Man Being Held at Quanah For Assault on Girl

Young Lady Near Eldorado,
Attacked by Her Father's
Farm Hand

Marshall Tatum, a man twenty four years of age, nativity unknown, is now jail at Quanah charged with the transportation of stolen property and also awaiting the granting of extradition by Governor Ferguson of Texas, when he will be brought to Altus under arrest for an assault on young Martha West, the 14 year old daughter of Mr. and Ky West at their farm five miles west of Eldorado, last Friday evening, July, 30.

According to the story here, late last Friday evening the girl started on a horse to the pasture some distance from the house with the object of driving up the cows, and being seen by Tatum to start off alone, he followed her on another horse, from which he had compelled the young brother of girl to dismount. The suspicions of the boy aroused, he ran and told of the occurrence to an older brother, who made for the pasture post haste, and on nearing a draw some hundred yards from the house he heard the screams of his young sister and rushing to the scene he engaged her assailant in a fierce struggle, in which he received a knife wound and was finally stunned by a blow on the head, giving Tatum opportunity to get away, which he proceeded to do with all haste.

Mounting one of the horses standing nearby, Tatum fled to

Quanah. Enroute he sold the saddle for \$20, which he received as payment for half of its value in Quanah, he boarded a northbound passenger the day following the assault. By accident, Sheriff Walker was on the same train, and being warned by telegram to watch for such a man, he had Tatum under arrest before the train had gone far.

Tatum, who had been employed as a farm laborer on the West farm for about a month, was trailed to Quanah by the girl's father, who when Tatum was safely in jail, came to Altus Monday and placed the matter in the hands of County Attorney Hall.

