Annexation foes still at bargaining table

Friends and family of the late John Wallace renewed their opposition to an annexation plan at a Rockwall City Council meeting Jan. 22.

The hearing was less emotional than the first public hearing two weeks ago and the 10 residents who spoke to the council were generally more composed than before - but no less passionate.

"Sound planning is more than just looking at the boundary lines you want to establish. We have hearts and voices and feelings, and you're seeing those feelings expressed here," said resident Ernie Hughes. "Please consider what my neighbors and I are saying. Listen to us. We do matter."

At this point, it's too far down the road to even comment on," Cecil said. "We've got strict state guidelines we have to follow ...

The land in question is 234 acres off Farmto-Market Road 549, an area that includes the bulk of the undeveloped Wallace family farm

and more than a dozen adjacent homeowners. A previous annexation effort incorporated the majority of the surrounding land, forming a "donut hole" in city services around the area.

Council members said the annexation is designed to prevent future developments from harming the area and nearby homes, and it not designed to be an attack on current residents. Council members Glenn Farris and Matt Scott said the city has no interest in developing the property but is concerned that a lack of zoning could cause damaging development to occupy the area in the future. Annexation and proper supervision now would help maintain the residential community, they said, which could be jeopardized by improper development.

Officials move TAKS because of voting

Education Commissioner Robert Scott announced last week that the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills exams regularly scheduled for March 4 have been moved back a day to avoid conflict with the state's primary elections, according to a Texas Education Agency press release.

According to TEA, Scott said the change in the schedule was made to "preserve schools as polling places and maintain a calm, quiet, secure testing environment for our students." TAKS testing was moved after Scott consulted with various superintendents, testing coordi-

Horizon exit still a slippery ride in rain

Despite recent improvements, a trouble spot at Horizon Road and the south side of the Interstate 30 service road appears to still be problematic with eight drivers losing control on Jan. 22 alone.

Rockwall city officials renovated the I-30 service road to a one-way Jan. 9, following several wrecks in the area.

"It's been nerve-racking today," said Frank Fite II whose Nationwide Insurance office is still being repaired after a truck crashed into it in November. The Horizon exit ramp from I-30 ends at the entrance to Fite's insurance building. The driver of a Ford Ranger was exiting I-30 on Horizon when the driver drove a truck through the middle of the building in November.

Rockwall Mayor Bill Cecil was anxious to see if the improvements would eliminate the high number of crashes in that area. He was not immediately available for com-



It was almost like deja vu all over again in Green Bay

ee, has it really been 40 years? If you thought the Cowboy's loss to New York was tough to watch, just remember what it was like to sit in front of the TV and witness the Dallas loss to Green Bay in 1967.

Come to think of it, some of the frustration for Cowboy fans was very much the same, but watching in '67 was really more painful.

Dallas was going up against the Packers for the second consecutive season, trying to win the NFL championship game.

The previous season, the Packers defeated the Cowboys, 34-27, by preventing Dallas from scoring a touchdown on four consecutive plays from the Packers' 2-yard line on the game's final drive.

This year the Packers were at it again, playing for the NFC Championship against New York with Sunday's game temperature a balmy minus-1 degree at kickoff and a wind chill that hit minus-23. Burrrrrr ...

The 1967 game, played on Dec. 31 at Lambeau Field in Green Bay, Wisc., remains the coldest NFL game on record. The official gametime temperature was minus-13°F, with a wind chill around minus-48°F.

The bitter cold overwhelmed Lambeau's new turf heating system, leaving the playing surface hard as a rock and nearly as smooth as ice.

Some Cowboys on that 1967 team still claim Packer coach Vince Lombardi turned the heating system

Game officials were unable to use their whistles after the opening kickoff. As the referee blew his metal whistle to signal the start of play, it froze to his lips. For the rest of the game, the officials used voice commands and calls to end plays and officiate the game.

