Willis Vaughn Announces For Commissioner

Out on Same Platform Used Two Years Ago When a Candidate

The latest aspirant for commissioner of this precinct is Willis Vaughn, a well known citizen of the Tolbert vicinity, who was in the race for the office two years ago. His candidacy to be subject to the action of the Democratic Primary July 22nd.

It was not Mr. Vaughn's intention to be a candidate in the field this year, he informed us. And in fact, said, he told some of his solicitors that he would not enter the race. But as he continued to receive strong solicitations from various voters over the precinct, he changed his mind in regard to the matter and entered the race on the same platform he announced with two years ago.

His platform regarding road working in this:

"Work most public roads first. Work rural routes next. Then give attention to cross roads. Give those living on road preference when having work done, other matters being equal. Do all work by contract as far as possible."

Mr. Vaughn's platform in regard to the attention of roads is a logical one, and contains some strong points that should interest the voters. And as to his qualification and ability to fill the office he asks to be elected to. The Reporter deems it would be useless for it to dwell upon that matter, as the good vote accorded him two years ago when he was a candidate, well shows there are a number of voters in the precinct, who believe Mr. Vaughn capable of making the county a good commissioner. So in this respect, the Reporter's request of the voters is, that Mr. Vaughn be remembered and be given careful consideration at election time.

Another Brick Building to be Built in Odell

Local Druggist Will Probably Begin Erection of Brick in April

All loyal citizens of our little city, who are always pleased to see brick business houses take the place of wooden structures in the town; are glad to learn that it is the intention of one of our local druggist to begin at an early date, the erection of a modern brick for his business.

The druggist referred to, is Z. M. Wilson, who if plans materialize, will begin sometime the last of next month or the first of April to erect a building on the lots adjoining the one where his drug building is now located.

The building Mr. Wilson says, will be a modern brick 25x80 ft. Will have plate glass front and arranged in other ways for a nice front appearance. The interior will be divided into three compartments. The main room will be used by Mr. Wilson for his drug stock and other line of goods, while the two small rooms in the rear end, will be the offices of physician and dentist. Dr. B. A. Harris, to occupy one of the offices and the other to be turned over to Dr. T. T. Towles, the new dentist here.

Next Session to be a Good Road Meeting--Program Given

The Community League of Wilbarger County, met with the Plainview people at their school house last Friday night. Several of the neighborhoods included in the League, were well represented and the meeting proved to be an interesting one in every respect.

While several numbers that were assigned a subject on the program, were not present, the time was equally divided by those who were.

The discussions generally were along the line of war and many interesting as well as instructive points were brought out by the speakers. J. R. Huie, made an interesting talk on the "Essential Features of the Presidents' Plan of Preparedness, which was followed by a discussion by Prof. Everett E. Eldridge, on "the Causes of the European War." "The European War and Its Effect on us", was discussed by Prof. Thornton of the Jackson Spring school "Problems of Enduring Peace" the views of an eminent writer, from a London Magazine, was read by Willie Mason. Joe Crownover entertained the audience for several minutes, with a recitation entitled, "Peter Sorghum, in Love."

The next meeting of the League will take place here, which is dated to be held at the local auditorium Friday evening February 25th. This next session is to be a good road meeting and many difficult problems regarding attention of our roads will no doubt be brought out by those who have been assigned topics for discussion.

Odell is sorely in need of rent houses. We still hear of some one in town almost every week, making inquiry about a house to rent.

Watch the announcement column of the Reporter. The candidates whose names appear in this paper, realize Odell is 249 strong with votes and patronize your home paper.

Citizens of Odell and this immediate country who always have considerable amount of grain to market at Odell, should begin early to encourage some concern to build an elevator here before the summer days. If there was an elevator in the town more of the small grain that is grown in the country would be marketed here, than there usually is.

Odell has not near reached its growth. It will be only a matter of a few weeks until another brick business house will be under construction on main street. Then a contract has been closed for the erection of a new residence in the town, so taking all things into consideration the year promises to be one of much building activity for our little city. Odell is not "grown." It is neither eighteen nor twenty-one years old.

