Rockwall council orders study of city's athletic facilities

Rockwall eyes need for athletic facilities upgrades

The Rockwall City Council has requested staff to conduct a feasibility study of the city's athletic and ball park facilities and make recommendations for improvements.

Place 3 council member Bennie Daniels brought the item to the agenda.

In the May 12 Joint Election, voters in Rockwall said no to a \$25 million bond proposition that would have been used to build a state-of-the-art athletics complex, including lighted baseball and softball fields, tennis courts, playgrounds, restroom facilities and a snack bar.

While he understands voters said no to the bond, Daniels said there is still room for improvement to the city's existing athletic facilities.

"In no way in what I'm proposing am I trying to circumvent the majority vote. I want that to be clearly understood. At the same time there's a need for improvement in the (existing) athletic facilities and additional athletic facilities," he said.

Daniels jokingly told the council they could tell by his age that he has no young children who would use an upgraded athletic field, but he is basing his opinion of current needs on his experience as a T-ball coach in the 1970s, when most teams were scrambling to use the one field that used to be located where the Boys and Girls Club now sits near Dobbs Elementary School.

"It was chaotic," Daniels said, "and we are about still in the same place today."

City staff members will evaluate all of the existing athletic facilities in Rockwall, not just baseball fields, and offer their findings, suggestions and any estimated costs to the city council in 60 days.

Place 2 council member Mark Russo suggested staff look into any grant or government programs that might help pay for improvements. While many of those programs are for new construction, he asked that staff investigate whether facility improvements would fall under any of the assistance guidelines.

The feasibility study will not cost the city anything as long as city staff is conducting the work, but council was cautioned that if outside help is needed, they might be approached to authorize the cost of an outside agency.

Rockwall street repairs under way

The City of Rockwall has contracted with APAC-Texas to make street repairs to south Alamo Road from west Bourn Street to near Summit Ridge Drive.

The repairs will be made in two phases, according to a news release from the city. The first phase will include the pulverization of the existing asphalt and the re-stabilization of the street base. The second phase will include the installation of new asphalt on the roadway.

The improvements began this week and will continue through Thursday.

The street will remain open to traffic during the process; however, there may be some temporary delays. It may be necessary to temporarily limit through traffic on south Alamo Road and allow access only to residents.

In order to minimize inconvenience, work each day will not begin until after 8:30 a.m.

Officials with Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital Rockwall broke ground June 14 for a 16,600-square-foot facility that will house a family practice physician, emergency room and laboratory resources in north Rockwall. The facility is expected to open in stages beginning in October. The first phase will consist of a family practice physician, which is much needed in the rapidly growing area, according to hospital officials. Dr. Dhara Patel, a Texas Health Physician Group doctor, is scheduled to begin seeking patients in the fall. The 24-hour service hospital ER will be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, providing all of the capabilities of the south Rockwall campus by the spring of 2013. Patients hospitalized will be transferred via ambulance or air transport to Texas Health Rockwall. The facility is being constructed to serve the large number of patients living in the north Rockwall area and surrounding northern communities.

