

Eight thousand five hundred bales cotton were destroyed by fire one night last week at Altus, Okla, when the cotton compress in that city burned. The fire is supposed to have originated in the boiler room at the plant. The loss is estimated at \$800,000.

An Oklahoma farm tenant recently made the assertion that he was on a farm four years before he learned the nature of the soil of the different fields on the place. There is a lesson in that fellow's remark that ought to be of benefit to some land lords and tenants. Some farms are made up of different grades of soil and some portions of it are better adapted to certain crops than others. 
