Schools Affected

The Zoning Task Force includes the principal and two teachers from each RISD school campus, campus improvement committee representatives, each school's PTA/PTO president and a PTA/PTO representative.

Under the proposed Middle School Plan 6A, 137 sixth graders would be affected by the zoning change, with nine from Rochell, 31 from Hays, 75 from Jones and 22 from Shannon Elementary Schools.

Students from Virginia Reinhardt and Howard Dobbs Elementary Schools would all be included in the new Utley zone under Plan

Schools and the surrounding neighborhoods that would be partially affected by the change are Celia Hayes Elementary, including Quail Run Valley 1&2, Caruth Lakes 6&8, Gilliam Addition and Woodcreek Addition; Sharon Shannon Elementary, including Williamsburg, Sterling Farms, Timber Creek Estates, Smith Acres north of North Fork Road plus additions including Sunny Circle, Sun Drive, Garza, Midlakes, Gentry Road and Amanda Lane; all of Dorris A. Jones Elementary, except the east side of Yvonne Drive and all streets east to Renee Drive and south of Evans Road, and Amanda Rochell Elementary, including Flagstone Estates and Highland Meadows #1 & #2.

When Utley opens its doors in the fall of 2009, it will only welcome seventh graders. Next year's eighth graders will continue to attend either Maureen Cain or J.W. Williams Middle School to avoid an additional school change before the next move up to high school. The 2010-2011 school year will be the first year Utley will have both seventh and eighth graders.

Attendance Projections

Burton explained how the Task Force used demographic estimates to anticipate how enrollment at the three middle schools could be distributed as the population of Rockwall County grows in the coming years under each of the three final plans using low- mid- and high-range projections. He said Rockwall ISD utilizes a mid-range projection when planning schools.

Beginning in the school year 2010-2011, the first year all three middle schools will have both seventh and eighth graders, the heavier student load is projected to fall on Utley and Cain, with fewer students at Williams. Burton said some have expressed concern about the higher number of students at Cain under Plan 6A, but he said, with the mid-range projection plan in place, future growth on the north side of Rockwall County will send those students to Williams, thus leveling out the number of middle school students across the

Although the board stated that many parents had contacted them with concerns about sending their students to Utley when other students close to them would attend Cain or Williams, Burton said, "I feel that children are resilient. We are aware of the social and emotional challenges of that age. I feel that the staff at Utley will provide a quality education."

He also acknowledged that, although students already change schools when they graduate to middle school, "it will be a different change next year because we are splitting school zones."

Council member Doug Hamilton said he found some parents who contacted him may have misunderstood which schools would be in the Utley zone. He said he would be willing to wait to make his final decision on a zoning plan in order to clear up the misunder-

Not needing a formal board motion or vote to table the issue, the trustees agreed to hold any decisions on the zoning plan until the next board meeting on Monday, Feb. 16.



According to verse 8, he sent the Magi to shem and told them to "go and search diligently for the young and when ye have found him, bring me word again, that I ome and worship him also." It is interesting to note that the "child" comes from the earlier known Greek word "paidon." vord is for a young child, and is distinguished from the word

"babe" in Luke 2:12 and 16 where it is "brephos," a new born or unborn child. As we continue, it will be seen why this distinction

We come to verse 9, "When they had heard the king, they departed; and, lo, the star, which they saw in the east, went before them, till it came and stood over where the young child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced with exceeding great joy." Wierwille and Martin both noted that "his star" reappeared after they left for Bethlehem. They explained that when Jupiter reached its ecliptic highest point in the night sky, a straight line could have been drawn down perpendicular to the horizon and that provided the direction to the special child.

It is also interesting to note there is no mention that the Magi moved on the brightness of the star, but instead on what it symbolized. They must have been very happy to see this for they "rejoiced with exceeding great joy." Their exceeding great joy would not have been due to its brightness. The scripture simply refers to "his star", which strongly suggests its symbolism was related to the kingly status of the one who was born. They rejoiced because a special king was born as symbolized by "his star".

