Total enrollment Average attendance 31 Days present Pupils promoted 26

The session commenced October 16, 1911, and closed April 19, 1912, a period of six and a half months, including a five days Teachers' Institute. The actual number of days taught was 122. The total number of pupils enrolled was 118.

The session was a very successful one. Most of the pupils worked diligently, and made satisfactory progress in their studies. The total number of pupils promoted wes 52.
