### North Wilbarger County Singers to Meet Here

At Last Session of Odell Class Arrangements Were Made to Entertain Convention

At the Sunday evening session of Odell's singing class here last Sunday, besides their usual program, arrangements were made the entertainment of the North Wilbarger County Singers Convention which meets at Methodist Church next Saturday and Sunday following. It plans are carried out according to arrangements this coming session of the North Wilbarger Singers promises to be one of the most successful meetings they have ever held.

Prof. J. M. Reynolds leader of the Odell class, has recently received communications from three or four song publishing houses and each have promised that they would make special efforts to be represented in the convention with a quartette. Should the convention be so fortunate as to have these different quartettes with them, their different song renditions will be one of the special features of the convention.

In making arrangements for the convention here last Sunday evening, M. A. Smith President of the Odell class, appointed a committee whose duty it will be to see that the visitors are assigned homes on Saturday night those appointed to act on the committee are: W. T. Collins, C. W. Stults, C. E. Foster, and W. B. Beach.

A reception committee composed of three representatives of the Odell class was appointed whose duty it will be to meet the visitors that come in on the train and see that they are properly entertained.

After a consultation among the members of the class Sunday evening, it was unanimously voted that the noonday lunch be spread in one of the vacant buildings in the business part of town, which building is to be properly arranged with tables, and made convention in other ways.

The town of Odell acting through agency of Prof. J. M. Reynolds secured the convention that is to be held here Saturday and Sunday, and as there is a probability of there being a number of visitors on Saturday night from a distance, it is to be hoped that each separate home in the town and country will deem it their duty to act in help-

ing take care of the strangers. And here we will add, those of town who will help in providing homes for the visitors on Saturday night are requested to see one of the five committeemen named above and state just how many of the visitors, they can conveniently accommodate. As generally known in a convention of this kind, everybody is invited to attend and especially are they requested to come on Sunday and bring well filled baskets of eatables, for with a favorable day it is believed by many that the crowd will number into hundreds to be fed at the noon hour.

The first session of the convention will be called to order at the church promptly at two o'clock Saturday evening and at this meeting will be attended to the business transactions of the singers, who will also prepare a program for the night following.

### Pastor of Local Baptist Church Has Resigned

In a Letter to Rev. H. C. Mason He Sent in His Resignation—Church Open For Pastor

In a letter to Rev. H. C. Mason, Rev. E. Newton of Tolbert, recently sent his resignation as pastor of the Baptist church at this place; also resigning as pastor of the Red River Church east of here.

At conference of the church held here the latter part of August, Rev. Newton was called as pastor of this church another year, during which conference it was agreed he was to give the church half time, instead of only preaching once a month. His resignation was a surprise to

his many friends here, as a residence in Odell had recently been engaged for him and it was his intention to move here from Tolbert.

The church will meet in conference Saturday evening, and at this meeting all members are requested to be present as the church will act toward calling another pastor.

### Delays Orient Action

Judge Pollock Names Agent to Straighten Out Claims Before Deciding Who Owns Road

Kansas City, Oct. 31.— The question of ownership of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway cannot be settled and the reorganization of the company completed until the conflicting claims of the bondholders and the construction companies engaged in finishing the road are straightened out. This decision was made today by Judge John C. Pollock of the federal court in Kansas City, Kan. Judge Pollock appointed Clifford Histed of Kansas City, Mo., special examiner to investigate and submit proofs of the claims of bondholders and construction companies.

The Orient company went into the hands of receivers in March 1912. The federal court appointed separate sets of receivers for the company's properties in Missouri and Kansas in Texas and Oklahoma and in Mexico.

In all eleven receivers have charge of the property. About 800 miles of the road is in process of construction. Judge Pollock last June began an effort to settle claims against the road in order that the property might be sold, the company reorganized, or the receivership otherwise lifted.

Now that the people of Odell has ask that the next session of the North Wilbarger Singers to be held at this place, it will be expected of them that the doors of their homes be thrown open in a response of welcome to the coming visitors Saturday night, and that each and every one here consider themselves a member of the entertaining committee and do his or her part in making the visitors stay a pleasant one while in our town.

