Federal indictment leads to Jose Luis Coria arrest in Dallas

Jose Luis Coria, the target of a federal investigation into an international drug-trafficking organization, was arrested Oct. 21 when officers with the Rockwall Police Department executed a search warrant at a Dallas location.

Coria's arrest was made "without incident" during the search at a location on North Masters Road, according to Lt. Carl Alsabrook, the Rockwall PD's public information officer. The information was provided in an Oct. 28 news release.

Coria, who had been sought by federal indictment, is believed to have ties to La Familia, a drugtrafficking network, according to the release.

The search was executed by the local department's SWAT team and Criminal Investigative Division, Alsabrook said in the release. Methamphetamine and seven firearms were seized.

The arrest was the result of a two-year investigation that involved members of the Rockwall Special Crimes Unit and the federal Drug Enforcement Administration, as well as other North Texas agencies.

Approximately 40 search warrants were simultaneously served throughout the area as part of this

effort, which according to the release has been dubbed "Project Coronado." The search warrants resulted in the seizure of approx-

imately 650 pounds of meth-

amphetamine; 4.5 kilograms of cocaine; \$660,000 in cash; 50 firearms; 53 vehicles; one boat; two all-terrain vehicles; a camper; and two properties.


Toy drive drop-off set at Saturday fair

On God's Word

The Promise of the Father comes...Acts 2:1-4 We will now look at the events recorded in Acts 2:1-4. With help from God, the apostles had just chosen a replacement for Judas. Later, on a special day called Pentecost while all the disciples were together in

the temple at Jerusalem, holy spirit was poured out into the world. The

promise of the Father became available.

Starting with verses 2-4, "And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the holy ghost and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave the words."

While every body sat in the temple, a sound from heaven suddenly broke the silence. To understand what that sound was it helps to remember that earlier, Jesus Christ told them to wait for the promise from God. The promise was to be God's gift of the holy ghost. Given this, we can safely conclude the sound represented the pouring out of holy spirit. It is impossible for spiritual things to be directly perceived by our five senses and science. So the sound had to be miraculously provided by God. It is interesting to note that the word spirit came from a word that referred to wind. So it is quite fitting that God would give the sound of wind while pouring out holy spirit.

A vision of cloven tongues like fire was given to them. And the tongues sat upon each of them. They had already been taught earlier that speaking in tongues would be available. So when the time was right, God gave them the perfect cue to start speaking. It was a vision of cloven tongues sitting upon them. Isn't that so cool! They saw the vision and immediately acted on it. To speak in tongues simply means to speak in languages foreign to the person speaking. Please understand that they were not possessed into speaking in tongues. They freely started speaking according to God's will. And as they started speaking, the Spirit gave the words.

Please note that the vision of tongues was only for that situation. There are no records of any other people seeing similar visions. After the events of Acts 2:1-4, it was no longer necessary to receive this vision. The other records of people speaking in tongues involved someone teaching them about it.

A study of the words "sat upon" also shines more light. It came from an earlier word that referred to a continuous pressing downward upon something. It presumes that the thing being pressed down cannot come



How did they know the holy ghost fell on them? "For they heard them speak with tongues, and magnify God" (Acts 10:46). This shows that speaking in tongues is directly related to the holy ghost permanently pressing downward upon somebody. In this record Peter had to teach them, but in Acts 2:4 the disciples had already been taught about speaking in tongues. They just didn't know when to start. This is why God gave the vision of cloven tongues pressing downward upon each of them.

In Acts 2:4 we see the first record of people being baptized with holy spirit and getting born-again not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible seed, by the word of God which lives and abides forever (1Peter 1:23). These were the ever-abiding words that sprang out of them as rivers of living waters when they started speaking in tongues.

After that point, the first disciples were saved from having to endure







Volunteer manpower rebuilds family's burned home in Lake Rockwall Estate

When tragedy struck a family in the Lake Rockwall Estates (LRE) area of Rockwall County in 2008, a community rallied together to offer support, supplies, and spiritual counsel. One year later, the family moved back onto their property into a new home built entirely by volunteers.

