## Maple Hill Citizen Died Thurs. at Mineral Wells

### Remains of S. Humphrys Interred at Pleasant Valley Cemetery Sunday

This week it becomes our sad duty to chronicle the death of S. Humphrys, one of the well known citizens of the Maple Hill locality who died last Thursday April 26 at Mineral Wells, after spending eight days at that place for his health. Something near three months ago he was stricken with a bad attack of pneumonia and never regained his strength, however, it was believed by his loved ones and friends until a short while back, that his health had returned to such a state that he was out of danger.

The passing away of this good man leaves a vacancy in his community that will be hard to fill. He proved himself to be a good neighbor to his neighbors. A dutiful citizen for the country. And a consecrated Christian. When but 17 years of age associating himself with the Primitive Baptist Church. He leaves a wife and five children behind him. Two of the eldest children being married, who are S. E. Humphrys and Mrs. Manford Flowers.

The remains were shipped back here for interment and was laid to rest Sunday morning at the Pleasant Valley Cemetery. Funeral services being conducted by Elder A. B. Hughes.

## Found Dead in His Bed at Home Saturday Morn.

### Direct Cause of Death of J. L. Horn Appears to Be Uncertain

J. L. Horn, who with his wife and one child moved to this country last year from Mississippi locating in Plainview settlement, was found dead in his bed at home Saturday morning.

At this time there appears to be some uncertainty as to the cause of his death. The supposition of a number of people being that he met death by means of poison, self administered. Others holding the belief that death of deceased was due to heart failure, as he was subject to trouble with his heart.

One of the reasons that some are of the opinion he was poisoned, was because a small vial containing strychnine was known to be in the pockets of a pair of pants that deceased had worn the day before he died. The strychnine was bought here in Odell on Friday from a local druggist by Mr. Horn, who claimed that he wanted it to poison polecats.

Mr. Horn was a resident on what is generally known as the J. G. Bryant place. He had planned the day before he died to go to Coilicothe the next day with G. W. Privett, who is also a tenant on the same place.

Deceased carried insurance on his life to the amount of \$4,000. Three thousand of the amount being with the Illinois Bankers Life Insurance Company and the other thousand, we are told with the Woodmen Order. The body was shipped back to Mississippi for interment being accompanied by Mrs. Horn and child.

It appears that Theodore Roosevelt has no patience with the slacker since this country has become involved in the great war, which is now virtually a worldwide one. He wants him to either arm or farm.

Since we are told those in this county who advocated the voting of a bond of one million dollars to build roads with, will, just as soon as conditions over the country are normal again, revive the question and force an election; it seems to the Reporter it stands for the voter who bitterly opposed bond issue at first on the ground that it was too large a debt for county, to not lose an interest, but to continue along to put in a word against it. In other words, while the fellow who favors the bond issue is going about advertising its good features, the man who is against it, should follow him and tell about the bad features it will work. Are more so, while the bond issue advocate is boosting the question, if you are against it, continue to knock it.

Farmers over different sections of the country are being told by almost every newspaper that goes into their homes, and some even by private letters from Agricultural Departments, to plant largely of foodstuffs and think less about cotton. While advice of the kind may have its effect with some. But these advisers at their desk with a typewriter, should remember that a big per-

cent of the men who till the soil, especially those in the South, are renters, and numbers of them signed agreements at the beginning of the year to plant a big acreage in cotton; being compelled to submit to a contract of the kind in many cases, in order to secure a home for their families. So how can a man in that shape do anything, unless his landlord is worked on first? More than that, this newspaper has always contended that the farmers are getting to be the best posted people we have got. Numbers of them read their daily newspapers and agricultural journals. They realize the country is facing a food shortage and also know from experience what crops under climatic conditions are best suited for farm they cultivate. So why so much free advice for them?

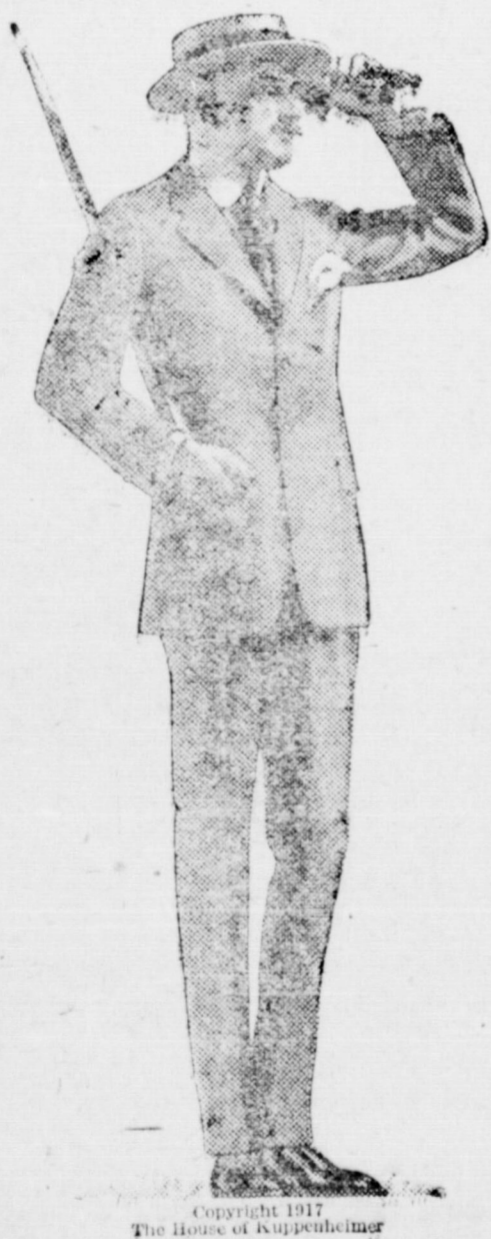

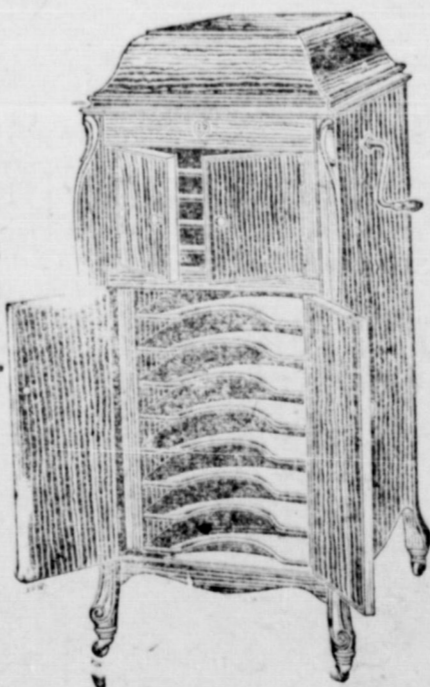

10:45 A. M., April 29 1917,  
J. D. Key, Sheriff,  
Wilbarger County.

"Ac in under directions of the President, I request that you at once get in communication with County Judges, Clerks, County Physicians, and Presiding Judges of the various voting precincts of your County and hold them in readiness for the next ten days, within which time I will further communicate to you directions from the President for the quick enrollment of all men of military age under act of congress just passed. Where office of Presiding Judge is vacant arrange at once to fill place. Please acknowledge receipt by wire of this message."