The Reporter has no stones to throw at the county candidates who do not consider it worth while to do any advertising in this part of the county, in the way of an announcement—that's their business. But there is an

election day coming, and we are afraid they will realize when it is too late, that they practiced a poor policy in turning all their patronage to just one paper in the county. Odell boasts of 249 qualified voters and the Reporter is their home paper.

There is little or no excuse for people in Odell to go away from home to buy what they eat and wear, to say nothing about the many other things they necessarily need that is sold by Odell merchants. The goods sold here as well as in some of the neighborhood towns, are all bought of the wholesale houses, which in some cases are located in some of the far off cities. The freight rate for distribution is practically the same to all the merchants alike. Rent, insurance, clerk hire and other expenses are no higher in Odell than some of the neighboring places, and for this reason, in a number of cases, they can sell goods just as cheap as their out of town competitors. The trouble with a number of our people, they do not investigate the price before they buy. And are often misled by the statement, "larger town for cheaper goods"

There are a number of business houses in Odell that ought to be carrying an ad. in the Reporter. The Reporter would boost these business houses just as quick, and with as much sincerity, as it would its regular advertisers. It has no pets. The Reporter stands for the upbuilding of the town and county, and has frequently made the assertion that its columns were open to anyone, anywhere, who had an idea to advance for its betterment. The day is done passed, when any business man can hope to reap any big share of the public trade without advertising. Competition is now too strong. Publicity is the business man's traveling salesman these days. By advertising he keeps his name and business before the people and is constantly talking to them in a way, for a share of their trade. Why not advertise in the Reporter.

Despite the fact that lots of people still believe that William J. Bryan still has an eye on the President's seat in the White House and that some day his fondest hope will be realized; there is one young man in the United States, who doesn't believe it will ever be Bryan's privilege to rule the people. In 1896 when Bryan was conducting his free silver campaign, a son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Lee Wise in Missouri. The proud father was a staunch disciple of the Commoner, and christened his young son William Jennings Bryan, and made a vow that the boy's hair would never be cut until Bryan was elected President. The lad revered the vow of his father, until his 20 h

birthday. But being a Missourian he naturally demanded to be showed, wherein his name sake had any chance of being elected. And as his father and no else could produce any proof. He disregarded his daddy's vow and patronized the barber.

The people of this country are giving more attention to the raising of poultry than they did a few years back. It was not many years ago, when it was considered that just enough hens on a farm to raise a few fryers and supply the family table with eggs was about all the chickens necessary on a place. But at last the hen is beginning to be reckoned as a very valuable fowl on a farm. It is no longer argued that she wastes more than she produces. But on the other hand if she is given the proper attention her brood and eggs will pay a good dividend in a year's time. Mrs. J. D. Yeldell, a lady of near Elmer Oklahoma, we learn, realized over three hundred dollars from her poultry yard, during the year just past. Our neighbors just across the river from us, we have been told, raise chickens on a more extensive scale than the people of this country do. Why is it? It can't be because they have any advantage over us in the way of climate, more feed and other things, because there is just a river between us. Three hundred dollars from a poultry yard in connection with eleven cent cotton sounds mighty good to us. And there are lots of people who do not consider it any trouble to raise chickens—but a pleasure.