The family of eight had been displaced for slightly more than a year since a fire destroyed their home. While attending their niece's Quinceañera in 2008, the Gonzales-Zuñiga home was struck by lightning. Fortunately, a neighbor was home and contacted the fire department, saving some of the family's cherished items.

"We were just glad that we were not home," said 17-year-old Elizabeth, as she explained the events of that day. "We were glad that no one was hurt."

The couple's wedding attire hung outside the neighbor's home for quite some time to eliminate the smoky smell. The children mentioned that their Bibles were saved, as well as one daughter's precious stuffed dog. Most everything else perished in the fire.

What did not perish, however, was hope. Through the combined efforts of the City of Rockwall, Rockwall-Heath High School, and Lake Pointe Church, the family began to receive support.

The first response to the family's needs came from Rockwall's City Code Enforcer, Leonard Mendez, who heard of the fire and that the family had lost their basic necessities. He contacted Enid Reyes at Lake Pointe Church, who directs the LRE Community Center, and Adriana Gutierrez at Rockwall-Heath High School, where three of the children attend school. These entities immediately began to work together to help the family by providing lodging at a local hotel and transportation to school for the children.

This was just the beginning of a transformation brought about by tragedy.

"Many [Lake Pointe] Life Groups pulled together to provide food and clothing to the family," said Reyes, the church's director of community ministries. "They also provided furniture, mattresses, gift cards, and money. They became very engaged in helping this family."

"Out of the help and ministry assistance we gave them, they began coming to Lake Pointe's Hispanic church," Reyes said. "The father came to Christ and the whole family became very active in the [LRE] Community Center. They offered to volunteer at every scheduled opportunity. In fact, the girls have become leaders inviting other youth to the church."

Transformation at Lake Rockwall Estates is happening one person at a time, Reyes said. "They come in, we love them as Christ would, we are His hands and feet. They come to know Him personally, they come to church, they get involved. Then they invite others in the community to get involved in the activities at the Center."

When Lake Pointe Church celebrated 30 years of service to the community in June—sporting their black "I Got My Shovel" t-shirts—a home construction project for this family seemed like a natural choice. The family met LRE program benchmarks (through the area's Community Center), has the largest amount of volunteer hours, and they prequalified financially.

The purpose of the weekend-long Anniversary celebration was to serve the community and give back to Rockwall residents. This particular project, however, took much longer than one weekend to complete.

With the foundation poured, volunteers began construction of the home on Saturday, June 13, and worked every weekend until its completion on Oct. 3. The home was dedicated and the volunteers celebrated during an Open House on Saturday, Oct. 17.

"The completion of a project like the Gonzalez home is only made possible by the generosity of those who have donated materials and services, but more importantly by those who donated their time to the project," said John Wardell, Lake Pointe Church's executive pastor of operations.

"The most valuable volunteer in the project was Alan Selden, a professional home builder who led the construction of the home from start to finish. The Community Center at Lake Rockwall Estates and this home are both products of his leadership and his servanthood," Wardell said.

Mr. Selden said that "God just sent the right number of people for whatever was going to be done each day. They each were enthusiastic

and each had a servant's heart."

"Some were skilled, some were not. And that really is fine," Selden added. "Even in the Bible, God called those who didn't know what they had to offer, but they were willing to do the work. We provided the tools and leadership; volunteers provided the manpower. Even the father, the recipient of the home, was there taping, bedding, and painting. He did a wonderful ioh!"

Whether you yourself skilled or not, these projects provide a way for you others and to make a difference in our community."

And it did make a difference. "I'm so excited for my mon to get this new house," Elizabeth said. "They worked very h: up our old house before the fire."



Centennial sweeps Lady Jackets at bi-district competition

Frisco Centennial showed its power hitting, but for the most part its sweep of Rockwall's Lady Jackets Tuesday was a case of killing them softly.

The Lady Titans showed why they were District 9-4A volleyball champions, using a complete game for 25-13, 25-14 and 25-21 vic-

When RHS blockers rushed the net, Centennial would lift the ball over them and into a void on the floor. When the Lady Jackets' defense overplayed one side of the court, the Lady Titans quickly moved the ball into openings on the other side.

