## Odell Not on a Building Boom, But is Growing

Only a Few Days Will Pass  
Until 3 New Residences  
Will Be Going Up

Odell is not on building boom. Yet she is gradually spreading out in way of residence houses. The demand for homes by those who desire to reside in our little city has put the contractors to figuring here lately. And at present if one will listen attentively some clear still day, the hammer can be heard building a neat little cottage for Mrs. L. E. Britton in the southwest part of the city which she is having built for rent purpose.

In the same locality only a few days will elapse until another house will be going up in that part of town. Ed Sanders, whom it seems has a life-time guarantee of a job at one of the local gins, is arranging to build. He has bought his lots, closed a deal with the local yard for his lumber, and from now on he and his family can be counted on as permanent citizens in one of the best towns of its size on the Orient.

Then in the southeast part of town on the same street Mrs. L. E. Britton is building, contractors are figuring on a house for L. Blackerdy, as he informed us this week that it would only be a few days until builders would be erecting a residence for him.

So with three new residences going up in our town at one time, with bright prospects ahead for a good cotton crop, if all these things will be taken into consideration by those away here, it seems to the Reporter that it ought to be sufficient evidence to convince them, that Odell is not going backward, but gradually pushing its way to the front.

Don't discourage the builders. But let the constructing work go on. For if we have been correctly informed this has been the first summer in the history of Odell, that there has not been several houses standing vacant during the warm days. Then if that be the case, will not houses for cotton pickers, some for a portion of gin crew and other laborers be in demand this fall. Visitors to and from this place say, the people in this section of the country should be thankful. Our crops they tell us are far superior to any they have found away from here.

Practically all of Odell's trade territory was favored with a good rain Saturday evening. And since the precipitation, both farmers and local business men have raised their calculations as to the number of bales of the fleecy staple that will be ginned here this fall. Of course the cotton crop in this country is not made and to make any prediction at this date, would be to gamble with the future, but with all this, without some disastrous happening in the way of a hail or windstorm, the Reporter cannot help but look forward to a big cotton crop this season. It seems that this locality has been favored with more rain this summer than some other portions of Wilbarger County. And according to statements made by different ones who have been traveling over this county, our crops show Jupiter Pluvius has been a little bit better to us during the last two months or more than he has some our neighbors. Farmers all say this last rain meant the saving of many acres of feed stuff around Odell. So with a fairly good corn crop all ready made and with good indications of cotton selling at 14 cents this fall, with its seed ranging in price from \$30 to \$40 a ton, all these things taken into consideration with the fact that O. B. Colquitt will be the next United

Senator from Texas (?), accounts for the smiles you see on some of farmers faces.

**The Battle is On**

Hons. Charles A. Culberson and Oscar B. Colquitt are candidates for United States Senator. Both are citizens of Dallas and are loyal Democrats. Both are anti-prohibitionists. There is really no issue between them. Culberson is staying at his post in Washington. Colquitt is making speeches to Texas audiences in the interest of his candidacy. But Culberson men are working. The run off primary is to be held on the twenty-sixth of this month. On that day the voters of Texas will name the man who is to represent us in the upper house of Congress for the next six years. Every voter, no matter whether he is a Culberson man or a Colquitt man, should go to the polls on that day and vote. The election of United States Senator is a most important matter. It is especially so at this time. Not only is a terrible war raging in Europe that is giving rise to many perplexing problems, but grave domestic troubles also are now engaging the attention of our national legislators.

Congress is now in session. Matters of grave importance are being dealt with. Every congress man is needed at his post. This makes it impossible, in most cases, for senators and representatives, who are candidates to succeed themselves, to come home and do campaign work.

Barry Miller is Culberson's campaign manager in Texas. In a recent public statement he said Culberson was needed at Washington and would not come to Texas to make any campaign speeches if congress remained in session. But it now seems certain that Congress will not adjourn until after the primary. We therefore, need not to look for Culberson. J. R. Huie, one of our local business men, is just in receipt of a letter from him. Letter is as follows:

Washington D. C.

August 2, 1916.

Mr. J. R. Huie,

Odell, Texas.

My Dear Sir:

It gratified me to receive your lettea of the 26th ultimo and I want you to be assured of my sincere appreciation of your generous support.

As it is almost certain that Congress will be in session until after the primary, it will be impossible for me to come to Texas as you suggest.

Truly your friend,

C. A. Culberson.

The contest is squarely up to the sovereign voters of Texas. They are to choose between two men of whom our State is justly proud. Colquitt has long cherished an ambition to go to the United States Senate. He has been state senator, railroad commissioner and governor. He served the people in these stations with zeal and fidelity. He signed the nine-thirty closing law and focused the eyes of the world on the horrible state of affairs existing along the Mexican border.

Culberson has been in the national senate eighteen years. Before his election to this place, he had held offices of attorney-general and governor in this state.

