seine-et-Marne, February 10th, 1917.

My dear Lequeux:

I have just finished reading the proofs of your articles describing my life as an official at the imperial court at Potsdam, and the two or three small errors you made I have duly corrected.

The gross scandals and wily intrigues which I have related to you were many of them known to yourself, for, as the intimate friend of Luisa, the ex-crown princess of Saxony, you were, before the war, closely associated with many of those at court whose names appear in these articles.

The revelations which I have made, and which you have recorded here, are but a tithe of the disclosures which I could make, and if the world desires more, I shall be pleased to furnish you with other and even more startling details, which you may also put into print.

My service as personal adjutant to the German crown prince is, happily, at an end, and now, with the treachery of Germany against civilization glaringly revealed. I feel, in my retirement, no compunction in exposing all I know concerning the secrets of the kaiser and his son.


USE POISONED BAIT FOR GRASSHOPPERS

refuse from sugar factories, or cattle molasses, known as "black strap," 2 quarts; water, 2 to 4 gallons. The bran and paris green or other arsenical are thoroughly mixed while dry, the fruits finely chopped and added, and lastly the molasses and water are poured over the bait and the whole thoroughly kneaded. A coarse-flaked bran is most desirable, although where this cannot be obtained easily ordinary middlings or alfalfa meal may be sub-stituted; a low-grade, strong-smelling sirup or molasses, however, is essen-tial to the entire success of the poison. Crushed ripe tomatoes, watermelons, or limes may be substituted for the

The poisoned-bran bait is distributed over the infested fields by sowing broadcast, either on foot or from a light wagon or buggy. In applying the bait in orchards, care must be taken bat in ordants, care must be taken to avoid distributing it close to the trees, because severe injury to fruit trees occasionally results from heavy applications of arsenical poisons.

The time of day chosen for distrib-uting the poisoned baits has an im-portant bearing upon the results se-cured. In California and other semi-arid regions the bait should be distribarid regions the bait should be distributed in late afternoon or early evening, just before the grasshoppers ascend the plants on which they usually pass the night. They are apparently hungry and thirsty at this time and greedily take the bait if it be available. In the moister portions of the country, such as New England and Florida, the bait is best applied in the early morning, before sunrise if possible. Farmers should not be discouraged if the grasshoppers do not drop dead immediately upon eating the poison, as it usually takes 24 hours or more for the full effect of the bait to become apparent. become apparent.

War Gardeners Must Battle Host of Insects That Never Seem to Know When Whipped.

POWDER GUNS FOR SPRAYING FIGHTING PESTS IN GARDEN

Powder guns have long been in use on some farms, but it seems to me that they might be used a good deal more than they are, says a writer in an exchange. In the first place let me say that a powder or dust sprayer is usually a bellows with handles attached so that a man can stand upright and have the business end of the bellows near the plant or vine he wants to treat with poison.

A good-sized one holds about a quart of mixture. The mixture is usually composed of powdered lime and a poison of whatever kind you want to use. If we want to use Paris green we usually take about one part of it to ten parts of lime and mix it well before putting in the blower. A funnel is best to load with as it is expensive stuff to spill around on the ground. Sometimes people use flour and paris green, or flour and hellebore, or flour and powdered arsenate of lead. It depends on which you like best and what the particular work is. However, lately the flour is so expensive that it doesn't pay to use it except in very small quantities.

All summer you war gardeners must fight the host of insect pests that never seem to know when they are whipped. Here are a few hints for the campaign:

Tomato worms.—Pick or spray with arsenate of lead.

Must Refer Claims to Local Boards Requests From Employers Can Accomplish Nothing-No General Industrial Exemptions.

No general class of workmen will be
exempted, Provost Marshal General
Crowder told the coal production committee, which sought information
whether miners would be left at their whether miners would be left at their work. Appeals to the provost marshal's office from employers on behalf of their workmen can accomplish nothing, it was explained as regulations promulgated by President Wilson govern all exemptions.

"The question of whether a man is more useful to his country in a peaceful pursuit than in military service is a matter to be taken up with the dis-

a matter to be taken up with the district boards," said an announcement, "and for that board to determine in the

"and for that board to determine in the light of the circumstances surrounding each individual case.