"It was finesse," said Rockwall head coach Damon Wilson, "but that finesse would not work if we didn't respect their power so much. With them, it's 'How can you adjust?' We didn't adjust really quickly.

"They're a really good team. They served well and passed well. I mainly give credit to that team. A good team will unravel you, and we unraveled."

Centennial won its 12th consecutive match to improve to 35-6. Its dominance was so great that the Jackets never led in the match. They were tied 1-1 in the first game before the Lady Titans got a side out and ran off five more points on Jenna Risoli's left-handed serves. Rockwall came back within a point at 8-7, but before long the deficit grew to 17-9. Risoli served out the game's final six points.

The second game was more of the same. When Frisco wasn't scoring on soft kills, it seemed as if RHS was blocking the ball out of bounds. The score was 17-11 before a side out and five points on Lauren Larocque's serve put that game away.

For the third consecutive game, Centennial had a 17-11 lead. It

grew to 19-11 before the Lady Titans blocked Maggie Brindock's hit out of bounds.

Rockwall rallied from that point. Jennifer Broze served two points and Brooke Harrington and Ashlynn Broussard scored with kills, but Centennial came within a point of victory at 24-18. A side out and two points on Allie Welch's serve brought the Lady Jackets within 24-21 before the match ended when Brindock hit into the net.

Wilson said, "We showed fight, but they don't let up if you start to get a little momentum."

The season ended for RHS with a 19-20 overall record.

It was a year when Brindock was the only experienced player. The other senior co-captain, McKenna Abbott, didn't play after suffering a knee injury before the season. She did make a token appearance against Centennial, serving once at 1-1 in the first game and returning the ball once, but left the match after a side out.

"She wanted to do it," Wilson said. "It was kind of a better way to say good-bye to her high school career."

The coach said the co-captains will be signing national letters of intent with Division I colleges Wednesday when the one-week early signing period begins - Abbott with Georgia Southern, Brindock with Notre Dame.

Wilson said, "Losing them will be a tremendous loss. Everything was new this year. Maggie was the only returning player. There's something to be said for people who have been there before."

On the positive side, next year's team would have returning 11 players who participated against Centennial, plus reinforcements from a successful junior varsity team.

"We played three sophomores and a freshman pretty regularly tonight," Wilson said, "It seems promising."




"They went all out and did what they had to do to assure my wellbeing," he says.

A suspicious knot in his leg sent Guy Keeter to the emergency room, where his physician, Dr. Russell Lam verified what was a serious threat: a blood clot.

"It could have hit my heart," Guy says, "but Dr. Lam X-rayed and found it."

To remedy the situation, a vena cava filter was surgically implanted more than a year ago. The filter, shaped like an umbrella, was implanted by going through a vein.

JoAnne Keeter, Guy's wife, explains that the filter is designed to keep the blood clot or pieces of it from traveling through her husband's veins and hitting his heart or lungs, which could result in a medical emergency.

Today, Guy feels as good as ever.

"He's doing well," JoAnne says. "No more pain."

"I feel fine," Guy says. "Dr. Lam is a good doctor."

Even though the filter is in place and doing its job, Guy continues to undergo regular checkups.

"He's still being treated by Dr. Lam, and we think he is an excellent doctor," says JoAnne. "He's very caring and understanding, very interested in the well-being of his patient. He really seems to enjoy his work."

Far more than just a lovely, private setting for women, the Women's Imaging Center offers state-of-the-art breast health services, with the latest equipment and some of the most advanced technologies designed for comfort and accurate detection.

Breast cancer typically doesn't cause symptoms in early stages, therefore it is important to have screening tests to find the cancer before symptoms appear. The Women's Center offers screening mammograms, which are x-rays of the breast that are used to see lumps and other changes in breast tissue. The mammography unit produces optimal images with faster exposure times using

the least amount of radiation. The result is less discomfort and a lower probability of re-testing due to motion blur. "Soft touch" mammography pads are used which makes the procedure more comfortable for the clients.

