Some Data In Regard to New M. E. Church

Carpenters Complete Their Work This Week--Dedication Sermon By Bishop Atkins About Oct. 10th

Carpenter work was finished this week on the new Methodist church, and nothing now remains towards its completion except the papering and some other inside work.

A member of the Reporter force this week in conversation with pastor Robeson, learned it was the pastor's intention and desire to have Rev. C. G. Rankin of Dallas, to be with the people here at the dedication of the church, which will be about Oct. 10th.; but owing to previous engagements the noted Texas evangelist and editor had made,

he will not be able to fill the date here; so under the prevailing circumstances Rev. Robeson has secured the service of Bishop James A. Atkins, who will preach the dedication sermon which will be as given above about October the 10th.

Results Of The Election Held Here Saturday

Constitutional Amendments Defeated In Odell Precinct

As a result of the election held over the state the 19th, the three constitutional amendments were defeated by an overwhelming majority.

In the Odell precinct out of a 133 votes polled, a majority of the voters was for their rejection.

The presiding officers in the election held in this precinct were: M. A. Smith and W. W. Matthews Presiding Judges, with E. M. Williams and P. C. Spears as clerks. Following is how the voters of this precinct voted on each amendment:

For the amendment of section 7, article 5, of the constitution of the state of Texas, relating to

District Judges and District Courts.

For such amendment 14

Against 116

For the adoption of section 58, article 16, as an amendment to the constitution, providing a salary compensation for certain officers.

For such amendment 15

Against 113

For amendment to section 49 and 52, article 3, of the constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas, A. and M. College, State Penitentiary System and other public improvements and building ware houses for agricultural products.

For such amendments 3

Against 127

All the constitutional amendments voted on by the voters of Texas last Saturday, were defeated by an overwhelming majority.

William J. Bryan is quoted as saying, that the fat check of \$1000, issued monthly by Uncle Sam is not sufficient to meet his expenses, and so under the his pressing financial circumstances, he is forced to go on his lecturing tours.

That the people of Texas are reading more, and giving more sober and unbiased thought than they formerly did, about the laws governing conditions in the state, was made evident by the manner in which they turned out and vote against the constitutional amendments last Saturday. While opinions widely differed as to the technical meaning of some of the constitutional clauses that were voted on, but being defeated by overwhelming majority in the state, shows the voters believed them to be detrimental laws to be enacted, and that their complicated meaning and bearing on the people were only technical traps for illiterate voters.