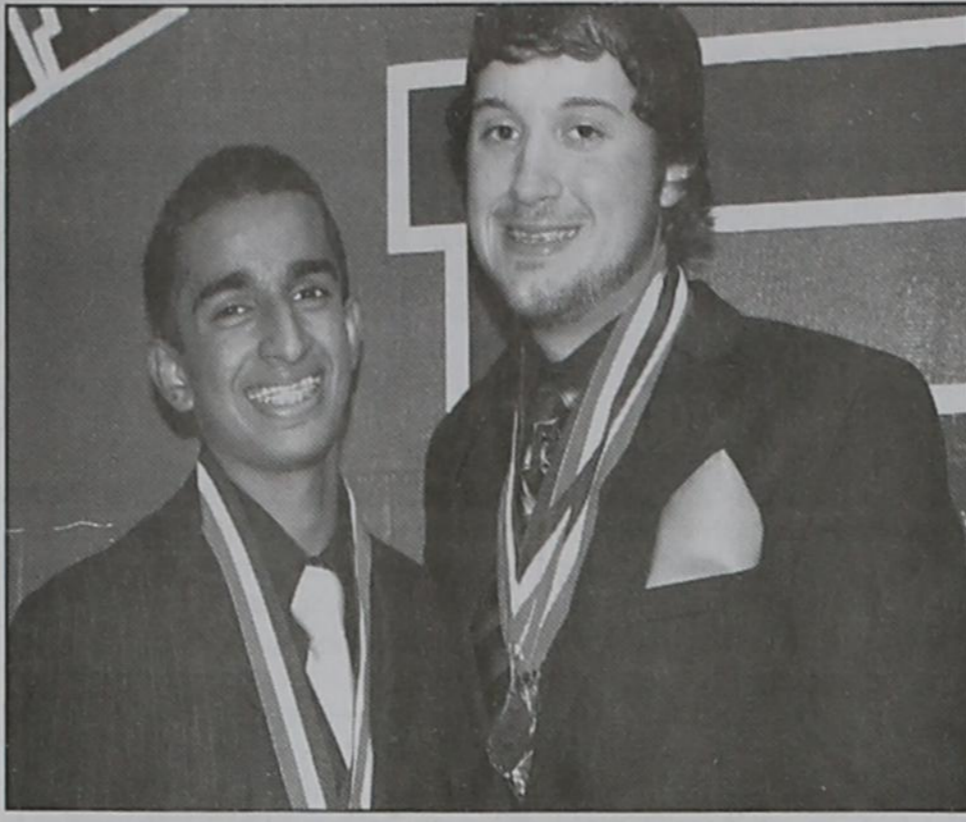
Mastronardi to attend YMCA conference

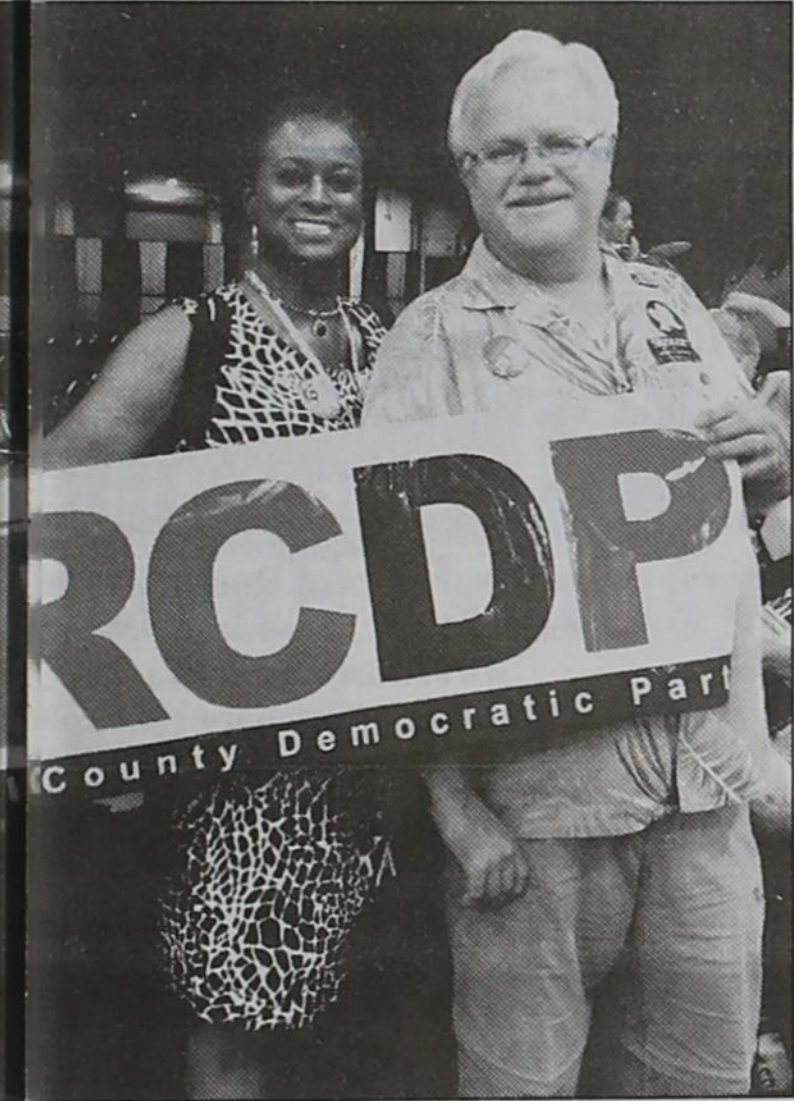

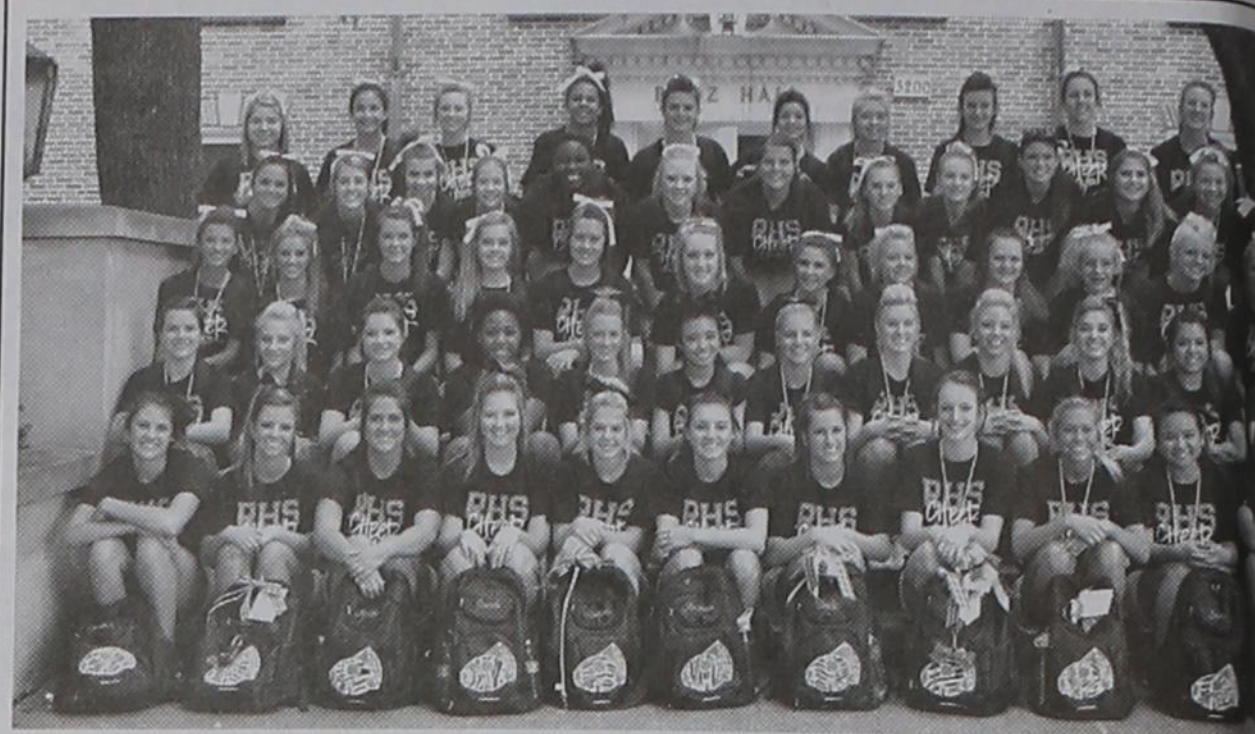

Royse City DI team lauded for global win

The SuperStar Bulldogs Destination Imagination team from Cherry Intermediate School was presented with the 2011 DI Global Finals trophy by the Royse City ISD Board of Trustees on Monday after their second place win at the DI Global Finals on May 26 in Knoxville, Tenn.

After competing at Globals against 1,276 teams from 45 states, seven Canadian provinces and 13 countries, the Royse City team was bested only by a team from Beijing, China, who the SuperStars have pledged to beat next year.

Starting in September, teams chose from a list of six challenges to complete, working towards completion throughout the school year hoping to advance to Globals. The Royse City team chose the 'Assembly Required' challenge, which required them to transport 340 separate parts on a handmade conveyor belt, then assemble products with those parts and complete a task related to their products. A panel of judges then interviewed team members to see how their product worked, if they did the work themselves, and measured their team's imagination.

Each team was only allowed a budget of \$175 to complete their task, but could use items they gathered from home and school.

The 'Assembly Required' category had 48 teams in the Elementary Level, which included the Royse City team and teams from around the US, England, Korea, China, Canada and Turkey.

This is the fifth year the team has competed in Destination Imagination, which includes three trips to the contest and to Globals last year.

The Pain of a Child is Felt By Us All

 As we entered the room read Welcome to the Texas Center for Blood Born Diseases", said James Johnson, father of 18 month-old Kaitlyn Johnson. "It was reality punching me in the stomach!" he said with tears.

