Wimpee, Clark square off in Pct. 1 race

Taxes have taken center stage in the race for Precinct 1 county commission-

Two Republicans - incumbent Jerry Wimpee and challenger Bruce Clark have narrowed their campaigns to focus on fiscal affairs and economic issues. Both are also conscious of high growth rates facing the county.

Local taxation rates are too high, according to Clark - especially for a small county. His principal motivation for entering the race was a hope of lowering them, he said, as well as the possibility of cutting back on spending and budget

Clark said that over the last several years, the commissioners court has raised taxes and fees by 25 percent, including the addition of a county sales

tax. Clark said they have also substantially increased county salaries - includ-

"It was like nobody was watching the hen house," Clark said. "It seems to me, looking at the past eight years, that a lot of time and effort was spent on determining where the commissioners court could find more revenue instead of on fiscal responsibility and now spending money you don't need."

Clark also said special care must be taken when planning and developing county roads and right-of-ways. There will come a day many years from now, he said, when the entirety of Rockwall

Dennis Bailey is best of trio seeking Pct. 3 commissioners seat

Voters in Rockwall County's Precinct 3 will be electing a new commissioner in Tuesday's Republican Party primary, making their selection from a field of three men who all bring unique qualifications to a campaign that has drawn considerable interest in the past few

We feel Dennis Bailey is the candidate best suited for the job at this point in time in Rockwall County's fastchanging environment.

Dealing with the needs of a road system that requires coordination between several cities, the county and the state in order to keep traffic moving around Rockwall County will be a high priority for the Precinct 3 commissioner. We believe Bailey has the skills needed to provide the leadership to bring this coordination into proper perspective.

Bailey has extensive experience in dealing with both state government agencies and local government officials. He understands how difficult it can be at times to bring all of these various bodies of government together to accomplish a common purpose. But at the same time he has proven that he knows how to be persistent in bringing these different groups together to work for the public's best interest.

Unless there is coordination of resources it will be hard for the traffic systems of Rockwall County to continue to grow and expand to meet the increased needs of more and more vehicles on the streets, roads and highways. Unless someone is willing and able to coordinate communication and planning between state, county and local governments, there will always be delays and frustrations in bringing badly needed improvements. With Rockwall County growing at such a rapid pace, delays and poor planning is not acceptable.

We believe Bailey has the skills to plan and coordi-

nate traffic flow in a manner that has not been accomplished in the past from a county level. We also believe he has a clear vision of what Rockwall County will need to meet the demands of future growth where traffic infrastructure is concerned.

Above all, Bailey knows that good streets, roads and highways are expensive and that Rockwall County taxpayers expect funds used for roads and road maintenance to be used in an efficient manner. We expect Bailey will serve as the type of county official who is both a good steward of the public's trust and also a wise plan-

hey'll never nominate me for any Tree Hugger Of The Year awards, but I will confess that I'm more inclined to pay attention to environmental issues these

Six weeks ago I felt reasonably sure the presidential race would end up with Rudy Giuliani facing Hillary Clinton in November. Wrong!

That was six weeks ago. And six weeks is a long, long time in poli-

Giuliani never got out of the gate. And now Clinton is on the ropes. In both camps there are a lot of people still trying to figure out what went wrong.

You'll find a different opinion in almost every corner, but the main thing that changed in the past six weeks is voters across the nation shifted gears.

Early in the election season our collective attitudes toward the presidential primaries were more like watching horse races. We were more interested in who could run the fastest, jump the highest or pull away from the pack. It was a hybrid mixture of beauty pageant and civic class debates.

 Somewhere between the end of the Christmas holiday season and the ramp-up to Super Tuesday, voters began to grow more concerned about economic conditions. The restless feeling of wondering about how high gasoline prices would soar or how far the stock market would fall became more important in our minds than picking sides in philosophical debates.

In frank terms, most of us started asking ourselves which candidate would do the best job of protecting our pocket books.

Giuliani's campaign fell flat for a long list of reasons. Mainly the

former New York mayor avoided the early primary elections and never engaged the voters or the media. "Out of sight, out of mind," may have looked good on paper, but it doesn't appear to work very well in presidential politics, especially at a time when voters are ready to kick the tires.

Clinton, on the other hand, has fallen out of favor because of over exposure. We've been hearing the same speech for 16 years. Her tone and her message no longer inspire. In fact, as odd as it may seem, she's even lost her ability to inflame her

As the first week of early voting came to an end in Texas all signs were pointing toward Clinton being in a state of stalemate, or as one pundit put it, "she's in checkmate."

