Extracts from a letter from an Assistant Surgeon in the U.S. Army, now in Florida, to a gentleman in Savannah, dated FORT DRANE, (Gen Clinch's) ?

March 13, 1836. 5 Dear Sir-Having once more reached a point hence a letter will p obably find its way to you, It ke the few moments le't belie an express leaves here, to remind you of the existence of a friend. I have just returned from the famous Withlacoochee, where we fought the Indians for eight successive days. On the ninth they sued for peace, but on condition of retaining the coun-This of course was inadmissible, and matters are statu quo ante bellum. They came forward under the white flag, and we could not hurt them, had we wished I need not give you any count of our battles in this recent campaign, nor those preceding it, as you find them amply detailed in the official despatches and public prints.

I have been in the woods for three months; have been in most all the battles, and am yet safe;

though I see no difference in the chances of an sistant surgeon and a line officer. I have been in the front ranks giving directions respecting the wounded, within twenty or thirty yards of the enemy. Scores of bullets every day whistled by my ear, and scores struck trees just behind me. I have now in my pocket on; which struck a tree by ve my head while I was stooping, a few moments before, and I would have gone. Another passed through a little bivouac, where I had been eclining, when I was aroused by the sudden crack of the Indian rifle and the tremendous yel 17 Asa Mann, 18 Gen. W. R. Smith, of the Indian war whoop. We were surrounded by Indians for six days, and fought them daily on the same ground. We were out of provisions, and had to eat parched corn, and then horse, and even dog flesh. I knew the quarter of a slaugh-tered dog to sell for \$5. I ate horse flesh mys lf, though I did not go the dog; yet I must confess that I and my messmate had doomed to slaughter fine fat dog, but suppl es reached us ere the foul deed was consummated. We have fallen back upon this post for supplies, and will wait ti!l Gen. Scott arrives I of course will take the field with

I have neither eaten nor slept (with the excepion of one or two nights) under the roof of a nouse, since some time last December. I have laid out in cold and raIn, and yet am in excellent nealth. I have gained twenty-one pounds of flesh in Florida.