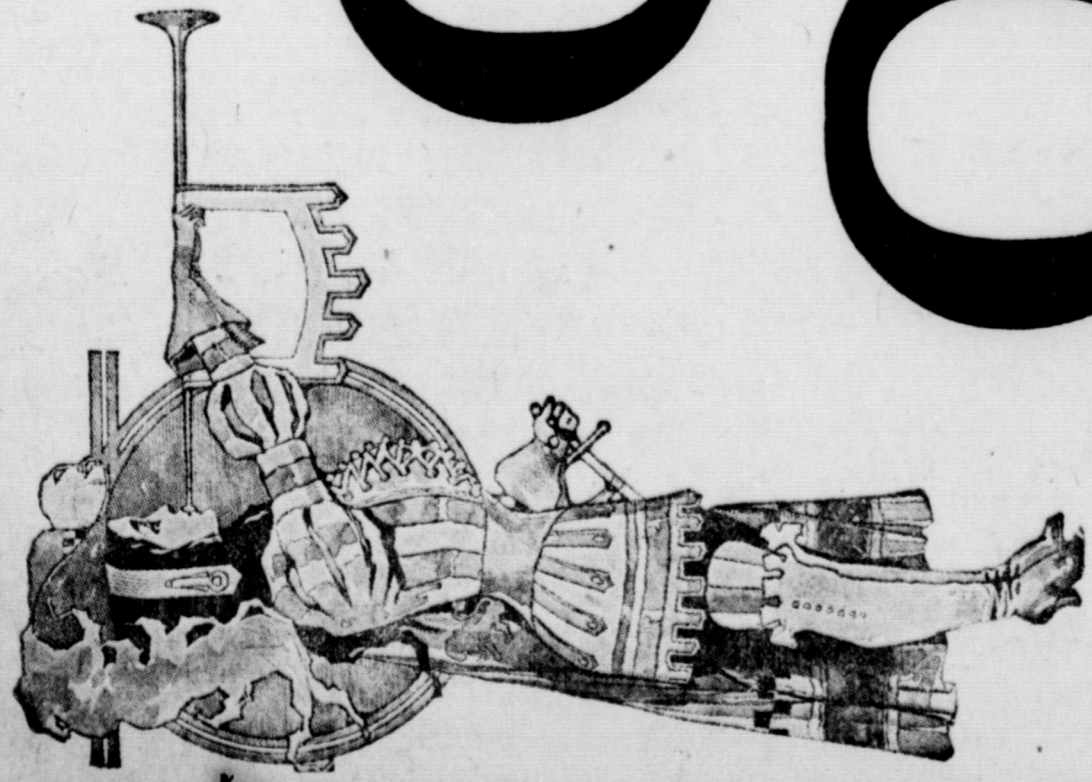

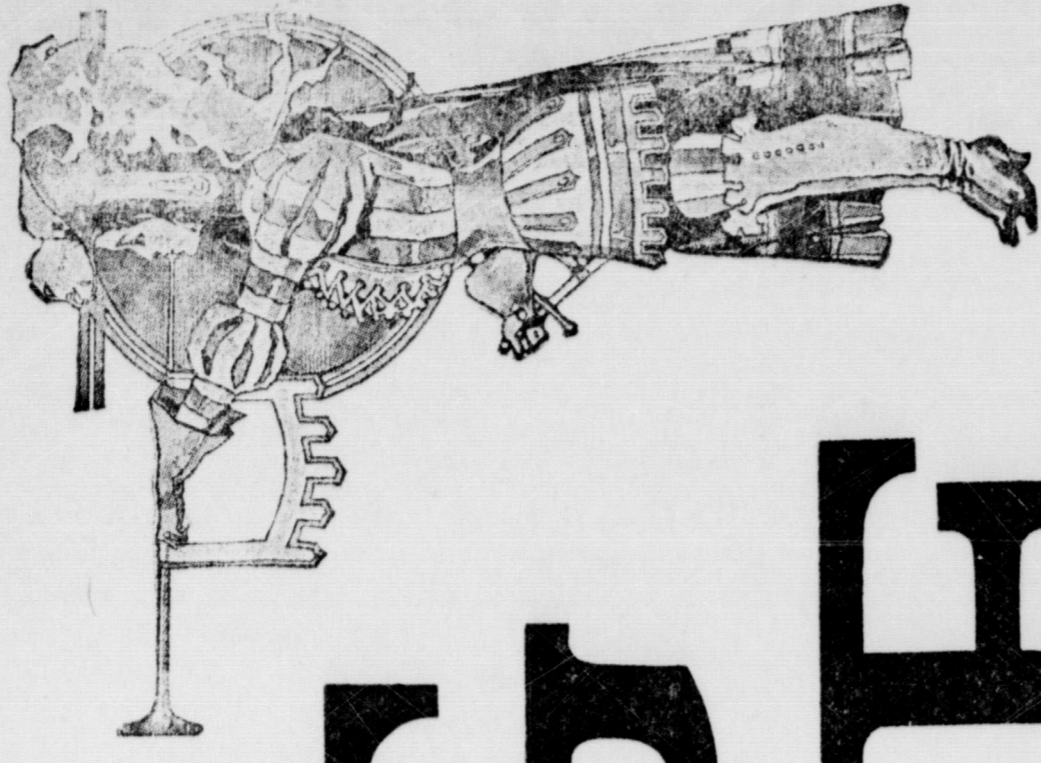

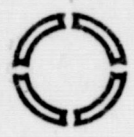

County Judge Notes Marks of Wilbarger Boys

The Reporter was requested to reproduce the following article from the pen of County Judge J. B. Copeland. Who in quite a lengthy writeup calls attention to accomplishments of different Wilbarger boys.

"In last week's issue of the Record we noticed the following heading:

"Local Boys Make Record." This is followed by a short account of two of our farmer boys, brothers, products of our excellent rural environments, who stood at the head of their classes at the A. & M. College, one of our best educational institutions, and both of the boys were in a group of only five out of a scholarship of over nine hundred, that made a grade of A in all their studies. One of the boys acquitted himself with a credit so high that the board has offered him a position as instructor in the extension department of his Alma Mater, a position that carries with it a salary of from \$12000 \$2000 per annum. But the boy did not jump at the position, but very modestly says that he prefers to remain on the farm.

There is little mention made of our young people who have graduated with high honors at law schools and other institutions of learning, because we have come to accept this kind of thing as a matter of course. I could mention places where incidents of this kind would have called out the band and a civic parade and it would be advertised throughout the land. But when our young people go forth to enter the great arena of competition, be it search of knowledge, honors or social distinction, we do not entertain any doubt as to the outcome but await with confidence the result, knowing that they go in to win.

There is a reason for this excellent condition. The germ lies deep in psychology. I believe it is because of our wonderful optimism. We do nothing in a small way. Our enterprises, be they farming, manufacturing or mercantile, are all on a large scale compared with other towns and communities of corresponding size in

the State,

We have no "Penny Arcades" or cheap john enterprises, and our business interest let them be what they may, or expressed in large figures and dimensions. The older set fill all the political offices of distinction of Judicial and Congressional District and some of our citizens have been appointed to fill important State offices. Consequently our young people have become imbued with this feeling of success and optimism and largeness of affairs and have never learned to entertain the idea and fear of failure and therefore they go forth to win and do. You can do whatever you think you can do, provided you think so strongly enough for "as a man thinketh in his heart so is he."

