## Large Crowd Hear Stanley J. Clark

Advocator of Socialism Given  
Respectable Hearing In  
Lecture Here Oct. 18

Through the auspices of the local Socialist organization Stanley J. Clark, Socialist lecturer, who was dated to speak here October 18; true to date he made his appearance Friday morning on the 11:20 a. m. south bound train; a reception committee composed of members of the Socialist organization at this place met him at the train and all due respect was shown him by his comrades while he was here in their midst: while here Mr. Clark made the acquaintance of several of the people of this country who differ from him in his political belief, but who were people who intelligently realize that the fault of any party or creed is not always the work of any one man, and are willing to allow its advocates to express their opinion on any subject they feel disposed to, knowing that no person is ever in position

to intelligently denounce a parties principles until they learn what the party advocates.

Therefore a good size crowd composed of men and women of this country heard Stanley J. Clark in an address to the people here Friday evening; who was introduced by W. T. Flowers, who made an interesting talk to the crowd in introducing the speaker; after which this noted advocator of Socialistic doctrine, while standing on a soap box arranged out in the streets, spoke for one hour and twenty minutes to those gathered around to hear him.

In his lecture and explanation of Socialism, he made clear many vital points of his doctrine, including the land question and others, which lack of space prevents us from mentioning; he also in this speech went into a lengthy denunciation of both the Democrat and Republican parties, "saying" that there existed today very little difference in the two parties, condemning also the present day system of competition, and favoring a cooperative form, with the Government ownership of all public utilities. The Reporter will appreciate your news, what you might consider would be of no interest to the people, may be the very thing they are making inquiry about.

If you know of or see where some enterprising movement could be made that would be an advantage to the town, suggest it, talk it, agitate it and push it; all the while remembering that no great good will ever come to the town without some action on your part as citizens.

The marketing of cotton has now opened up in full headway, which has been somewhat slow about coming in, as most of it in this part of the country was planted late, but now that it has begun to open and the farmers has begun to pick it and haul it into town; a cotton blockade on Odell's streets is nothing uncommon now.

Napoleon the Great Conqueror, whom the world once trembled at his word; is said to have once made the remark: "That he would rather have a thousand men armed with daggers against him, than one newspaper;" so the Great Conqueror in his day realized the effectiveness of a newspaper's influence, either for good or bad.

A. D. Gaines, formerly of this place but now living north of Chillicothe, was in Odell Monday

That Odell's cotton market is as good or better than some place near here of more note, is a statement the Reporter makes without fear of successful contradiction; when a big portion of cotton that should go to Olustee, Okla., to be sold, is coming to Odell to be ginned and disposed of, then something is wrong with the Oklahoma cotton buyers, or else those farmers of that country would not haul their cotton here unless the difference in what they were offered for it at Olustee and what they received for it here did not justify them to haul their cotton to Odell.

Two of our contemporary exchanges which visit our desk each week, speak of their town as being the best cotton market in Northwest Texas, that's alright for them to boost their home town, Chillicothe, and its cotton market, that's a duty newspapers owe the town that supports them; but we advise them to go slow, while they are extensively boosting the Chillicothe cotton market; two bales of cotton on Tuesday of last week was brought back to Odell and sold, after the price paid for cotton at Chillicothe that day had been passed up.

One thing strikingly noticeable among the business men of a town, and this is those who do less towards supporting their home paper, are usually among the first ones to seek it for a favor, when their local newspaper can be conveniently used in turning something their way—but there's nothing strange about this fact, when you take into consideration the disposition of these characters, for nine times out of ten you will find their generosity does not extend no further than themselves, and a diagnosis of their make-up, will prove them to be for self and self alone.

"Referring to the agricultural lines in his county, Mr. Hockersmith said that cotton and corn were leading crops, but that with increasing acreage of alfalfa, peanuts, kaffir corn and maize the live stock industry was coming to the front in a most encouraging manner. Live stock on the farms, just enough to consume all the feedstuffs raised, and returning to the soil the rough manure, is Mr. Hockersmith's idea of proper farming, in which statement he is in thorough accord with the leading experts of the county. It is this feature of Wilbarger farm life that is being encouraged, and the industry is rapidly taking hold.

"Wilbarger County secured a large number of blue and red ribbons in individual entries, taking first premium on wheat both this year and last. Besides wheat, the display contains oats and corn of excellent quality and a splendid exhibit of Kaffir corn and maize. In this department is found some white hull Kaffir corn, rather unique for Texas, but considered superior in feeding quality to other kinds.

"The entire county exhibit was made ready for shipment to Dallas in ten days. Previous to that time no one had given the matter a thought. That such a splendid collection of grains, cotton and vegetables and fruits could be secured in so short a time and that this display could take a place among the five leading counties is both complimentary to those who promoted the exhibit and to the productive ability of the county."
