### Lots of Fleecy Staple, is Being Hauled to Town

#### The Three Local Gin Plants Have Ginned Up-to-Date, 2246 Bales

The last few weeks of clear sun shiny weather has had much to do toward bursting open the cotton bolls of this country and putting it in fine shape for picking. Lots of the fleecy staple has been coming into town, giving the three gins something like steady work. While neither of the gins so far have been crowded this year, like they were at this time last season, but the machinery is not standing many minutes these days.

Below is the number of bales the three gins have turned out this season up to date, with a near estimate of the bales that have been brought here for ginning from Oklahoma:

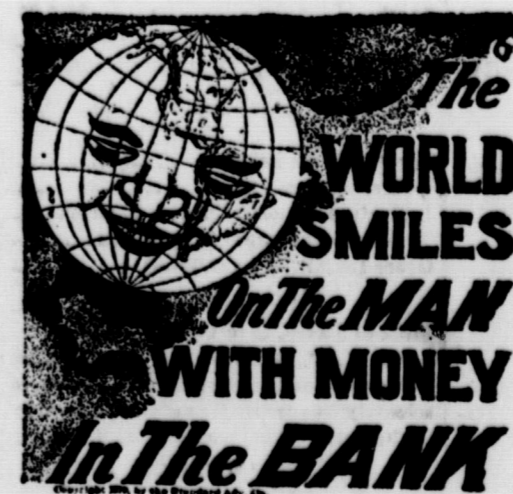

Eight thousand five hundred bales cotton were destroyed by fire one night last week at Altus, Okla. when the cotton compress in that city burned. The fire is supposed to have originated in the boiler room at the plant. The loss is estimated at \$800,000.

An Oklahoma farm tenant recently made the assertion that he was on a farm four years before he learned the nature of the soil of the different fields on the place. There is a lesson in that fellow's remark that ought to be of benefit to some land lords and tenants. Some farms are made up of different grades of soil and some portions of it are better adapted to certain crops than others. And where a tenant just holds possession of a farm one year and then moves, either on his own accord or on complaint of the land lord, in a number of cases both are worse off.

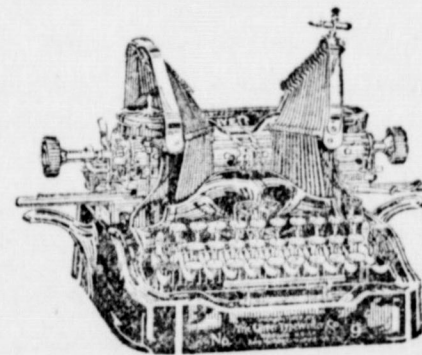