Boys and girls, we are proud of your success and of the honors that are bestowed upon you. Your joys are our joys. But in the hurry and turmoil of our affairs we are prone to fail to give expression to our sentiment.

You have taught us to cease speculating as to whether you will acquit yourselves with credit in our great educational institutions, but we have only to wonder as to the kind of laurels you may select with which to decorate yourselves. Yours for success,

BACK TO THE FIRESIDE WITH GOVERNMENT

FOUNTAIN OF JUSTICE MUST SPRING FROM THE HEARTHSTONE.

No citizenship of any civilization ever faced as grave a crisis as that now confronting the people of Texas. I believe it is safe to say that not less than ninety per cent of the business concerns in this State are criminals as the law is now interpreted, and among the large concerns perhaps that percentage already stands convicted upon the court records. Either the legal area of crime is too wide for human endurance and commercial activity, or the Administration of Justice is faulty and incompetent. It is for the people to say.

It is the purpose of the Texas Economic League to get back to the fireside with government, and all citizens are invited to join in the work, and all classes have received recognition on the Executive Council

of the League, for it is from the homes of the people that the fountain of Justice must spring, and it is from the hearthstone of the nation that integrity and wisdom must flow. Every man should exercise his right and perform his duty as a citizen, for to fail to do so is little less than treason against government. Let no mind be intimidated nor reason overawed by the acts of public servants, for in this nation the people should rule.

Office holders are not divine. That question was settled by the Magna Charta, when the subjects of King John presented that document to him at Runnymede at the sword's point, and which historians say was "the keystone of English liberty." For the information of, as well as a warning to, some of our public officials, I want to direct attention to the sixth provision of the Magna Charta, which states that "Justice shall not be sold, delayed or denied any man;" and at the peril of being tried for treason and having to employ attorneys to defend me, who have specialized on compromising cases, I want to repeat that statement to the citizens of Texas today: JUSTICE SHALL NOT BE SOLD, DELAYED OR DENIED ANY MAN. If the serfs of these feudal Kings dared hand their rulers that advice on the point of a sword, certainly it is safe for a citizen to repeat it to present day office holders through the columns of the press. 32-c

CONSERVATION OF OIL AND MINERAL RESOURCES

DEPOSITS RAPIDLY BEING EXHAUSTED.

Oil Will Decide World Sea-Power.

Texas is great in her agricultural, forest and mineral resources, and especially in those products which furnish food, raiment, shelter and fuel for the people. Our agricultural production can be easily increased to meet our growing demands, but the forests are fast disappearing, and it will require a generation to reproduce them; and our mineral fuel at the present rate of production and consumption will be exhausted almost within a few decades, and it cannot be reproduced. The problem therefore of conserving our mineral resources is well upon us, and especially does this apply to petroleum, for it furnishes light, heat and power for the factory, the mine, the farm, the home, and transportation on land and sea, and it is an indispensable factor in the army and the navy. This question vitally affects the daily life of every citizen and every community and of government. All who have studied the question must realize that modern civilization is absolutely dependent for its very existence upon petroleum, or some unknown substitute yet to be discovered, and that its conservation and use for essential purposes under strict governmental supervision and control should be undertaken before our bountiful stores are seriously impaired or exhausted.

The production of the United States in 1914 was 280,000,000 barrels. Deposits considered as known or defined as estimated by the United States Geological Survey are given at not less than ten, or not over twenty-five billion barrels. Using the above estimate, without undertaking to consider its accuracy, or without taking into consideration the rapid increase in both production and consumption, it will be seen that we are rapidly exhausting this resource, and that even after substantially discounting the above figures known deposits will be exhausted in a comparatively few years. Other nations seem already to have awakened to the importance of this question, and are now striving to secure oil-producing territory, not only in other countries, but recently in the United States, where large holdings are now owned abroad and others are constantly being acquired. 33-c

BACK TO THE CONSTITUTION

COURTS HAVE CIVILIZATION BY THE THROAT.

Chairman of Economic League Charges Government With Tyranny.

As I see it, the courts have civilization by the throat today just as the churches had it a few centuries ago, which reached its climax with the Spanish Inquisition. Fortunately for the civilization of that day many religious leaders looked with alarm upon the clergy clad in robes of State, legally censoring divine rights of men, and who were authorized by law to deprive any person of their life, liberty or honor. The capable element of the clergy more than any other influence assisted in removing their high priests from the bench to the pulpit, and stopped the legal holocaust of human life that shames the pages of history.