He has served the people in these capacities with credit to himself and honor to his country. He is a son of David B. Culberson, who for twenty-six years, represented a Texas district in the lower house of the national congress. He is now recognized as the ablest constitutional lawyer in the United States Senate. He has membership on the most important committees in congress. Because of his masterful ability and wide knowledge of the multitude of things which come under governmental control, he has been elevated to the chairmanship of the Finance Committee and of the Judiciary Committee. To the latter committee belong such distinguished men as Senators Cummins of Iowa, Borah of Idaho, Hoke Smith of Georgia, Dillingham of Vermont and O'Garman of New York. Only men of keen intellect and conspicuous ability are placed at the head of our most important congressional committees. Texas has thus far been fortunate in having men in congress of this caliber. Joseph Weldon Bailey, one of America's greatest orators and statesmen, received the greatest senatorial honors that could be conferred. Culberson is now likewise being honored. Both these gentlemen are worthy exponents of Jefferson and Jackson Democracy. They ignore and combat the radicalism of the present day. They refuse to embrace the diabolical fads and isms that are being taught by some of our latter day politicians. The wish to keep alive the life that Jefferson and Jackson and Clay and Calhoun breathed into the nostrils of a pure and undefiled Democracy. Men of this type are the kind that Texas has always honored and the custom will not be changed, for Texas Democracy is the same as that of the men who wrote the American Declaration of Independence and the federal constitution—the men who were the founders of this Republic.

Texas should not forget the primary this month. Let the world see a larger vote put on record than was registered last month. Let the Democracy of Texas speak in thunderous tone. Colquitt led his opponents in the recent primary by 30,000 votes. But Brooks is not a candidate; Campbell is not a candidate; Henry is not a candidate; and last but not the greatest, Davis is not a candidate. But the votes they received are to go to Culberson or Colquitt. The battle is on. The smoke is already visible. Let all Texans get on the firing line.

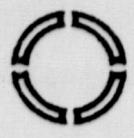

**A SNARE AND DELUSION**

Justice and Not Success Should Be Ideal of Lawyer.

The "Administration of Justice" is a misnomer. There is no such thing. It is a snare and a delusion. We have an administration of the forms and methods of procedure, of the rules of evidence and of the technicalities of the law, an administration of the law. It is more important under this system that the rules and forms of procedure be observed than justice be attained.

In practically one-half of the cases one side or the other does not want justice. Their effort is to obstruct, delay or defeat justice. This is legitimate practice and the rules of procedure are admirably adapted to that end.

It is the duty of the lawyer to serve his client. He is hired by his client to win, and it is up to him to do it, whether right or wrong. The lawyer strives for success and not justice. Success obtained through his superior knowledge of law and practice, or tact of management is legal justice. When success culminates in a judgment of the court of final resort, it is then sanctified justice that must not be questioned, and a precedent that must be afterwards followed.

The lawyer does not want the truth unless it favors his side of the case. He seeks to suppress or distort all truth unfavorable to his client by invoking the rules of evidence, by brow-beating witnesses, by playing on the prejudices and emotions of the jurors.

It is ethical for the lawyer to take any sort of case, provided the fee is satisfactory. The harder the case, i. e., the less justice there is to it, the more fee he charges and the more service is expected of him. The fault is not in the individual lawyer; it is in the nature of his employment and the ethics and rules of practice of his profession. I am not attacking the lawyer as a man. He will average up in character with other men, and in intelligence above them. But I am assailing a lawyer system and a judicial system that has proven itself inadequate to meet modern conditions, that contains by reason of its reverence for precedent much ancient and precivilization law, and that has grown so cumbersome, expensive and technical as to defeat the very end for which it was organized and is being maintained. I am trying to call attention to the fundamental causes that have brought the "administration of justice" into disrepute; that cause men to suffer injustice, rather than submit to the arbitrament of the courts and that provoke mob law, in order that the remedy may be more clearly seen.

Nothing short of the removal of the causes will effect a reform of any value. There will be no material improvement so long as the lawyer is employed by the client to promote his selfish ends and is responsible to him alone; and so long as the courts give more attention to the technicalities of practice and procedure than the justice of the case. If the lawyer is employed by the County or State to serve all men alike and to promote justice among them, most of the abuses of our present system, including its technical practice, will be corrected.

I suggest that the various counties, through their commissioners' court, or some other tribunal, license and employ at the county's expense all lawyers of the county whose duty it will be to serve every one alike without compensation; that the courts be empowered on application to appoint lawyers to bring and defend suits and defend criminals, and to fix and tax as costs an attorney's fee to be collected by the county for the payment of lawyers' salaries; that lawyers be prohibited under severe penalties from accepting any sort of compensation from clients; and that candidacy for office shall ipso facto and forever forfeit the license to practice. Make the oath of office and the professional ideal of the lawyer, justice for his client and not success.