Several players, including Dallas defensive tackle Jethro Pugh and Green Bay quarterback Bart Starr, still claim to suffer occasional mild effects of the frostbite they developed

that day. Dallas quarterback Don Meredith came down with pneumonia after the game and was hospitalized on his return to Texas.

The Packers jumped to an early 14-0 lead with a pair of touchdown passes from Starr to wide receiver Boyd Dowler. But Green Bay committed two costly turnovers in the second quarter that led to 10 Dallas points. First, Starr lost a fumble while being sacked by Cowboys lineman Willie Townes; Dallas defensive end George Andrie recovered the ball and returned it 7 yards for a touchdown, cutting the lead in half. Then, with time almost out in the second quarter, Packers safety Willie Wood fumbled a Dallas punt after calling for a fair catch, and Cowboys rookie defensive back Phil Clark recovered the ball at the Green Bay 17-yard line. The Packers were able to keep Dallas out of the end zone, but kicker Danny Villanueva kicked a 21-yard field goal to cut the deficit to 14-10 by halftime.

Neither team was able to score any points in the third quarter, but then on the first play of the final period, the Cowboys took a 17-14 lead with running back Dan Reeves' 50-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Lance Rentzel on a halfback option play. Later in the quarter, the Packers drove into scoring range and had a chance to tie the game, but kicker Don Chandler missed a 40-yard field goal attempt.

Starting from his own 32-yard line with 4:54 left in the game, Starr led his team down the field with three key completions. Then Chuck Mercein ran 8 yards to a first down on the Cowboys' 3 on the next play. Twice Anderson attempted to run the ball into the end zone, but both times he was tackled at the 1-yard line, the second time after his footing failed on the icy field.

On third-and-goal, Starr called the Packers' final timeout with only 16 seconds left in the game to confer with coach Lombardi and decide on the next play. Starr asked for a sneak, and

Lombardi's response was, "Well, run it and let's get the hell out of here."Dallas players expected the play would be a pass because a completion would win the game, while an incompletion would stop the clock, allowing the Packers one more play to attempt a touchdown or kick a field goal to send the game into overtime.

After taking the snap, Starr executed a quarterback sneak behind center Ken Bowman and guard Jerry Kramer's block through defensive tackle Jethro Pugh, scoring a touchdown that gave the Packers the win and their unprecedented third consecutive NFL championship.

This Sunday there were a lot of Packer fans (and even some non-Packer fans) pulling for Brett Favre to show the 'ol Bart Starr magic and win one in the freezing cold.

Most of those pulling for Favre were sitting in the stands in Green Bay. But the rest of us were watching from our warm living rooms.

Frankly, I don't know anybody I want to see play football bad enough to sit outside when it is that cold.

Time running out to pay county taxes

County taxpayers have just a week remaining to dig into their pocketbooks or risk being turned over to attorneys for collection earlier than in previous years.

Tax bills were sent out by the county in October with a big change - those who don't pay up by the Feb. 1 deadline will be turned over to attorneys April 1 instead of July 1, which had penalty.

But the discussion Jan. 22 also focused on a proposed "non-development" agreement city officials hope could provide a compromise. The agreement promises to spare the Wallace farm from annexation and city taxes as long as it remains undeveloped, but has a few conditions the agreement must be approved by the Wallace family before the annexation timeline reaches its conclusion Feb. 11, and it carefully outlines the developments that could take place if the area was ever incorporated. It applies only to the family farm, not the nearby households, and would require periodic (and potentially annual) renewal by the council.

Michael Henley Wallace said the family appreciated the city's gesture but needed more time to review the proposal before any agreements could be made.

Right now, it's easy to understand that the Rockwall girls could be looking ahead to Tuesday's basketball showdown for District 10-5A supremacy.

Friday night, however, their goals were more short-term: How to get out of the 10-point hole they'd dug themselves in the first quarter against

The Lady Jackets went to work, regained the lead by halftime and won a record-setting game going away, 69-54. They dismantled South Garland on Jan. 22, 75-35.




