mates, cast a farewell look back to the University building with all its pleasant surrounding and sweet memories, proceed to the depot get aboard the Katy Flyer or Sunshine Special and speed back to our home, loved ones and work. On this occasion we, in company with our friend and classmate for five years, Rev. Geo. Keever of San Angelo, boarded the Sunshine Special, the I. & G. N. fastest train. He bound for the Old North State (North Carolina) the home of his childhood. We to the Sap Oaks and Sassafras bushes of East Texas, the home of our childhood and scenes of other days.

A great surprise was in store for me. The whole country is changed. The largest farms have dwindled to truck patches and garden spots. The thing that staggered me was the change in my old home. The sturdy oaks and stately cedars have long since fallen a victim to the ax in the hands of the stranger. How carefully were they guarded in the days of our ancestors, and many thoughtless boys and girls have received the rod of correction for hacking a tree or breaking a branch. They are all gone. We stood with head uncovered and scarcely breathing, a stranger in the home of our childhood. We looked into room, where my mother, myself and oldest living daughter were born. Three generations born in the same room, is a thing few homesteads can boast of in Texas. With a feeling of sadness we turned from the scenes of other days for the voices of loved ones no longer echoed through its spacious halls, for many of

them have long since become the victim of grim reaper death and those that have passed over the divide their dust rests in the old cemetery on the hill where the pines and the cedar sings the last sad requiem to those who sleep beneath the boughs.

Heart-sick we turned away and with a cry of despair said "Give me the place of my childhood." This is not the place we once knew. The shout of the stranger in the field mocked at us in our helplessness. The changes even derided us, and being unable to bear this longer, we closed our eyes to our present surroundings and looked back through the mists of time, and saw a vision that made our heart rejoice. We leave the home where we were born, with all its memories of the past and once more we turn our face westward, and soon find ourselves on the wind-swept prairies, with its broad fields and extensive pastures. Ohere the people are broader

Judging from the size of the roasting ears that some of the farmers in this part of the country are selling to the merchants here, there is going to be some corn raised in Wilbarger County again or no rain.

If the plans for gathering in the election returns from Saturday's election, work as successful as the State Democratic Executive Committee count on, we will all learn of the fate of State candidates quicker this election than usual.

To the many citizens of Odell Precinct: if you have been a citizen of this State and County long enough to qualify you to vote, hold a poll tax receipt and believe in the teachings and

principles of the Democratic party, come out and vote Saturday and help to roll up a big at Odell.

Wilbarger county has a big crop of county candidates, and not counting the precinct offices, there is only nine places at the public pie counter, to be divided among thirty aspirants for those places. Personally, we would like to give each one of them a boost by our vote, but as that is out of the question, we are going to the polls Saturday and assist in giving a big number of them a shove up Salt Creek.

Further, the Reporter takes it for granted, those who have picked their candidates, believe them to be men, capable and competent of filling the office they ask for, should they be the successful nominees Saturday. But to those who have not already made out their ballots within their minds, and who might be careless and indifferent who they vote for, the Reporter believes they should stop to take at least three things into consideration and that is, a candidate's character, fitness and qualification for an office.

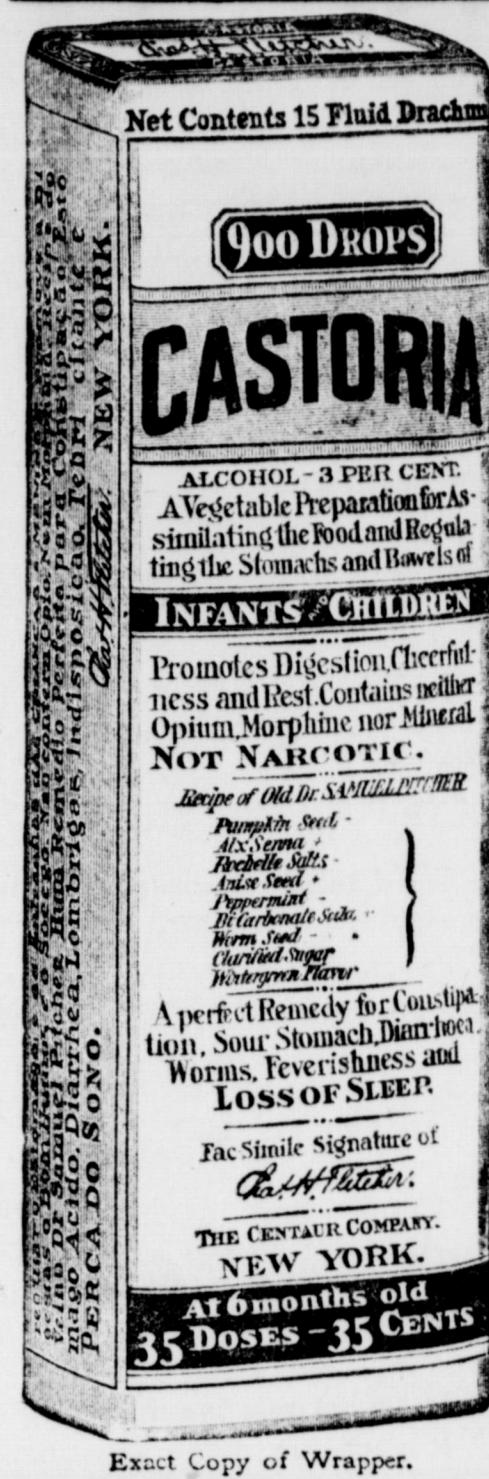

To the Voters of Wichita and Wilbarger Counties:

My opponent is appealing to the voters of this District on the theory that he has held office only one term and, therefore, it belongs to him for another two years. This, like all other offices, belongs to the people and it is for them to say at all times who they will have to serve them.

Furthermore, my opponent is not, in any true sense, making a race for second term. He was in the Texas Legislature two terms from Clay County immediately preceding his election from Wichita County. In fact, if I am correctly informed, he moved to Wichita County and was running for office here before his term expired in Clay County and because of such action, when the District Convention met to certify the results of the election, a protest was filed by a majority of the delegates from Clay County alleging that Mr. Haney was at that time a citizen of Wichita County and that his election should not be declared, and which was done only for the reason that the protest was not filed in proper form. I got this information direct from the man who was at that time the Democratic Chairman of the Clay County District, who is today a citizen of Wichita Falls, and will verify this statement.

Now, this office is not one of financial remuneration. The most that can be said of the office is that it is an honor to be a member of the Texas Legislature, and since my opponent has had that honor for six years, I fail to see any reason why it should not be passed to some other young man who desire to do something for himself and his country. To say the least, Mr. Haney has no valid claim as a second term man.
