Expect 20-Cent Cotton

That cotton will reach the high mark of 20 cents is the opinion of the Texas Warehouse and Marketing Department. A statement says:

"Some time since this department gave out an interview stating that on account of the condition of the cotton crop, with no future for a top crop, we believed that cotton would ultimately sell for 18 cents per pound. The condition has not changed, but we have had about 40 days for ginning and marketing our crop, resulting in one of the fastest movements of the staple from the producer to the spinner and speculator that has ever occured in the history of the South.

"In the face of this heavy selling by the producers, prices have remained practically unchanged. The price to the producer seems to justify the sale. Practically all of the cotton in the state has been brought into sight and sold, which has placed the producer in such a financial position that he can gradually market the balance of his cotton and procure for same its intrinsic value. Trees at Farm Homes

Much is said concerning the aesthetic value of trees in the yand and around the farmstead This is well. More could be said with propriety. But there is another value that is seldom mentioned. That is the increased value of the farm as a direct result of the trees.

You often hear the expression, "I would not cut that tree down for \$100." In fact, large useful shade trees around the home have a much higher valuation than that. But what did such trees cost? Perhaps two or three dollars would cover the cost of the tree at the time it was transplanted and very little since. And while it takes several vears from the time the trees are set till they reach a height when such valuations are placed upon them they are little expense.


Then consider the increased valuation of the farm and the home as a direct result of the trees. Did it pay to plant the

Many examples have been given in cities to show where from two to five per cent of the value of a place, spent on plantings, especially trees, shrubs and flowers, have enhanced values from 40 to 60 per cent and even 100 per cent, These plantings always make a less expensive house look finer than a costlier

The farm home that has a few large shade trees about the yard some climbers over the piazza and buildings, dense evergreehs to serve as wind breaks and for beauty, with a few broad, dense shade trees in the barn lot, along the lane. boundry, creeks, etc., will also have a higher valuation placed upon it than if these werc wanting. Such a farm is really worth more as a place to live.

The influence of trees upon the lives and characters of young Fish cannot live in foul water people has never fully been appreciated. No better way can be thought of to make a profound impression upon the children and young people than trees, shrubs, flowers, gardens. Our attachments for trees soon become strong. Trees grown about the home-vines and attractive flowers will likely add new charm to the rural home and its environments. - Farm and Ranch.

Vernon, Texas, Oct. 10. - The total valuation of Wilbarger County, as compiled at the office of the county tax collector for the year, is \$11,865,860.

This amount, divided, follows: Lands, \$6,691,585; city property, \$1,490,770; personal property, \$3,503,505.

The state tax for the year amounts to \$52,585; county tax, \$57,261; district school taxes, \$30,873. District No. 10 has a special road tax of \$1269, which makes the taxe for the year total
