Cemetery Association To Meet

Second Saturday in May Designated--Appropriate Exercises to be Held

The members of the Pleasant Valley Cemetery Association of which G. F. Cook of Pleasant Valley neighborhood is president with W. F. Bell as secretary, requests us to announce to all

those who are interested in the beautifying of the Pleasant Valley Cemetery to meet there the second Saturday in May at 11 a. m. as arrangements will be made to clear the yard of weeds, set out shrubbery and do what work that is necessary at the time.

C. H. Shaw, one of the progressive farmers of that neighborhood, who is intensely interested in keeping the community cemetery in a respectable condi-

tion, informs us that himself, G. F. Cook and others of the neighborhood met at the cemetery Saturday morning and did some work in the way of burning the grass off the yard, and at this meeting they thought best to call a meeting of the people of the country to meet at the cemetery on the date as stated.

Mr. Shaw also informs us that a decision was made reached among the members of the association, that not only at their meeting in May will all necessary work be attended to, but that it is their intention to invite Rev. Leslie Robeson and other ministers of the gospel to be present that appropriate exercises might be held.

It will be remembered that this association was organized by the citizens of the country some time last June, and while they term themselves as an association, and in order that their meetings may be held in a business like form they have their president and secretary, yet the membership is not restricted to any definite number, and they especially invite all those who are interested in keeping the cemetery in a respectable condition to be present at their meetings.

Plan For New Methodist Church Decided Upon

To Be Modern Edifice With
Two Entrances--Work
To Begin Soon

The members of the Methodist church who have had in mind the building of a church at this place for some time, have been defered from actual work on the building, on account of the plans one of the local contractors had ordered to be submitted to the building committee being delayed; but as the plans arrived this last week and were submitted to the committee for consideration, they have decided on a nice design for their church structure, and actual work will begin some time soon, without some further hinderance.

Great interest is being manifested by the members of this church in getting ready for the erection of their place of worship, and up to this time something like \$1800 has been donated by the members for its construction. As the building committee has come to a decision on what plan will be used for their church, when completed it will

be a credit to a town much larger than Odell.

The plan submitted to the building committee, and the one upon which they have decided: calls for a building to be built something in a T like shape, the main auditorium being a room 30x60 feet in dimension, with the smaller T like projection to be 30x30 feet.

Two main entrances will be had to the building, with vestibules to be built at each entrance, both to have suitable doors from the out and inside of the church. While some rumored talk has been afloat this week, that this church might be built of brick, but nothing definite of this statement has been learned, and the Reporter has no authority for this mention only hearsay.