The ideas of some of Odell's business men and farmers of the country in regard to the establishing of a creamery station here are encouraging. A number are of the opinion that would be an enterprise which if looked after properly, that it would not only help the town, but would be a great advantage to the farmers. We can all remember there are times with us here in the spring and summer season of the year, when the

supply of butter brought in from the country is far greater than the town's demand, and with such conditions it works a hardship on the farmer, as well as putting the merchant in an embarrassing situation who feels under obligations to some extent to buy. With a creamery station of the kind our County Farm Demonstrator proposes to establish here, the people of the country who have cream to sell would find the creamery station a great help to them, as they would not only be assured of a market for all the cream they had to sell, but could be disposed of at a better price than when made into butter. Considering the shortage of crops this year, of course the cream industry could not be relied on to much advantage, until the next spring and summer; but the object now is to get enough of the people interested in the project, to justify the establishment of a creamery station here and maybe later it would prove of great advantage to Odell.

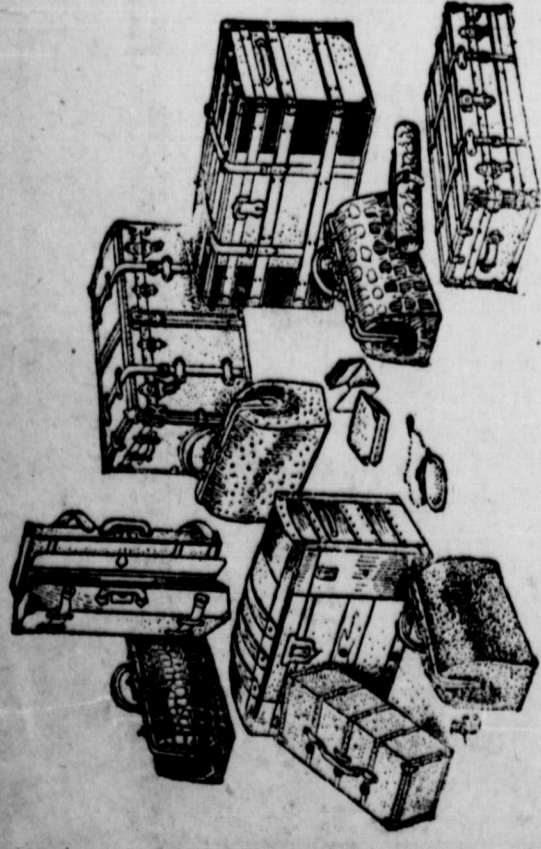

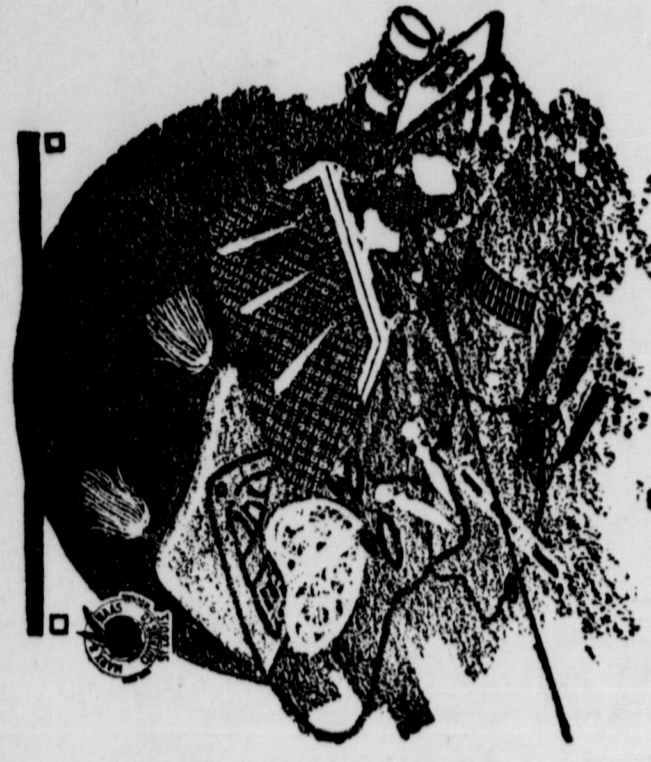

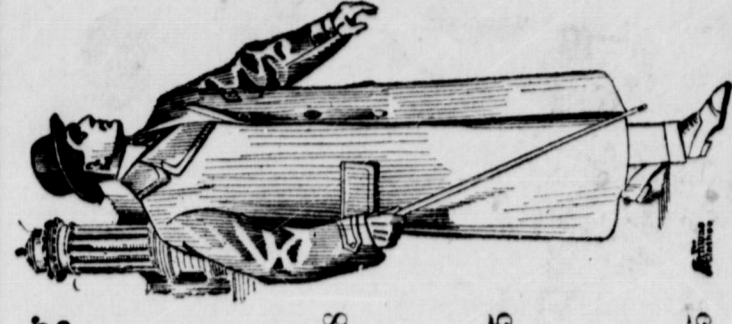