On April 13, 2010. She was James and Mandy's first child to their life. She had been a very healthy baby. However we started noticing bruises on Kaitlyn, but didn't pay attention as she was very rambunctious and fell a lot playing and like a normal child does."

On Friday I picked her up from the dinner table, and immediately noticed both her sides where I had put my hands to pick her up. On Monday, she developed a rash like the measles and a fever. It was just a childhood thing. We bathed her and gave her Tylenol every other throughout the night. By the next morning her fever was gone. Wednesday decided to take her on to the pediatrician just to check it out", James shared.

While we were waiting, we heard a commotion going on in the hallway, the nurses, staff, and the doctor. The doctor came into the room of Kaitlyn and she started crying. We knew then something was wrong. It was November 11, 2011."

For today to go to Children's Medical Center of Dallas Emergency Department. As we left the doctor's office all the nurses and doctors just checked out. They knew Kaitlyn's diagnosis and what we were facing. I have been to Children's many times, but I was so upset I can't remember how to get there. It was a terrible time for Mandy and me. We will never know how hard it was."

When we arrived at the hospital waiting room, a really big area, the nurse who took us to the room said "Are you Mr. and Mrs. Johnson?" Come with us to see Kaitlyn's blood again. By then, most of our family began to arrive.

After 24 hours, we had gone from the doctor's office, to Children's Medical Center (Dallas, through surgery to have Kaitlyn's port placed, to her first treatment. It was a horrible thing to go through", James shared.

James kept a journal of Kaitlyn's journey. "That's how I cope", he said.

Some of the entries he made: "With tears in our eyes and pain in our hearts we signed a mountain on consents and made a promise to our children that we would stop at nothing until we are cancer free. We started with lots of antibiotics, followed by a blood transfusion and two rounds of chemotherapy. By lunch, we were holding our baby as she received the first of surgery quickly overwhelmed us both as she was crying on the hospital bed that completely consumed her. Later that day my little lady asleep on my chest, the nurse administered an amount of medications. It was done. We had taken our first round of chemotherapy to our surprise, our little lady never moved. As for her I, once again we fell to pieces."

When we stayed at the hospital, we became like a family with other sick children. We shared our stories and our tears. When a child has chemo, it kills off their bone marrow. When it begins to grow back, other children who are more verbal than Kaitlyn in describing the feeling in the hips and legs as being like 'growing pains' or 'it's like arthritis pain. It's hard to see your child going through this when they are too young to understand. It breaks your heart to see them suffer."

James works days and James works nights. One parent or the other is in the hospital most of the time, and Diane Johnson, Kaitlyn's grandmother it helps help out in the in-between hours.

So many expenses involved in caring for a sick child who must be in the hospital on a regular basis. Gas and food expenses (the hospital) can really mount in a hurry. Her regimen of treatment at this point, some weeks they must go more often than others.

There have been three fund raisers for the family: an on-line auction, a tournament in Greenville sponsored by their friend Ashli Davis, and a dinner and concert at the Wylie First Baptist Church sponsored by Gary. A chess tournament is in the process of being scheduled.

Rockwall will have a home-field advantage in its last chance to qualify for the 7-on-7 football Division I State Championships.

The last chance will come Saturday on the artificial-turf practice field at Rockwall High School in the 1-30 State Qualifying Tournament.

Only teams that will be competing in the tournament. Six of those already qualified for the 64-team field in the State Championships July 20 and Texas A&M University in College Station. Thus, 14 teams will be competing for two state berths.

"We've got a lot of good teams," said RHS head coach Scott Smith.

winners of those two games could compete for the I-30 championship, or they could choose to become co-champions, because both will advance to the state tournament.

Lamar already has qualified, so three teams will be eligible for Pool A's semifinal berth.

The Rockwall B team is scheduled to play in Pool C against Richardson Berkner at 9 a.m., Plano at 10 a.m. and McKinney at 11 a.m., with those games all at Wilkerson-Sanders Memorial Stadium.

Playing in Pool D at Rockwall-Heath High School would be Wylie East, which already has qualified; North Mesquite; Naaman Forest, and Rowlett.

In the only pool playing on natural grass, at the RHS grass field, are Denison, Sherman, Midlothian and Lovejoy. A separate Pool E at Homer B. Johnson Stadium in Garland would include four teams that already have qualified - Wylie, Plano East, Hebron and Tyler Lee.

North Mesquite and Tyler Lee will be in District 12-5A with Rockwall this fall.