Happily for our welfare today there are many good citizens who seriously doubt the wisdom of government making honest and necessary business transactions a crime, and many capable members of the legal profession who look with alarm upon a lawyer clothed with power of State having authority to legally lynch honest property or illegally protect criminal property. Such concentration of power was never contemplated under our form of government, and it is un-American, unwise and destructive to organized society. To force honest property to confess guilt, and permit criminal property to escape punishment, reverses the genius of American government.

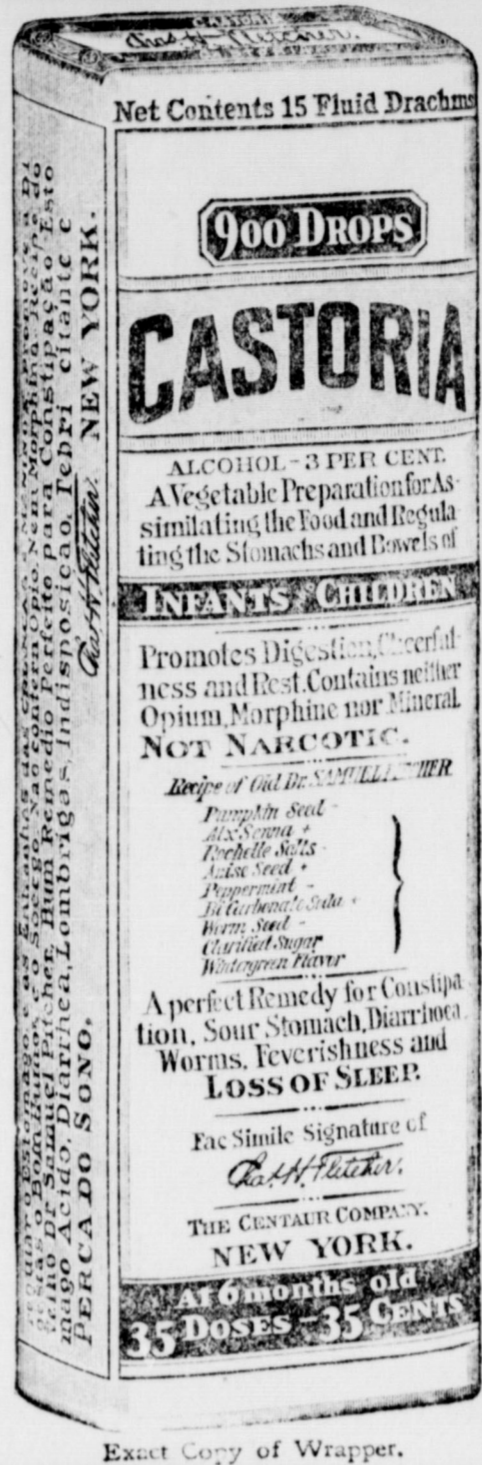
It is not the mission of the League to legally fix responsibility between the law and the Administration of the law, but the citizen has a contract with government for life, liberty and justice, and it is the right and the duty of the citizen to say when government crosses the border line and trespasses upon his Constitutional rights as they are not as public officials interpret them. The citizen—not the office holder—is the one to say when government violates its pledge to the people. In the name of the Texas Economic League I this day charge that government is guilty of tyranny, injustice, favoritism and incompetency in its relation to productive industry. We shall not at the moment undertake to separate responsibility as between the Legislative, Administrative and Judicial branches of government, but the man who leads a legal mob is a worse criminal than he who leads an illegal one, and deserves more severe punishment, no matter to what department of government he belongs. 37-c

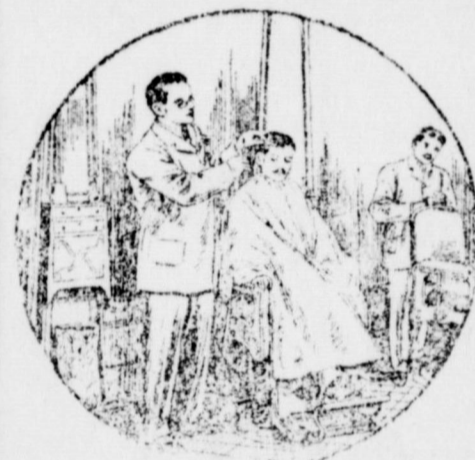