"Procedure in case of claim for discharge on the ground of industry or agriculture is explicity outlined in the regulations. Only the upper or district board has jurisdiction over an industrial or agricultural claim for discharge. Before a man has a standing before the district board he must first be certified to it by the local or lower board as physically qualified for

first be certified to it by the local or lower board as physically qualified for service and must have had any discharge claim made before the local board decided adversely to him.

"He has five days after he is certified to the upper board in which to file claim for discharge and five days more in which to file proof. All claims for exemption or discharge, except claims for discharge on industrial or agricultural grounds, are decided originally by the local or lower boards."

Most individual inquiries to the provost marshal's office came from men who are absent from their place of registration and have been summoned registration and have been summoned for examination. Such a man should apply in writing to the local board in the district where he is registered and request an order directing him to appear for physical examination and possibly exemption or discharge claim before the board of the district in which he is now living. The war tax bill as revised by the senate finance committee provides for only a little more than \$1,500,000,000 in additional revenue. The \$5,000,000,000 discrepancy probably will be made up partly by increasing the bill's levies and partly by a bond issue. Beside the estimate of more than \$5,000,000,000 additional expenses submitted yesterday by the war department, Mr. McAdoo presented estimates from other department of the part of the p ments totaling upwards of \$1,000,000,000. All of these estimates are for expenditure during the year endin next July, and are in addition to mor than \$3,000,000,000 already appropr ated since the war began. The larges than \$3,000,000,000 arready appropriated since the war began. The largest items in today's estimates are \$350,000,000 for the shipiping board and \$238,000,000 for the navy. For the legislation \$11,000,000 was requested.

Let us take the American army as it: respect and love:

Let us take the American army as it is provided for under the law of today, a time when we are in war with a great military power. Of course it must be remembered that in addition to the regular army we shall have the great new national army, the National Guardsmen, the navy and the Marine corps to help us win in the fight for the literty of the world.

The regular army of the United States upon the present war footing consists of 64 regiments of infantry, 25 regiments of cavalry; 26 regiments of finantry, the adquarters, with their detachments of troops; a general staff corps, an adjutant general's department, a quartermaster's corps, a medical department, a corps of engineers, an ordance department, a signal corps, the officers of the bureau of insular affairs.

How It Is Commanded.

How it is Commanded.

An army is a luge body of men gathered together for fighting purposes in different units of organization. An army when if pusses a certain strength usually is commanded by a general. Today there is no general in the United States army, but it is probable that within a few months congress will revive the rank and name some officer, who, taking the title or general, shall have supreme command of all the fighting forces in the field.

An army is composed of army corps. There may be two or three or more corps in an army. Sometines when there is a huge number of troops in the field one general is put in supreme command while his forces are divided into several armies, each one in command of a Heutenant general. It is likely that congress soon will make Maj. Gen. John J. Pershing a lieutenant general and put him in command of the First corps, consisting of several divisions of troops, to see service in Frence.

A division of troops is commanded A division of troops is commanded by a major general. It is composed of several brigades, each one of which is commanded by a brigadier general. It is possible for a brigade to consist of a combination of cavalry, infantry and artillery, but frequently each brigade is composed of regiments all of the same branch of the service. The typical infantry brigade, for instance, consists of a headquarters and three regiments of infantry, while a typical cavalry brigade consists of a headquarters and three regiments of cavalry.

Composition of the Regiment.

Each regiment is commanded by a colonel, who has under him a ceutenant colonel, whose duties are rather nondescript, although his chief duty is to take the place of the colonel in his absence or in case he is wounded or killed in buttle.

Each regiment is divided into battalions, and each battalion is commanded by a major. A battalion consists of two or more companies, troops or batterles, and each company is commanded by a captain. In each company there is a first lieutenant and a second lieutenant, and complete com-

corporals.

The company is divided into squads for purposes of instruction, discipline, centrol and order, each squad consisting of a corporal and seven privates. The corporal is the squad leader, and when absent is replaced by a designated private. It might be said that from the squad, consisting as it does only of a corporal and seven privates, the whole formation of an army is developed and in a sense regulated. The squad is a small base unit from which armies take their growth by a series of developing steps.

Men who enter the United States army as recruits have the same chance that men had years ago not only to become commissioned officers, but to reach the high place of command of all the armies of their country.

Does this seem to be an exaggerated statement? Only recently there died a lieutenant general of the United States army who commanded all the forces of Uncle Sam. 
