## Former Restaurant Man Dies at Wichita Falls

### W. P. Carson Found Dead in Hotel Bed The e Friday Morning

News to the effect that W. P. Carson, a former restaurant man of Odell, had killed himself by drinking poison at a hotel in Wichita Falls, reached here Friday evening.

According to a statement made by A. T. Collins, a son-in-law of deceased and with whom Mr. Carson was making his home, he went to Wichita Falls Tuesday of last week and was apparently in good spirit when he left home.

Soon after poison message was received by Mr. Collins, informing him of the death of his wife's father, he accompanied by his brother J. M. Collins, and A. S. Tooley, left for Wichita Falls to investigate the death and to attend to shipping the remains back to this country for burial.

Interment took place Saturday at the Chillicothe cemetery, the burial being witnessed by quite a number of friends of deceased. Several years ago Mr. Carson affiliated himself with members of the Christian Church and was a good accomodating man. Three daughters survive him which include Mrs. A. T. Collins of near Odell, Mrs. Arch Nave of Clarendon and Mrs. Ed. Paulk of Gageby.

The bereaved ones have the sympathy of the Reporter.

## Odell Soldier Boys Given a Farewell Reception Friday

### Were Served With Icecream at Thompson Park--G. W. Hart Entertained Sat.

Should the great war in which the United is making preparations to become an important factor, ever reach such a stage when it would become necessary for Company E, Seventh Texas Infantry, the same being the Wilbarger County Guards, to take its place in the trenches of France, the Reporter ventures the assertion that the farewell reception given the Odell boys here last Friday night, will be a bright spot in their memories when their thoughts drift homeward.

The reception in question was tendered by the business men and citizens of Odell. Ice cream and other refreshments was secured and the volunteer soldiers and those of the first draft numbers were invited to Thompson Park. Lanterns swinging from limbs of the beautiful trees in the grove illuminated the grounds, and as the occasional croak of a bull frog mingled its voice with that of a hoot owl nearby all this at the farewell reception of our war going boys, made the scene and occasion more impressive.

While the entertainment was arranged to honor the soldier boys, yet the public was not barred from the Park and as result the crowd was estimated to have been something near 150 people.

Appropriate talks were made by Dr. W. D. Herring, C. E. Foster and R. E. Burns. And a short while before the crowd dispersed, "America", that grand old national hymn, which starts every true blue heart to throbbing, was sung and echoed back from the hills.

**Dark Hours And Bright**

At the Madison Square Garden a few nights ago Mr. James M. Beck, that ardent and eloquent friend of the allies from the beginning of the war, said:

"In many respects this is the darkest hour of the greatest conflict of history".

Even if this were the darkest hour, there would be no reason for discouragement. Men who were boys in the sixties can remember darkest hours of the civil war, when everything seemed to go wrong, when old men, with tears in their eyes, talked excitedly of going to the front. What black hours were lived thru in 1864.

And this is the darkest hour of the world's fight for freedom? Is it not rather an hour of brightening, if still distant hope? Mr. Beck probably had submarine peril in his mind. It is the last desperate chance of Germany. Its gravity is acknowledged. For the moment, there is a healthful tendency even to overestimate its gravity. The United States has been a little slow and undecided, after the manner of democracies; but it will build ships with the same steadiness and activity with which it is raising a great army. In 1918 its military forces and its immense financial contributions to the allies will add enormously to their strength. If we are late comers we come fresh to the fight. Germany has reached and passed her maximum of power. At first the simple German people fed so long on the futile savageries of the Zeppelins, now apparently abandoned, were told that England was to be starved in four months, in six months. Now "from month to month" England's "economic life and conduct of the war" are to be impaired" until she can't oppose the necessity for peace much longer.

Is it England and the allies, with their unexhausted new American forces of men and material and wealth, or is it Germany, that best can face the test of "month to month"? Time is the irresistible ally on whom the allies have long counted. Her foreign commerce ruined, her financial condition a temporary postponement of inevitable disaster, the grip of her enemies tightening on her supplies from neutral countries, suffering from bad harvests and acknowledged want her allies sick of the enterprise into which she has led them, her military prestige waning, her intrigues fruitless, hardly a friendly face left among the nations—the penumbra already surrounds Germany. Darker hours are to come. The mandarins of militarism, having slain a million of her sons, are not content. They pursue their fixed idea to its ultimate ruin.

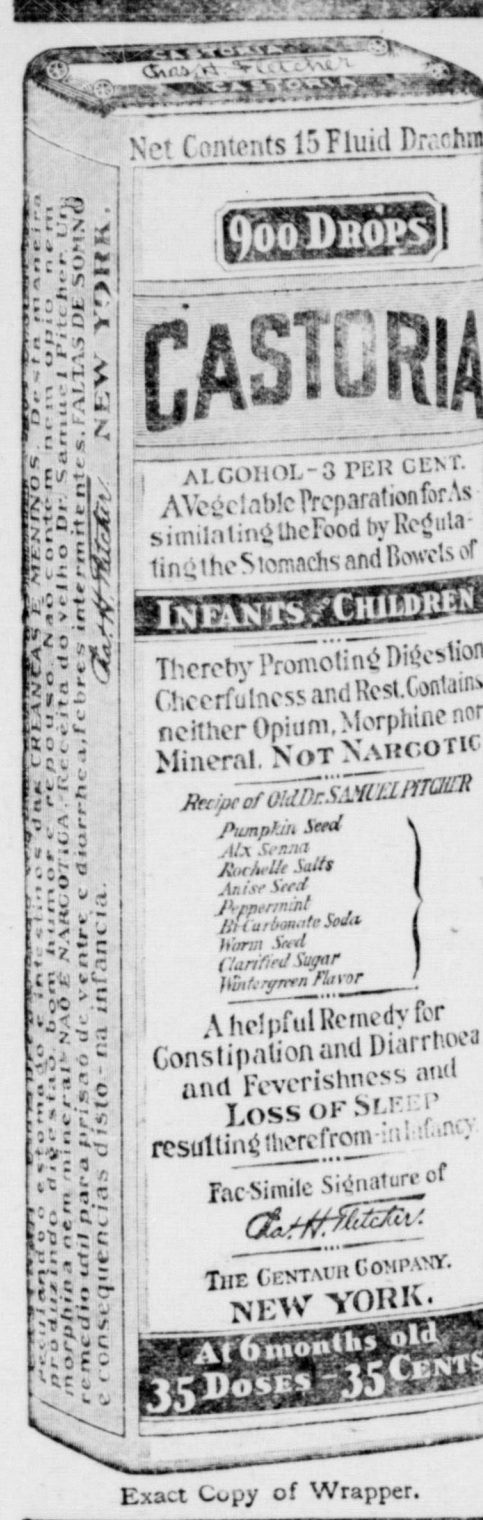
As to the Russian democracy, its travails and its troubles, its difficulties and dissensions in the first bewildering days of freedom, its struggles to find itself, are natural and inevitable. The German propaganda will fail,

there as it has failed almost everywhere else. The pernicious elements are sporadic. The spirit of the whole nation is sound. The summoning of an extraordinary national council is a hopeful sign; it will bring to the support of the Government the immense steadying power of public opinion. When we remember how Russia was sold and betrayed; when we recall swindlers like the Minister of War the imperial German camarilla, the Czar and Czarina, bedeviled by an obscene peasant monk, and compare that Russia, sapped by treachery and corruption, with the new Russia, now nobly led by a great patriot and great man Kerensky, the darkest hours of war are seen to lie behind. — New York Times