According to verse 11, they finally arrived to see the child, "And when they were come into the house, they saw the young child with Mary his mother, and fell down, and worshipped him: and when they had opened their treasures, they presented unto him gifts; gold, and frankincense, and myrrh." Once again it was confirmed to Mary that Jesus' life was from God.

Please note that the Magi arrived at a house, and not the manger of an Inn. And the child was not newborn but as we will see next week, he was around two years old. What a truly wonderful and meaningful moment this must have been for Mary. Can't you just see it? Maybe the child was holding on to her leg, or holding her hand as the Magi began to respectfully bow down and pay homage to him as the newborn King of Israel, the true Messiah from God in heaven.

Jesus was too young to understand the significance of the mo-

Congress spends \$4 trillion we must privately spend \$4 trillion less whether it is accomplished through taxation, inflation or borrowing.

The stimulus package being discussed is politically smart but economically stupid. It's that bedeviling, omnipresent Santa Claus and Tooth Fairy problem again. Let's say that Congress taxes you \$500 to put toward creating construction jobs building our infrastructure. The beneficiaries will be quite visible, namely men employed building a road. The victims of Congress are invisible and are only revealed by asking what you would have done with the \$500 if it were not taxed away from you. Whatever you would have spent it on would have contributed to someone's employment. That person is invisible. Politicians love it when the victims of their policies are invisible and the beneficiaries visible. Why? Because the beneficiaries know for whom to vote and the victims do not know who is to blame for their plight.

In stimulus package language, if Congress taxes to hand out money, one person is stimulated at the expense of another, who pays the tax, who is unstimulated. A visual representation of the stimulus package is: Imagine you see a person at work taking buckets of water from the deep end of a swimming pool and dumping them into the shallow end in an attempt to make it deeper. You would deem him stupid. That scenario is equivalent to what Congress and the new president proposes for the economy. A far more important measure that Congress can take toward a healthy economy is to ensure that the 2003 tax cuts don't expire in 2010 as scheduled. If not, there are 15 separate taxes scheduled to rise in 2010, costing Americans \$200 billion a year in increased taxes. In the face of a recession, we don't need that.

There is hope for economic wisdom

Should people who disagree with Barack Obama hope he succeeds in his presidency? Conservatives are caught in this question because their leading radio star, Rush Limbaugh, said he hopes Obama fails. Radio stars need regular public controversy to keep their listeners tuned in, so there's no point in analyzing what the Republican partisan might have meant. But the question may lead us to other

Everything hinges on the underlying question: succeed or fail at what? If we assume Obama wants to use the power of government — the power of the gun, really - to redesign society, as some of his supporters would like, then advocates of individual liberty would hope he fails. The idea at the heart of the American Revolution was that society runs itself without a central plan. Government is already too involved in configuring the political economy, so a more comprehensive effort would only make things worse.

But if we define Obama's goal sufficiently abstractly, our answer would be different. Assuming that Obama wants a free, prosperous, and peaceful America, any proponent of a free society would certainly hope for success. The crucial questions are about means.

The best chance for freedom, prosperity, and peace is through a radical retrenchment of government at all levels and a full flowering of the free market without political privileges and burdens.

We know that Obama is not planning to free the economy. On the contrary, he is embarking on a major Keynesian program of government spending financed by borrowing and central-bank expansion of money and credit. Based on sound economic theory and experience, we know this approach cannot create sustainable economic growth. We also know that the program will violate individual liberty because inflation is an implicit tax that transfers wealth from those who have earned it to those who have not.

Given this knowledge, it is moot whether or not we should hope it succeeds. In the nature of things, success isn't possible.

On the other hand, we can hope Obama succeeds in this sense: that he ignores his Keynesian advisers and discovers sound economics.

