Planning and zoning director Robert LaCroix said although the store is located in a general commercial zone, representatives had made concessions (outside storage among them) in exchange for permission to build additional gas pumps at the location.



Heath Council OKs purchase of Fireflie

At the Oct. 5 meeting of Heath City Council, council members approved the purchase of 700 automated water meter-reading devices at a cost of

The devices, called Fireflies, are installed on water meters and use radio communication to communicate

readings for the city. The meters allow the city to monitor water usage as frequently as wanted and provide more accurate water-usage records.

The city had previously conducted a trial with the devices and after a successful test period, purchased 100 remote meter readers at addressed around FM 740 and FM1140.

The additional 700 meters cover about half of the water r in the city and will be installed ing the coming winter months city plans to continue phasing remote meters until the entire can be read remotely.






Born Aug. 16, 1924, in Dallas to H.L. Small Sr. and Ethel F. (Saunders) Small, he was a member of the

The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is October 22, 2010. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 4 firm transportation customers and 63 interruptible transportation customers. APT's Other Revenue customer class is not affected by this filing.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$38.9 million. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition, the Company seeks to recover all rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount of rate case expenses will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the meter charge will be eliminated, and the capacity charge and usage rate applicable for each of the customer classes affected by this filing will increase by the amount shown in the table below:




Devanne Parent (10) and Aubree Baune (5) defend the Lady Hawks' territory against a strong Highland Park offense during the recent game at Heath.


