## New Banking In- stitution To Open Business In Odell

A State Bank Which Includes As Stock-  
holders and Directors a Number of  
The Country's Most Wealthy  
and Influential Citizens

That another bank will be ready to do business in Odell this fall is now almost an assured fact, only the arrival of a charter from Austin, granting permission for a State Bank to open up for business here, hinders the Reporter from making a guaranteed statement.

The new institution is to start business on a \$11,000 capital, some of the stockholders contributing to this amount being among the most wealthy and influential citizens in the Odell country.

It was first thought by those most interested in the new bank, that \$10,000, would be its capital stock, but so anxious were so many good men in the country, to own an interest in the new concern, its capital was

elected a man well suited to serve them:

"F. P. McGhee is perhaps personally as well known as any other gentleman in this county, having been a resident here for the last thirty years. He has practiced law successfully before the different courts of the state and the court report show that he secured as many opinions in his favor as any other attorney at the bar here. made \$11,000. And in order that its capital might be limited to that amount and to include all those who wanted to own stock, some few of the stockholders were forced to take a smaller share, as in all about \$13,900 was offered. Thirty stockholders will own an interest in the bank.

A number interested in the institution, met Wednesday evening, to organize elect their officers and suggest a name for the bank. And by an agreement among them, "The Farmers State Bank of Odell," was suggested as a suitable name. J. P. Hamilton was made president of the bank, J. F. Mayfield 1st. Vice President; C. D. Shelton, 2nd. Vice President; and R. N. Coffey cashier.

Nine directors were elected which include: P. H. Bingham, C. D. Shelton, M. A. Smith, J. A. Jones, W. A. Webb, J. G. Ayers, W. J. Johnston, R. N. Coffey and A. C. Daniel.

Just whether a new home will be built for the organization, or a building will be rented for its location, has not yet been decided by the bank members. But a committee consisting of M. A. Smith, J. A. Jones and R. N. Coffey have been appointed to look after this matter and a decision will be known in a few days. R. N. Coffey was also appointed as a committee of one to attend to the buying of bank fixtures, stationery and other necessary equipments for a bank. It is the belief of the members of the new bank, without some unlooked for delayment, that they will be ready to do business by the first of September and in order that its doors might be open by that time, no efforts will be spared.

The cashier, Mr. Coffey, is an experienced banker, who for a number of years was engaged in the banking business at Cason, Texas, and lately at Pueblo, Colorado. He comes to this place, bringing with him papers from different business institutions, which highly recommend him as a man of business qualities, and a good citizen. It is his intention to move his wife and children from Pueblo, Colo., to Odell some time soon.

The opening up of this new banking institution will give Odell two first class banks, whose financial strength combined means a great help to Odell and the surrounding country.

After President Wilson issued his last "bluff" for Mexico to think over, which came from Washington in the form of an Ultimatum, notifying Mexicans what Uncle Sam would do, if they didn't do so and so and when old Huerta it seemed was almost crowed to the wall by Villa and follows awhile back; lots of people drew a sigh of relief about that time and believed trouble in Mexico would soon be ended and that peace again would reign in that country. But such will not be the case for some time yet, and if ever, as a cause for more trouble has taken place. The jealous eye of Carranza is not approving of the actions of Pancho Villa and each day the friendship between the two Constitutionalists is getting colder and looks like might lead to new trouble.

Now, if a candidate has to draw a conclusion, about what he has really got to do, from the advice of these two popular papers, he will find himself in the middle of a bad fix, as it's a cinch he can't carry out the advice of both them. The Reporter's advice to a candidate would be for him to do what he thought would work to his own interest, as some people like to be bothered from their work while others don't,—so there you are.

From all sections of the country comes the cry for laborers on the farm; from all the cities comes the cry of the unemployed for work. There is no need for any man, woman or child in the United States to be out of employment for a single minute if they do not want to be. The trouble with most of the unemployed is that they are not looking for any work that is more strenuous than raising a howl against conditions. The Signal commends to all those who are out of employment the example of the young man who had a position in Mexico before the war in that country. When the war came he was forced out of his job which paid him 3,000. He refuged to this country and finally landed in Austin. He was a high class man and made the rounds looking for this kind of work—which was natural since he felt that he was best suited for it. But when he could not find the work he wanted he ask for and received a job handling a pick and shovel. Again we say that if the unemployed want work they can get it' even as this young fellow did. It was not what he wanted, but it enabled him to live and retain his self respect. This action on his part will be remembored and when opportunity admits he will be given the kind of position he sought.—Honey Grove Signal.

**Light That Is Lost in Space.**  
 If one compares the known nebulae in groups according to the dimensions of their apparent diameters and one also notes their intrinsic brightness, it is clear that their apparent diameters should decrease as the distance increases. Their brightness, on the other hand, will diminish with increasing distance only if interstellar space absorbs light.  
 As the result of a great number of observations a correlation between brightness and apparent diameter has been observed, and is so marked that it is impossible to put it down to chance or to some systematic error. It appears that there is a real absorption in space, and if more precise descriptions of the nebulae were available the law of absorption could be assigned.

**Tells Time By Tasting the Hours.**  
 A curious "gastronomic clock" for telling the time in the dark is said to have been made in the old times by an ingenious Frenchman. He installed a large flat clock dial beside the bed, on which the hours each had a small cavity.  
 In each one he placed a different spice. For instance, the figure 12 held unique and the figure six cloves, and so on.  
 To find the time he followed the short hand with the finger and then tasted the contents of the cavity opposite, then did the same for the long hand, and had he tasted pepper and nutmeg, for instance, he knew that the hour was 3:30.