I'm not holding my breath, of course. The political breed finds it irresistible to not do something during a crisis. Unfortunately, undoing something doesn't count. So I suspect that even a president who realized that Keynesian prescriptions are self-defeating would find it hard not to increase deficit spending, monetary expansion, and regulation. The incentives, perverse as they are, would be too strong

In our modern society we pride ourselves on being free of superstition, yet many people fall for the hoary and groundless belief that prosperity can come from government's borrowing and creating money. The Treasury and Federal Reserve System last year embarked on such a policy to "inject liquidity" into the financial system rocked by the failure of the mortgaged-based securities market. But how much thought does it take to see that government-created money is not wealth.

Money is a medium of exchange. A unit of money is recognized as an economic claim on some quantity of goods or services. In the normal course of events, people produce useful things and trade them for money. Thus a unit of money signifies that the holder had previously produced something of value. Thus indirectly goods

Now see what happens when government creates money. There is an increase in claims to goods and services without any increase in the goods and services. No general improvement can arise from this situation — quite the opposite. Prices


Worse, since the created money reaches some people before others, inflation is a subtle way for the government to transfer resources, with many victims being low-income people. And by tampering with interest rates, it also creates the

The upshot is that inflation cannot make society better off

One hopes Obama succeeds in ushering in an era of freedom, peace, and prosperity. But hope is idle. He will have to discover sound economic theory and a reservoir of courage to make it happen.



Lady Jackets clinch 2nd district crown in 3 years

The inevitable happened.

Since Jan. 20, when the Rockwall girls' basketball team defeated Royse City for the second time, it seemed just a matter of when there would be too few games for the second-place Lady Bulldogs to make up the difference in the standings.

The Lady Jackets still had to go out on the court and play. They have 14 Tuesday. done that four times, including three in the past week.

And except for perhaps Tuesday's first quarter at Carrollton R.L. Turner, RHS has continued to play well. Thus, with two games remaining and a two-game lead on Royse City, Rockwall (12-0 in District 10-4A. 4A, 22-9 overall) can do no worse than tying RC. And having defeated the Lady Bulldogs twice, the Lady Jackets win the tiebreaker.

"We're excited," said head coach Jill McDill. "We wanted to go to the playoffs. We played well and got the job done."

Over the last three seasons, Rockwall has a 39-1 district record and two district titles. The undefeated 2006-07 state champions were the 10-5A champions, but gave up the crown last year to Garland Naaman Forest. Each team won head-to-head meetings at home and finished 13-1, but Aimee Coleman 3, Raven Turner 2, Vertashia Dean 2. Naaman Forest won a coin flip.

There will be no coin flipping this year in 10-4A, which the Lady Jackets have dominated.

Most recently, they won Thursday at Carrollton R.L. Turner 77-21, defeated visiting Richardson Pearce 74-48 Friday and took a 49-21 decision Tuesday at Carrollton Newman Smith. Rockwall, which has a 4A state poll.

After 2 tough losses Jackets still looking up in playoff race

Alan Simmons came away from what could have been a devastating loss at Richardson Pearce Friday with a bold prediction.

"The team will have to get ready for Newman Smith," the Rockwall boys' basketball head coach said. "They're probably not thinking much about us, but I expect to win. We're going to shock the state."

It would have been shocking if the Yellowjackets (11-13 overall) had beaten Carrollton Newman Smith, ranked second in the TABC 4A state poll, Tuesday. Instead, there was a scare followed by more heartache for RHS.

The Trojans (10-0 in District 10-4A, 26-2 overall) led by a single point, 48-47, entering the fourth quarter. Rockwall hung with Newman Smith until having to foul the Trojans in an effort to catch up. They got on the bus back to Carrollton with a 64-53 victory.

"They're very good and we've played them very well, but that doesn't equate to anything but a loss," Simmons said sadly, but with his chin still up.

Following the two losses, four games remain, with Rockwall fifth in the district at 4-6. The Jackets are one game behind Rockwall-Heath (5-5), and guess who will visit RHS for the final regular-season game.

Rockwall might have to win that game and then a tiebreaker to take 10-4A's final playoff berth away from the Hawks. That's because the Jackets lost - what else? - a three-point heartbreaker - at Rockwall-

Friday's game at Pearce (7-3, 11-15) must have seemed like déjà vu for the Jackets. The Mustangs had won 55-54 Jan. 3 at Rockwall on Chris Bowie's last-second shot.