Barack Obama is leading Clinton in national polls. He has also pulled almost dead even with her in Texas, and all signs point to his momentum growing stronger.

On closer inspection of the real numbers there is no way Clinton can win the nomination before the Democratic convention starts. It's

lady can muster a victory among the party's super delegates. Several have already switched to Obama and more are expected to follow in the coming weeks.

ty's nomination would then be a protracted fight during the convention to seat the delegates from Michigan and Florida whose votes have been disallowed because they moved their state's primary elections forward on the calendar.

Pressing for those two states' delegates to be counted would do more harm than good, leaving Democrats divided all the way through the November election.

In terms of Democratic Party head counts, Clinton is suddenly at game, set, match. It's time to sweep the floor and go home. You could even tell she knows the race is over by her closing remarks in Texas debate when she all but said, "Good game."

Clinton in two short weeks has drifted into the same boat as Republican Mike Huckabee. They are both captains of sinking ships, but both refuse to climb into the life raft and head for the shore.

Trends noted in Rockwall politics

Rockwall remains about as Republican as it gets - despite a surge of interest in the

Democratic primary. Rockwall County has seen dramatic interest in the Texas primary, and nearly 3,400 residents have cast early votes. Those figures illustrate three noteworthy trends in local politics.

The first is a stark contrast with the 2004 Texas primary - participation has nearly doubled. Glenda Denton, elections administrator for Rockwall County, said 1,888 residents voted during the last presidential primary and, as of Feb. 26, 3,395 residents had voted in this cycle. That's a 180 percent increase, and those statistics - the most recent available at press time - did not count the last three days of early voting.

The second trend relates to party strength and participation. Unlike states that restrict primary elections to registered party members, Denton said Texas law allows voters to participate in either primary during any particular cycle. Voters can "cross over" and vote in an opposing primary and then change back during the general election, so participation mary an advantage. in party primaries is not considered an indicator of party

Even so, the numbers are staggering - an 800 percent increase separates participation in the 2004 and 2008 Democratic primaries. One hundred and ninety-one voters cast ballots in 2004 and more than 1,500 voted in 2008.

The third relates to Rockwall County's neighbors. Voters in nearly all adjacent and nearby counties favored the Democratic party, some by substantial margins, and Rockwall is one of only three to give the Republican pri-

Local voters preferred the Republican primary by 55 percent to 45 percent, outpaced by only Hunt County at 57 percent and Henderson County at 56 percent.

The other seven counties - Dallas, Collin, Kaufman, Van Zandt, Ellis, Rains and Navarro - favored the Democratic primary. Four out of every five Dallas voters cast ballots on the Democratic side, or 82 percent, followed by Rains County at 64 percent Democratic and Collin County at 61 percent.

Early voting for the March 4 primary ends Feb. 29.



Sumrow prepares for upcoming trial

DALLAS – A brief hearing on Feb. 14 gained the Rockwall County District Attorney's lawyer access to the grand jury transcripts relating to money matters.

A judge granted Ray Sumrow's attorney, James Wheeler's discovery motion for the transcripts. Collin County Assistant District Attorneys John Schomburger and Jim Skinner agreed to present Wheeler with letters earmarking evidence of money greater than \$50 and less than \$500.

Testimony in Sumrow's felony trial is scheduled to begin March 5 in Dallas. Jury selection begins March 3. Sumrow has another felony hearing for a Travis County

indictment slated for April 2. The indictments against Sumrow allege that he took







Judge says Conradt case can be tried

(AP) - A federal judge handed a legal victory Tuesday to the sister who claims "Dateline NBC: To Catch A Predator" led her brother former Rockwall County Assistant District Attorney Bill Conradt Jr. - to kill himself after camera crews and police officers showed up at his Terrell home in a sex sting.

In a scathing ruling, U.S. District Judge Denny Chin permitted a \$105 million lawsuit to go to trial, saying a jury might conclude the network "crossed the line from responsible journalism to irresponsible and reckless intrusion into law enforcement."

Conradt, a longtime district attorney in neighboring Kaufman County at the time, fatally shot himself after he was accused of engaging in a sexually explicit online chat with an adult posing as a 13year-old boy, according to a lawsuit filed by his sister.


In the lawsuit, Patricia Conradt said NBC "steamrolled" police to arrest her brother after telling police he failed to show up at a sting operation 35 miles away in Murphy.

NBC was working with the activist group Perverted Justice on the sting, in which people impersonating children established online chats police.