The Women's Imaging Center also performs breast ultrasound tests that are ordered when a mammogram image shows a mass or a woman feels a lump. These non-invasive tests determine whether a lump is a solid mass or something else like a fluid-filled cyst. The Center's latest digital ultrasound equipment produces high resolution images making it easier to see tiny details. In most cases, an ultrasound can be performed in the same visit as a diagnostic mammogram.

"We believe women deserve access to a special place designed specifically for them, a place where highly specialized diagnostic services are provided in a compassionate, caring environment," states Barbara Nichols, mammography technician at the Women's Imaging Center.


In addition to mammography and ultrasound, The Center also provides bone density scanning, also called dual-energy x-ray absorpitiometry (DEXA), a form of x-ray technology used to measure bone loss. In this safe, painless, 10-minute scan, minimal radiation is used to determine the bone density of the spine, hip or wrist. All of the DEXA diagnostic technologists are highly skilled professionals who are certified in the field of radiology.

The Women's Imaging Center can also provide new mothers with their first face-to-face meeting with their unborn child. Using the

latest 4D fetal imaging, The Center allows you to view your baby during a relaxed, personalized and unique ultrasound session. Seeing your unborn child for the first time is sure to touch your heart.

Marc Tedrowe

When you or a loved one needs help, both time and expertise are of the essence. Presbyterian Hospital of Rockwall (PHR) brings the best of both to the heart of this community.

Marc Tedrowe was getting ready to play a round of golf when he felt chest pain. At first he thought it was bad indigestion. "It's one of those times you think 'I can get rid of this and I'll be fine," says Marc. "But it kept staying there and then I finally just had to give up. I was afraid of what was going on." After thinking he would wait it out, Marc called his wife, Sally, who took action. Sally immediately called the clubhouse to get assistance and then called 911.

The paramedics found that Marc was having a heart attack and transported him to the closest hospital. Thankfully, for Marc, PHR is well equipped to handle such emergencies through the Regional Transfer Protocol for Heart Attack.

Since PHR does not have a cardiac catheterization lab, they have developed a partnership with Texas Health Presbyterian Dallas to transfer heart attack patients to their cardiac cath lab as quickly as possible. The protocol works on a 90 minute clock, which means you have one and a half hours from the time the patient first arrives in the emergency room to getting their artery open. The sooner the artery is open, the less heart muscle will be permanently damaged.

When Marc arrived at PHR he was immediately seen by the emergency physician, stabilized and transported via helicopter to Texas Health Dallas. Once there, Tony Das, MD, an interventional cardiologist on staff at both hospitals, was able to open Marc's blocked artery and restore blood flow. Marc Tedrowe's time from arriving at Presbyterian Hospital of Rockwall then 22 miles to Dallas, and an open artery, was sixtyfive minutes.

"If you are having a problem that you think may be heart related; chest pain, pressure, shortness of breath, go immediately to an ER very close to you," says Dr. Das. "The physicians can actually facilitate a transfer very rapidly and you will get the best care guickly."

Marc is back at work as an architectural engineer and more focused on his health. His response to this situation, "It's great they can get you in and out so fast. That's what I am amazed at.

Who would think you would have it and 65 minutes later you're waking up feeling great." And what does his wife say? "I have a husband that doesn't have heart damage and that makes me very happy."

"The emergency room staff is proud that we have developed a rapid transfer process that benefits the people of our community." says Tami Hawkins, Emergency Room Clinical Director at PHR. "This process allows patients to receive immediate initial treatment at a facility with comprehensive cardiac care."

The 24-hour emergency room at Presbyterian Hospital of Rockwall is staffed by doctors, nurses and paramedics with many years of experience. The combination of their expertise, compassion, the most advanced medical technology and guick access provides this community with the best emergency care





A colonoscopy is a screening for colorectal polyps and cancer. A colonoscope is a lighted tube that is inserted into the rectum and the instrument that allows a full view of the colon. If during the colonoscopy polyps are found they can be removed and sent to a lab to be tested. If the polyp cannot be removed due to size or location, it may be necessary to have surgery to remove the polyp. If a cancerous growth is found, it will also need to be removed by a surgical procedure.