**Texas News Condensed**  
 State Happening and Industrial Notes of Texas

**Echo**—work upon a \$35,000 cotton seed oil mill, to care for production in this section has begun.

**Belton**—Contract for the erection of a modern school building to cost \$29,545 was awarded this week to a Fort Worth contractor.

**Cleburne**—According to census takers, who have just completed their work of enumeration, there are 3,100 scholastics in this city. This shows a population of approximately 17,050.

**Denison, Tex. June**—The local Katy shops, which have been idle since January 16, have been reopened and about 800 men have been placed at work. This action is caused by the Texas crop that must shortly be moved.

**Fort Worth, Tex. June**—H. B. Dorsey, Secretary of the Texas Grain Dealers' Association, predicts that the Texas wheat crop will be from 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 bushels this year.

**College Station, Tex.**—As part of the extension work, short agricultural courses will be given the farmers this summer at a number of places over the state. The first of these courses has just closed ended at Nueces.

**Quanah, Tex. June**—Harvesting of wheat in this section is in progress day and night. So great is the demand for machinery that binders are being shipped here by express. Blacksmiths are forced to work almost twenty-four hours a day sharpening and repairing farm implements. The grain is turning out unusually well.

**Hillsboro, Tex. June**—Individual contract system being employed, concentrated movement to pave the entire town was begun here this morning. The city, on account of insufficient funds in the municipal treasury, will take care of only the inter-

sections. The property owners on each side of the street will pay for one-half of the permanent paving.

**Wichita Falls Tex. June**—The first race meet of the Texas Short Ship Circuit will be held here June 23-26. Over 175 horses have been booked with entries from twelve different states. The other towns on the circuit are: Clarendon, Childress, Quanah, Mart, Marlin, Corsicana, Hillsboro, Weatherford, Mineral Wells, Bonham, Paris, Clarksville, Tyler, Dallas and Pittsburg.

**ROAD BUILDING.**

Of this amount \$4,000,000 is raised by bond issue and \$3,500,000 by taxation. We spend on an average of \$2.00 per annum per capita on our roads and the average in the United States is \$1.55. We have four per cent of our public highways classed as "improved" and the average in the United States is nine per cent.

There is no better investment than money intelligently spent on public highways and every dollar invested in road improvement adds three times its value to adjoining

property and every argument that applies to the improvement of private property will apply with multiplied force to the improvement of public property, and especially to public highways, as every farmer must use the roads.

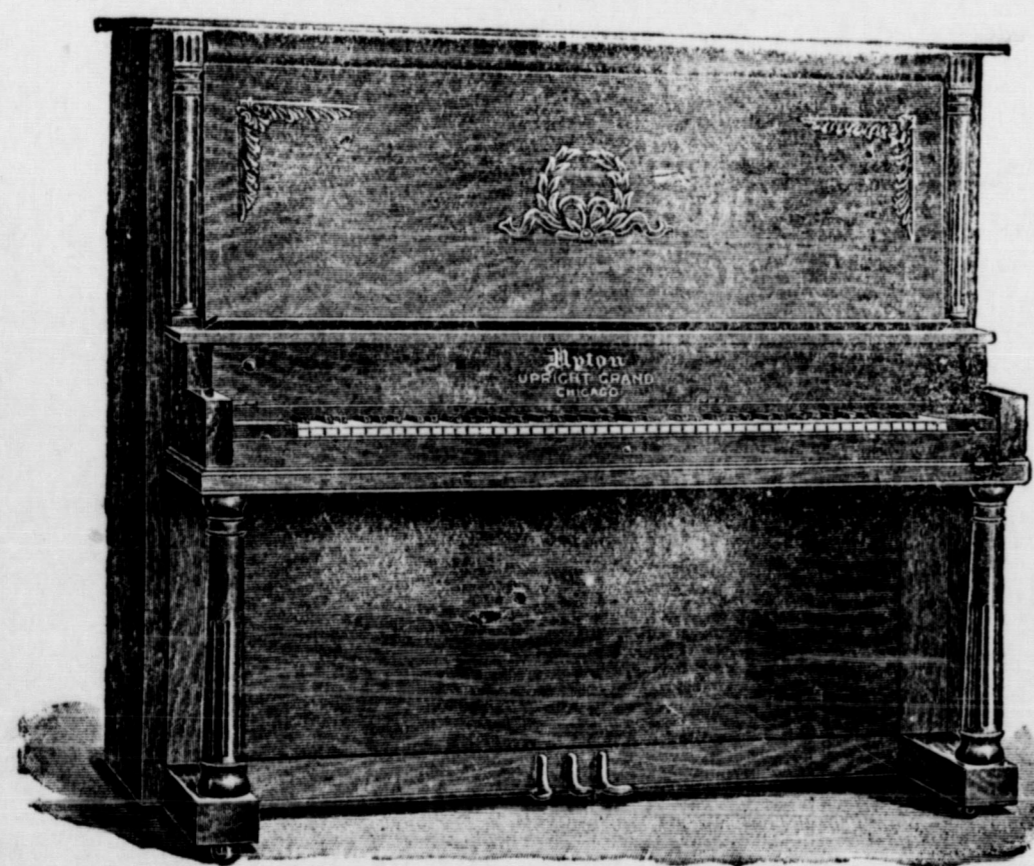
