## Seeking to Organize Fishing Club in County

Organization to Construct Another Dam Across Doans Branch

S. S. Smith of Vernon is in Odell today making an effort to interest local parties to go into a Fishing Club or take stock in a Company and construct a dam across the Doans branch on A. S. Ross' farm, which dam is proposed to be built just below the one now owned by the Spring Lake Rod and Gun Club. The dam to be stocked with fish and a club house to be erected on the grounds.

The membership of the organization is to be limited to forty shares with a hundred dollar stock to each member. A number of shares have already been sold to parties at Vernon and other influential men in the county and it is believed by Mr. Smith that he will have no trouble in selling the remainder, from reason of the fact, that an interest in a proposition of the kind would soon increase in valuation. As has been proven in the case with those who own shares in the Spring Lake Rod and Gun Club, whose stocks have more than doubled in valuation since the building of their fishing resort.

Enough stock has already been sold in the proposed new fishing club to justify the beginning of work on the dam at an early date.

The Reporter acknowledges receipt of letter from J. J. Youngblood located at Stanley, N. M., who with his family left this county about two months ago in search of a new location. J. J. promised his friends in the Odell vicinity when he was "packing his grip, for a farewell trip" that when he was domiciled on new quarters of the globe that he would communicate with them through the Reporter. So the promised epistle has been received and published in this issue.

Those best acquainted with Mr. Youngblood, know him to be a man not given to exaggeration of things, as one will conclude after reading his letter to the Reporter. While he differed from a great many of us in this country politically, he was given credit for being honest in his views, since his ideas regarding governmental affairs did not hinder him from making the county a good citizen, and a good farmer. He left a number of friends in this community, who no doubt will be glad to learn that he is well pleased with his new home and would be glad to hear from him at other times.

Odell, Texas.

We have traveled over quite a lot of New Mexico and like this belt better than any place we have seen. The water is very good, a little taste of lime. The soil is of a red cast, with a mixture of sand, doesn't blow much only where it is of a white cast. The water is from 60 to 300 feet deep. There is wood and post in reach. The crops here are: corn, beans, cane, millet, melons grow very well, and garden stuff does fairly well.

Now this is a high dry country, 6500 feet above sea level. The rainfall is 15 inches, it rains in July and August mostly. The grass principally is Black Grammar, and makes fine hay when it rains plenty. There is quite a lot of government land here and some patented land for sale at two and three dollars per acre with quite a lot of improvements to the quarter. We are in twelve miles of the San Pedro mountains, where a copper mine is being operated, which is helping out some. There are two coal mines close by and two gold mines, but one is idle.

The mountains are full mineral, such as copper, coal, gold and silver, mining claims can be filed on in the mining district.

We have taken claims here and intend to stay.

Now Charles, this is just as things appear here, you can publish this as it is not overdrawn. I don't want to influence anyone to move out here unless they want to come. But I think 320 acres of land here for \$23.15 will beat renting in most places.

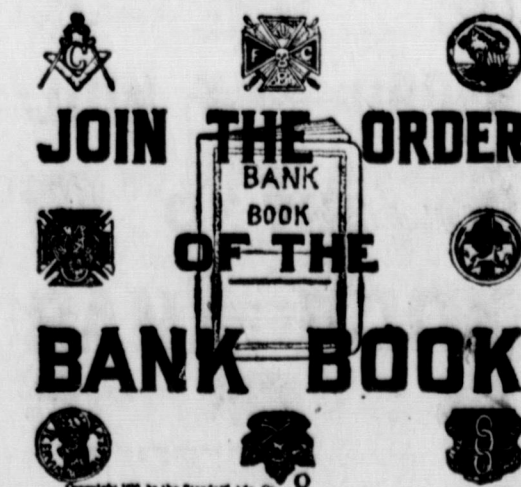
