ney connected to the bladder by one tube; on the right side it had no kidney; there was no opening to the lower intestines; its stomach was dilated; its thighs were abnormally large; it had a hemorrhage in the spinal canal, indicating an injury or a diseased condition of the blood vessels; there was no passage way to the missing ear; its brains were apparently normal, with the exception of a hemorrhage on the left side.

The performing of a simple operation would have saved the life of this child. But the surgeon, knowing the future that would await it, refused to operate. A coronor's jury, consisting of a number of the most noted physicians in Chicago, found that he acted strictly within his rights and within the ethics of the medical profession.

Was this doctor a human being with a great heart, who refused to prolong the life of this child and thereby condemn it to an existence of helpless misery? Or was he a criminal in his refusal to perform an operation that meant life, though that life be worse than death?

Hardly a day passes but we read of a crime committed by some person who is later proven to have been a defective from birth. There is no punishment for such. They must be committed to an institution for the rest of their days, or be permitted to run at large and continue to be a menace to all the people with whom they come in contact.

Many of these defective people grow to maturity, and marry, and bring other defectives into the world. The world is full of them, and humanity is becoming more morally depraved and mentally warned every day. Europe in particular is deluged with them in high places, brought about by the precocious system of inter marriage, and Europe is drowning in a sea of blood and destruction.

What are we to do with our defectives? Are we to nurture them and send them forth into the world to breed other defectives, to serve as a canker to the mentality and morality of mankind? Or should they be allowed to slip back into the mystery from whence they came? We correct the mistakes of

nature in all other respects by removing the menace in time.

But what are we to do with regard to the greatest of all menaces to future generations?

What will the future of our race be if they are allowed to grow and propagate, and cover the land with the ever increasing accidental blights of nature?—EX.

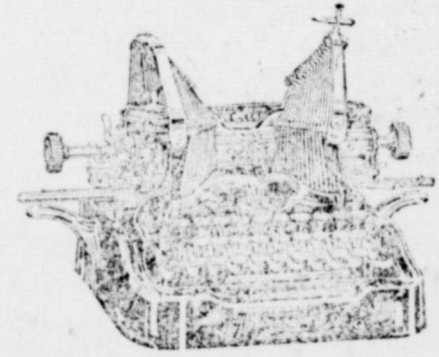

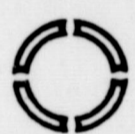

Orient Can Not Issue \$71,000,000 Securities

Road Desired to Pay Outstanding Debts And Reimburse Old Stockholders

Topeka, Kansas, Nov. 26th.—The Kansas City Mexico & Orient Railway was refused permission by the Kansas Public Utilities Commission to issue \$71,000,000 in stocks and bonds to pay off outstanding debts and reimburse stockholders of the old company, according to an announcement made by the commission today. In the showing made by the commission the company listed actual value of all property owned at slightly over \$42,000,000 and actual cost of all property about \$27,000,000.

A Bright Little Citizen of The Town is Gone

Accident at Orient Tracks Thurs. Eve., Ends Life of Little J. P. Starr

Our little city received a severe shock last Thurs. evening about 6 o'clock, when it became known that J. P., the ten year old son of Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Starr, had accidentally been run over by a freight car at the Orient tracks.

And after twenty four hours of painful suffering, never fully recovering from the shock, occasioned by the accident, the noble little man breathed his last breath and his spirit took its flight back home to the God who gave it. It was then a vacancy was wrought in a family home, school children lost a companion, a teacher a bright pupil, and Odell was deprived of a young citizen.

According to a statement made by a party who was among the first to go to the assistance of boy after the accident occurred, he was knock down and run over a short distance south of the Orient station, near the shipping platform. It was getting dark and as there were no regular road engine on hand to set some cars, an engine that pulls a work train was being used for the purpose. The unfortunate little fellow, accompanied by his younger brother, was returning home from their father's gin and attempted to cross the track when the freight car was butted against him and knocked him down. His leg was badly mangled, the muscle being cut clear from the bone, besides other bruises that was received about his body.

It was one of the most horrible accidents that has ever occurred in Odell and cast a gloom over the entire town.

Funeral services were conducted at the Pleasant Valley Cemetery Saturday, by Rev. Leslie Robeson, where deceased was laid to rest. A large crowd of sorrowful relatives and friends witnessed the burial, there being a number from Vernon, as well as from other portions of the county.

The Reporter joins the large circle of friends, claimed by the grief stricken family, in extending to them its deepest sympathy.

Community League Met First Time Fri. Night

Organization Perfected And The Election of Officers Carried Out

The first meeting of the Modern Community League of North Wilbarger County, was held at the Odell school auditorium last Friday night. While not attended by a very large crowd from the different communities around Odell, but a number that were present have expressed themselves saying, they were well pleased with the League's first program.

The speakers of the evening were: Dr. Frank Jones of the A. & M. College, and J. E. Farrow of Vernon, secretary of the Young Men's Business League at that place.

The formers' address was a practical talk to the farmers on the "Cause, Prevention and Cure of Hog Cholera". And the latter's talk might be summed up principally as a eulogy of Texas, Texas citizens, and the opportunities of the State.

A permanent organization was perfected at the meeting with the following named officers elected: W. T. Collins, president; E. C. Austin 1st., Vice president; M. Crownover 2nd vice president; J. R. Huie Secretary; R. N. Coffey Treasurer; and Prof. E. E. Eldridge, Corresponding Secretary. By an agreement of the League it was left to the President to appoint two members to serve on the program committee and they to select the third party. The two of the program committee are: M. A. Smith and Dr. O. E. Looney. Theodore Collins being the third member selected to
