Cholera Among Hogs, Reported to be Increasing

Farm Demonstrator Means, Makes Several Visits Here Lately to Treat Swine

County Farm Demonstrator, H. M. Means, of Vernon, has made several trips in this section of the County in the last few days, inspecting different herds of hogs and treating a number for Cholera. He reports a number of herds in this neighborhood to be infected with the disease. And says, since the disease is contagious, farmers whose hogs have not already shown symptoms of cholera should use every precaution to prevent its reaching them.

Mr. Means was a caller here at the Reporter office last Thursday and left with us for publication a treatment for the disease called a Hog Cholera Serum. The Serum costs one and one fourth cents per cubic centimeter and can be ordered from veterinary department of the A. and M. College at College Station, Texas.

The serum in doses according to the weight of a hog can be ordered and given as follows:

Pigs up to 20 lbs,	dose 10 cc
20 lbs to 50 lbs,	dose 20 cc
50 " to 100 "	" 30 cc
100 " to 150 "	" 40 cc
150 " to 200 "	" 50 cc
200 " to 250 "	" 60 cc

Orient Seeks to Issue Seventy-One Million in Bonds

Kansas Commission Has Begun Hearing on Application of K. C. M. & O.

Topeka, Kan. Nov. 9--Hearing of the application of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway company for permission to issue securities aggregating about \$71,000,000 to complete the reorganization of the road was begun here today.

The railway it was stated to the public utilities commission, has spent \$28,130,269.44 in cash in constructing and equipping its system. This does not include it was said, the value of the franchises or right of ways, or other concessions in Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. With the road entering Kansas City and the acquisition of the properties of the Kansas City Outer Belt Company, the actual value of the properties of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient will be increased \$43,807,130.06.

According to its statements, filed with the public utilities commission, the road has 974 miles of road complete, of which 737 is in the United States and in operation, the remainder being in Mexico.

of ours commenting on the wonderful prosperity the war stricken nations have brought to this country, says the United States is in clover, but thousands and thousands of dead soldiers on the blood soaked battle fields of Europe are paying the price.

President Wilson and the Hon. William Jennings Bryan, former secretary, when officially related at the White House, both believed it to be the best policy for this country to be at peace with the waring nations. But in the language of Mr. Bryan their views spilt, when it come to putting into practice the best policy for keeping a country in that condition. The President believes in preparedness for war, and would spend millions to equip our navy and army. He believes the best way to stay out of war is to keep other nations afraid of us. Bryan doesn't believe that to be the right way and says such a practice is a menace to our peace and safety and a challenge to Christianity. He appears to be a more devoted disciple of Christ and His teachings than his "Dear Mr. Wilson" and says we should influence by example, rather than excite fear by our preparedness against war. Great minds differ on some questions. This peace question the country was told was what caused a separation of these two men at the National Capitol. And it seems their ideas regarding peace the best policy for a nation to pursue to maintain that position with the world, is growing farther and farther apart.

When war broke out thousands of American citizens found themselves suddenly stranded in Europe because of inability to realize on their lines of credit, and were unable to get out of the war zones.

They set up a mighty howl and

eventually the United States government advanced to them the funds necessary to get them back to America. In each case the government exacted from the tourists a written agreement to pay back to the government the sums advanced.

Since then the treasury department has used every honorable means known to collect the money thus loaned its citizens abroad.

Some of this has been repaid, but much of it has not, and now the government has been forced to the extremity of publishing in the press of the country the names and addresses of the dead beats.

Whenever you see such a list just remember that they borrowed from Uncle Sam the funds necessary to pull them out of the jaws of death and now they are not honorable enough to repay the loans.

Catalogue them in your mind as deadbeats of the first water, just plain and unadulterated cheap skates.

That's all they are, even if some of them are high in commercial circles, pillars of the church and even ministers of the gospel.—Ex.

Obituary of Local Citizen's Mother, Reproduced

Navarro County Paper Contains Account of Death And Burial of Mrs. W. G. Huie

The following obituary clipped from the Dawson Herald, a newspaper published in Navarro county, gives an account of the death and burial of Mrs. W. G. Huie, the mother of our townsman J. R. Huie, who was with her at Galveston, when she submitted to death's grasp, now, near two weeks ago:

"Our town was saddened last Thursday when the news was received that Mrs. W. G. Huie, formerly of this place, but who moved from here to Galveston several months ago, was dead. Mrs. Huie died in St. Mary's Infirmary at 8:15 Ocotober 28, after an operation for cancer of the stomach, which disease she suffered with about six weeks. Her remains arrived in Dawson Friday morning and the funeral service held at the Presbyterian church at 10 a. m., conducted by Revs. L. D. Gratton, of Hubbard, and John V. McCall, of Hillsboro, under the auspices of the local Eastern Star Chapter. Interment took place in the city cemetery.

Mrs. Huie's maiden name was Mary Catherine Keatts, and was born in Kemper county, Mississippi, May 29th, 1861. She professed religion and joined the Baptist church in 1878. In 1882 she moved with her family to Texas, and on Feb. 21, 1884, she was married to W. G. Huie in

Wood county. After marriage she joined the Presbyterian church, with her husband, of which church she continued as a devoted and faithful member up to the time of her death. She was the mother of 8 children, all of whom, except a son who died at four years of age, survive and were with her at the time of her death. Of the children only one is married—Mrs. M. T. Woods of Galveston, who is the mother of five children. In addition to the husband and children, two sisters, Mrs. Lenora Campbell, of Alba, and Mrs. W. J. Lunday, of Gunter, Texas, were with her when death claimed her. The family's address is 1111 32nd St.

Mrs. Huie was well known by our entire citizenship and loved by all who came in contact with her. It is difficult to pay a fitting tribute to the memory of so noble a woman—one who was an every day christian, a perfect lady at all times and under all circumstances, and one who was ever ready to lend a helping hand in time of sorrow. But alas, "death loves a shining mark" so it came, but not until

a beautiful life was lived, a noble example of patience and fidelity. Those who were nearest to her will long for her with unutterable longings—long for a mother's counsel and advice and for a wife's gentle and loving sympathy. We sympathize with the bereaved ones, but we can only remind them that she is not dead but only sleeping."

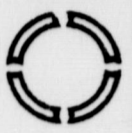

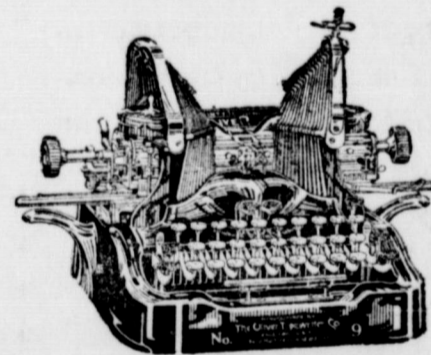