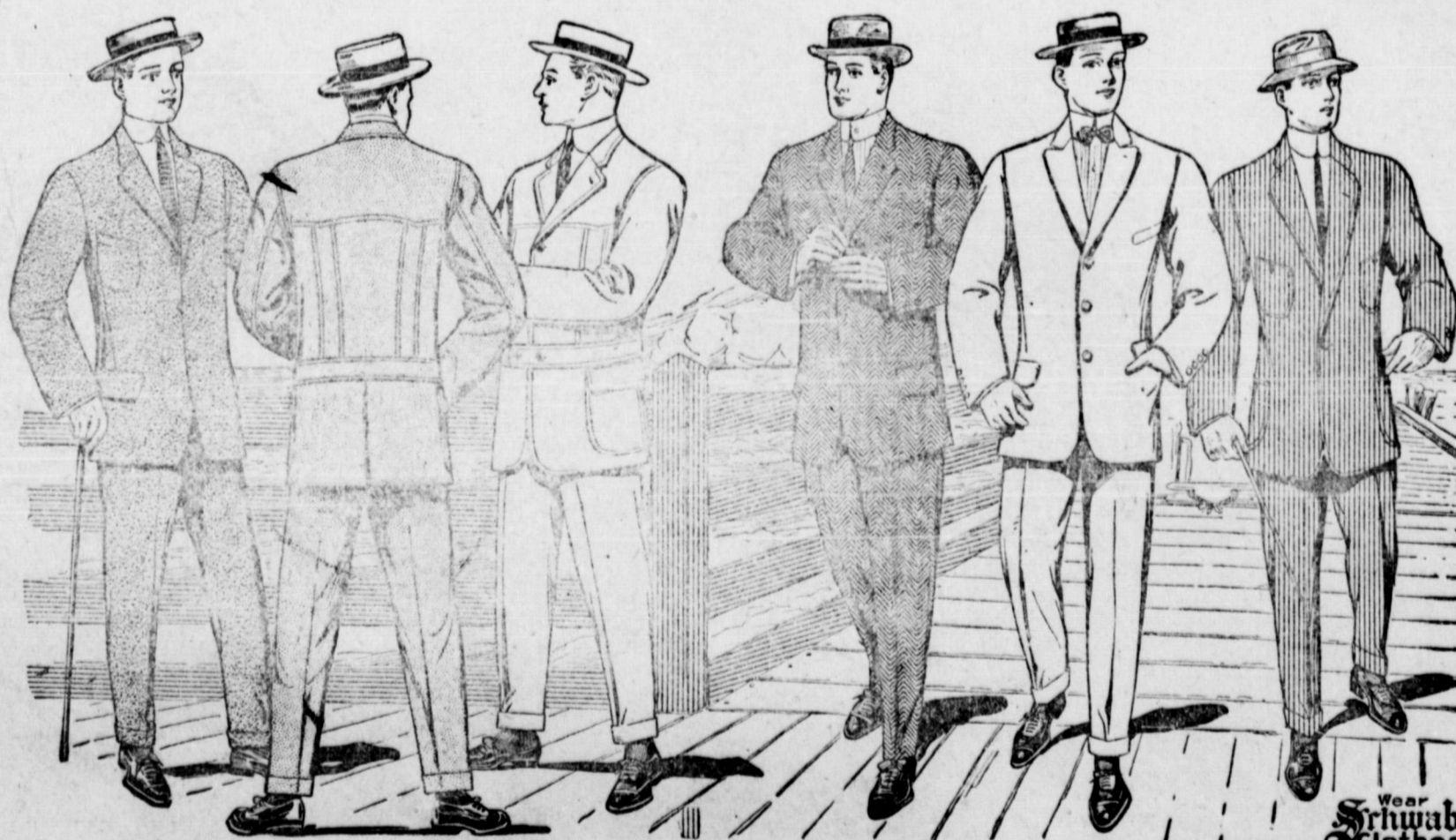

merchants when ever it is convenient and in your power to do so, our only motive being for continued advocacy of home patronage is to keep prosperity in the country, for where prosperity reigns it means more churches, better roads to travel, good schools, more profitable homes, and every other advantage to be found in a prosperous country. Even the man whose financial circumstances permits him to pay cash for all that he buys, and does not necessarily have to rely on the generosity of his home merchants for credit; is from the Reporter's view of morality, is not acting the part of a good citizen when he orders from the mail order houses something that he could buy at home, just for the sake of saving a few dimes. Granting this man the privilege of using his financial means as he pleases, a continued practice of the policy of patronizing mail order houses, followed by all others, would soon mean the centralization of wealth away from home, and under existing circumstances of this kind, we

fear such co-operative undertakings, as building of churches, the claying of roads and every other donation that business men are asked to donate towards, would not progress so well, as big mail order houses care nothing for the welfare of a community no more than to drain it of its dollars.

In the re-election of two outgoing members of the local school board back as trustees of this school district last Saturday, the Reporter believes the voters made no mistake, as the splendid service they have given the school affairs of this district, is only a faith demonstration of what they will continue to do in the future. When we take into consideration the time and attention it required of them last summer at the building of our new school edifice, the construction of which was looked after properly by them at the cost of no little time from their business affairs, this with all the other responsibilities thrown on them from the time of the submission of the building's architectural plans to the proper architect, and on until the completion of the building; by re-electing them back to their positions as school trustees at the expiration of their term, the Reporter believes the voters of this district only done what was their duty to do, as it was their only way of showing to them an appreciation of their past service, and the high esteem and regard they held them as school trustees. Of course n their being re-elected to serve us again, a majority of the voters wishes of this district has been gratified; but those who thought proper to vote otherwise, should now work to the best interest of the school as before, as school trustees when rendering their best service are not working solely to their individual interest, but to the best interest of the school district at large.

Sees Havoc During 1913

Seeress Predicts Many Disasters in America During Year--Foretold Floods and Tornado

Paris, April 5.—Declaration that the Omaha tornado and the death dealing floods in Ohio and Indiana are but a forerunner of the disasters to befall America in 1913, was voiced here by Madame De Thebes, the famous Parisian seeress, who predicted at the beginning of the year the present disasters in the United States.

"Let those in America," said Mme. De Thebes, "who survive the present disasters, protect themselves against further cyclones and inundations, for I cannot see any calm returning to America before April 21.

"The finger of God is at work in America. This coming September is to be the most dangerous month for that country. Terrible fire, wind and water will assail her and a large portion of her territory will slip into the sea within the next few generations. In September most of the horrors will develop from winds."

Partial Report of School Election Saturday

Same Trustees In Odell District--New Ones at Other Places

As Saturday the fifth, was the day on which various school districts over the county held their elections to elect their school trustees for the next ensuing year, on that day also to a trustee to represent the county at large, and one to represent commissioner's precinct No. 3. The Reporter has by special efforts obtained a partial report of how the election resulted regarding the trustees of various school districts in this section of the country which are given below.

By a count of the votes cast for trustees of the Odell district, the votes were in a large majority for the continued service of the old trustees, two of which had reached the expiration of their term, the third, H. G. Chandler unexpired. The four following parties that were voted on as trustees for the Odell district received the number of votes as given: M. A. Smith 32, W. M. Scott 28, A. C. Daniel 5 and G. B. Crain 4.

In the election of a county trustee from commissioner's precinct No. 3 to succeed C. G. Thompson, whose time expires the first of May, he was given an unanimous vote at the Odell box for re-election.

In the Pleasant Valley and Hauk districts no elections were held.

In the Red River district school trustees were elected as follows: T. A. Hamilton, E. C. Austin and W. G. Perry, the former succeeding J. P. Tate retiring.

The trustees for the Plain View district are: Z. M. Crutchfield, J. R. Grimes and Johna Watson.