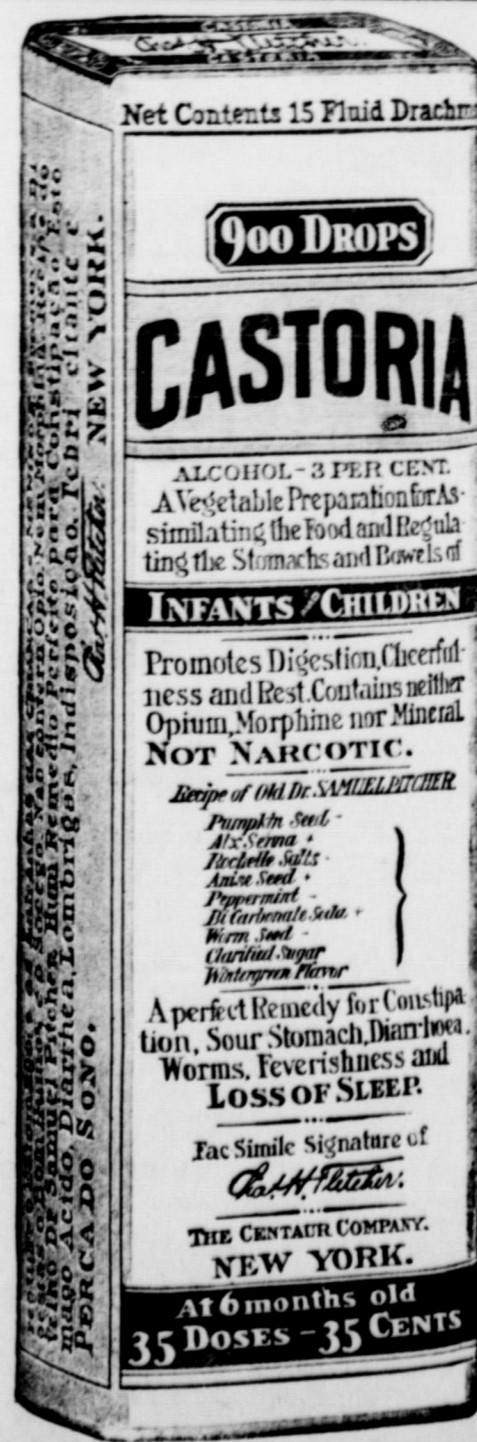

OUR PUBLIC FORUM

J. S. Cullinan
ON CITIZENSHIP.



The Texas Economic League invites the people of Texas into a discussion of citizenship, but before we can intelligently study so important a subject we must first define it. What is citizenship? Who is the best American citizen? Search the statute books for a definition of citizenship and unless one is a member of the legal profession we immediately become entangled in a labyrinth of confusing and oftentimes contradictory laws seeking to promote or restrain most every form of human activity, much of them good, some of them bad and others indifferent. But laws come and go; the Constitution is permanent. The preamble of our Federal Constitution states that our government is organized to give its citizens liberty and happiness. Read the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States and one cannot escape the conclusion that the best American citizen is he who is most free, patriotic, just, happy and active and who hands down to posterity a civilization more capable than he found it. The spirit of our country is freedom and no man can become a true American citizen unless he is free.

Turning a moment from documents of State perhaps the best authority on citizenship, and one universally accepted by the public, is Webster's International Dictionary, which defines a citizen as 'A member of a State; a person, native or naturalized, of either sex who owes allegiance to government and is entitled to reciprocal protection from it.' Further, 'A citizen as such is entitled to the protection of life, liberty and property at home and abroad.'

We now have before us the authoritative definition of citizenship by both government and society and in order that the most humble citizen may feel perfectly free to enter into a study and discussion of this subject, I will briefly outline my conception of what citizenship involves, for the work of the Texas Economic League will be in vain if the most lowly citizen does not feel free to give serious thought and expression to his obligation to government and his responsibility to his fellow men.

Applied to able-bodied adult males, with which I take it we will have chiefly to do, a citizen's duty, in return for the rights, privilege and protection outlined above, would seem to be: First, to expend sufficient labor in production, or auxiliary occupations, viz., manufacture, transportation and distribution, to support himself and his family in comfort. Second, conform to all laws framed in the interest of society under the Constitution. Third, contribute his just proportion to the maintenance of government in personal time, payment of taxes or, if need be, bearing arms in the defense of the nation.

In reaching the above conclusions I have assumed that under our system of government citizens are owners in common and are entitled to the rights and benefits of government during the term of their natural lives and for such period only.
