Precinct Democrats Convened Last Saturday

W. P. Starr, Re-elected Chairman--Delegates Appointed to go to Co. Convention

Democrats of this Precinct convened at the local school building last Saturday evening at two o'clock for the purpose of electing a Precinct Chairman and appointing delegates to County Convention, which convenes at Vernon Saturday 29th.

The convention was called to order by J. M. Collins, who acted as temporary chairman during absence of W. P. Starr, Precinct Chairman.

W. P. Starr was re-elected to serve the precinct as Chairman for the next two years. And the following delegates were appointed to attend the County Convention:

J. R. Huie, W. B. Beach, G. B. Crain, G. W. Bucy, W. P. Starr, B. D. Smith and Charles P. Ross. Delegates were instructed to vote as a unit.

C. G. Thompson Elected Commissioner, Precinct 3

Late Count of Ballots Showed Him Elected Over 2nd. Man by 8 Votes

According to a report, which is authentic, received this morning, C. G. Thompson, who was one of the candidates for commission of this precinct, which is number 3; Mr. Thompson was the successful nominee for the position, defeating the second man for the place by 8 votes.

The votes each candidate received at the different boxes over precinct, was phoned to Vernon Saturday night. At the Farmers Valley box a mistake was made in adding up the votes one of the commissioner candidates received at that place and phoned Vernon likewise. Willis Vaughn, in whose favor, the mistake was made, was first learned to have received 48 votes at Farmers Valley, when a correct count of the ballots showed him to have received only 28. His majority over Mr. Thompson, as first reported, was 12 votes, but a correct count of all ballots, as already stated, shows Mr. Thompson to have been elected by 8 votes over the second man.

Now, as to why the notice from Mr. Thompson to voters of precinct, appears in another part of this paper. Mr. Thompson handed in the notice for publication in the Reporter on Wednesday of this week, which notice was set up and printed that day. Mr. Thompson nor the editor of this paper did not know at the time, he would be the next commissioner of this precinct.

The election is over, the political wave subsided and very little is now being heard about the returns from the Democratic Primary held last Saturday.

A large crowd was in town throughout the day and most any time from an early hour in the morning until a late hour in the afternoon, you could see crowds of voters bunched at different parts of the streets, putting in a good word for their candidates.

Quite a heavy vote was cast, there being 194 votes polled out of the 250 poll tax receipts issued for this box.

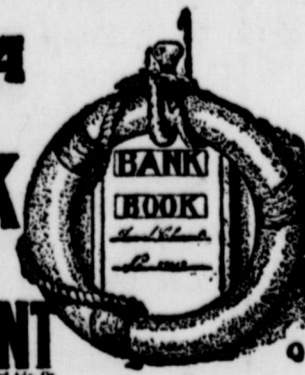

RAILROAD WAGES

Shall they be determined by Industrial Warfare or Federal Inquiry?

To the American Public:

Do you believe in arbitration or industrial warfare?

The train employes on all the railroads are voting whether they will give their leaders authority to tie up the commerce of the country to enforce their demands for a 100 million dollar wage increase.

The railroads are in the public service—your service. This army of employes is in the public service—your service.

You pay for rail transportation 3 billion dollars a year, and 44 cents out of every dollar from you goes to the employes.

On all the Western railroads in 1915, seventy-five per cent of the train employes earned these wages (lowest, highest and average of all) as shown by the pay rolls—

A 100 million dollar wage increase for men in freight and yard service (less than one-fifth of all employes) is equal to a 5 per cent advance in all freight rates.

The managers of the railroads, as trustees for the public, have no right to place this burden on the cost of transportation to you without a clear mandate from a public tribunal speaking for you.

The railroads have proposed the settlement of this controversy either under the existing national arbitration law, or by reference to the Interstate Commerce Commission. This offer has been refused by the employes' representatives.

Shall a nation-wide strike or an investigation under the Government determine this issue?
