A good size crowd of business men and others attended the meeting and a reorganization of the Club was effected in a way.

J. R. Huie was reelected President of the Club. W. B. Beach, vice-president. Charles P. Ross was reelected secretary. Theodore Collins, treasurer.

Dues for membership was also agreed on and each member of the club will be assessed monthly hereafter, beginning with dues next month.

The future need of the town observing a Trades Day one day in each month was discussed. And it was agreed at this meeting to observe the first Monday in each month as a day of the kind, beginning with the first Monday in May.

Turner as his assistant, were named as a committee to have charge of the program on trades day next month.

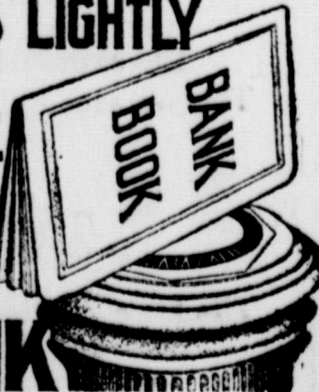

Maach of the Weevil

Man may do all in his power to produce a bumper crop of cotton this year, but the insect enemies of the fleety staple may checkmate mighty man and his efforts. The boll weevil will infest the entire cotton section of the South, before its progress is checked, according to the report of the special committee of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, made public April 14. Attempts to destroy the weevil by spraying and poisoning have met with scant success because the weevil bores in the plant. Expert bugologists say the annual rate of advance varies from forty to seventy miles, according to conditions. The boll weevil is an alien. He came from Mexico. While Uncle Sam is "getting Villa" the Mexican weevil is getting our cotton.

By reading the different exchanges that comes to the Reporter office, we frequently

learn of some fellow who has dropped into their town and pocketed several dollars from the farmers and other citizens, as a fake solicitor of some newspaper or magazine. Such agents usually spends about one day in a town, but secures several subscribers by giving a two-bit buggy whip or some other article in connection with the paper he is selling. Of course he issues them a receipt for their money and shows them some sort of authority for his agency. But as he is here today and somewhere else tomorrow, he can very easily work a game of the kind and not be caught. The signatures he puts to the receipts he issues, in lots of cases is not his own and the subscription blanks he carries on some noted publishing house, he has had printed at some print shop. He has been on his job long enough to learn, that where he soaks a few fellows here another bunch in some other town, that there is not very many men that will go to the trouble to get on his trail for so small amount as fifty cents or a dollar, so on he goes, and his would be subscribers never receive a copy of the paper they ordered. His game is an old one, but it seems he always finds some few at every place he lands to practice it on.

Now since the Commercial Club of the town will meet regularly hereafter, it becomes the duty of every citizen of the town, especially all business men to enroll as a member, keep their assessments paid in advance, attend the meetings and to act within himself as a committee of one to look after the interest of the town. It is only by persuing a course of this kind, will we as members of the Commercial Club ever accomplish anything. Odell has reaced a period in its growth where it is very necessary that we maintain an organization of

some kind to look after our public interest. The principal street in the town at this time needs repairing, our public water supply is not the best in the world, streets and back alleys needs to be cleaned of rubbish, with lots of other work ahead for the Commercial Club. If we are true citizens of the town, and we ought to be, if our interest is here, we will go into the organization revived Monday evening, and stay together as members and work along some plan to push the interest of Odell. The Reporter has repeatedly said, that if a man has any individual property and holding whatever in a town, he ought to have the spark of enough business about him to see that it is to his interest to assist and not knock an effort that was being made to push his town forward. There is a number of things that come up in a town of this size that demands the attention of the public, but unless we are organized in some way, as we have already said, we cannot attend to such matters in a businesslike way. When you are waiting on some fellow in the town to take the lead at some public duty, he in a majority of cases is waiting on you, and the consequence is, there is nothing done, as has been the case here in Odell for several years. The Commercial Club of this town has an active President to direct its affairs and one who we can always rely on doing his duty, if he can get the least bit of encouragement and assistance from the members. So let's all resolve to stand by him from this date and when he assigns us a duty, go do it, and not look to him to shoulder all the responsibilities.

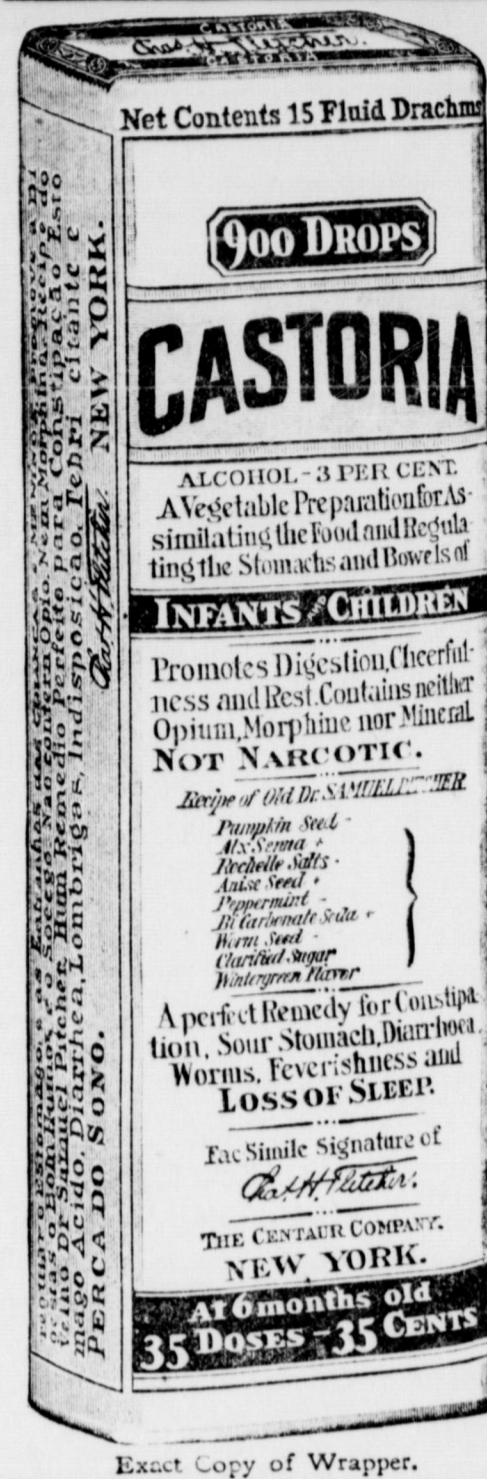