This time, the Jackets fell behind 19-11 at halftime but came back to lead by two points with three minutes remaining, fell behind again and tied the score 36-36 on Adam Dingwell's three-point play with 36.94 seconds to go.



Royse City was the team coming into Tuesday's girls' basketball game with a playoff spot secured. Highland Park was the team "playing for their playoff lives," according to RC head coach Dallas Bookout.

The teams had battled each other into the closing seconds and beyond. into overtime, when they met at Highland Park.

But this was a far different night. The Lady Bulldogs appeared to have much greater motivation, and they came out of the evening with a 65-45 victory and second place locked up in District 10-4A.

It was a totally different game from their 76-73 victory Jan. 6. Highland Park ran to an early lead in that one. Tuesday, it was RC getting the jump, breaking out to a 5-0 lead and also scoring the first four points in both the second and third quarters. The lead grew to as many as 30 points (60-30) before the Lady Scots ran off 10 consecutive fourthquarter points.

"I thought we played well for four quarters, one of the first ones we've had in the district," Bookout said. "Everybody played and did a good job. It was the best game we've played outside of Rockwall."

With two games remaining, the Lady Bulldogs (10-2 in the district, 25-5 overall) are two games behind first-place Rockwall. But the Lady Jackets have wrapped up the district title based on their two wins over Royse City.

With their playoff positions locked in, 10-4A's top two teams now have turned part of their attention toward their Bi-District opponents Feb. 16 or 17. The Lady Bulldogs will play 9-4A's third-place team, which will probably be Frisco Centennial (9-3, 17-12) unless the Lady Titans could knock off district champion Frisco, ranked seventh in the TABC 4A poll.

Centennial defeated RC 63-55 on Nov. 14, but Royse City has improved greatly since then.

At times against Highland Park, even before the outcome was decided. the five Lady Bulldogs on the court included three sophomores -- Ariel Freese, Taylor Jordan and Jennifer Null - and freshman Taylor Young.

"When you see that, you know you're going to be OK next year even though you're losing seniors. You've got a foundation," Bookout said. The youngsters took center stage in the second quarter.

Royce City led 15-10 after the first quarter, but Young twice stole the ball and drove for baskets to increase the lead to 19-10. She scored six points in the quarter, and finished the game with 16. Freese grabbed five rebounds during the eight minutes, and put one back for a basket.

RC's seniors took over in the third quarter, when the Lady Bulldogs had a 24-10 advantage over fourth-place HP (6-6, 18-11) to take a 25-point lead, 54-29. Kellie Wyrick scored the quarter's first basket and five points during the period, but Raven Alexander put in 11 points, nine of those in 54 sizzling seconds.

First, Alexander took a pass from Wyrick for a 3-point shot and a 42-27 lead with 2 minutes, 55 seconds remaining in the quarter. Then she pulled down a defensive rebound, dribbled downcourt and launched another 3-pointer while the Lady Scots' Stephanie Dekkers was knocking Alexander on her back. The ball went in, and so did her foul shot for a four-point play.

The Lady Bulldogs regained possession. Despite a missed shot, Alexander took an offensive rebound and scored at 2:01 for a 48-27

Bookout said, "That's what we call a heat check. When she threw up that 3-pointer, got fouled and made it, that pretty much tells you she can make just about any shot."

Alexander finished with 20 points, and Wyrick added 14.

Last Thursday, in a game twice postponed because of an ice storm, Royse City rallied from a one-point deficit after three quarters to edge third-place Greenville 55-54. Wyrick scored 12 points, Null 11, Alexander 10 and Young 9.

Null also played a big role in Friday's 70-60 victory at Rockwall-Heath (3-9, 6-19). She scored 13 points, including four 3-pointers. RC broke away from a 31-30 halftime margin. Alexander scored a gamehigh 25, and Young also had 14.


