Wedlockers Succeed in Marrying

Refused License at County Seat and Quanah Without Legalized Order

A marriage ceremony was solemnized here Monday evening at the Handley Hardware Company on North Main street, Charley Y. Barnes and Miss Bertha Rousey being the contracting parties, Elder J. A. Jones officiating.

The groom has been employed on a farm near Doans, while the bride is the daughter of W. N. Rousey a farmer, living on one of J. P. Hamilton's places seven miles east of Odell.

These young people had no little difficulty in obtaining legal marriage license to unite them, as the bride is under eighteen years of age, both the County Clerks at Vernon and Quanah refused to grant them license without a written order from her parents stamped with a Notary Public seal.

They in company with the bride's mother, who had agreeably gave her consent to their marriage, made a trip to Vernon the latter part of the week to secure the necessary papers, with an intention of marrying at that place, but learned after holding a consultation with the county clerk that a necessary legalized order signed by both parents was required under the law, the parties returning home, obtained a signed order from the bride's parents, and left soon after for Quanah where they met with the same fate like at Vernon, as the order did not contain a Notary Public seal, the groom determined not to be out done by such obstacles, left the necessary marriage fees with the county clerk at Quanah, with an understanding that as soon as an order was sent him legally signed by the bride's parents before the Justice of the Peace here at Odell, he (the Hardeman County Clerk) was to forward the license which reached here Monday morning, the matrimonial seekers coming to town in the evening, the ceremony as stated was performed.

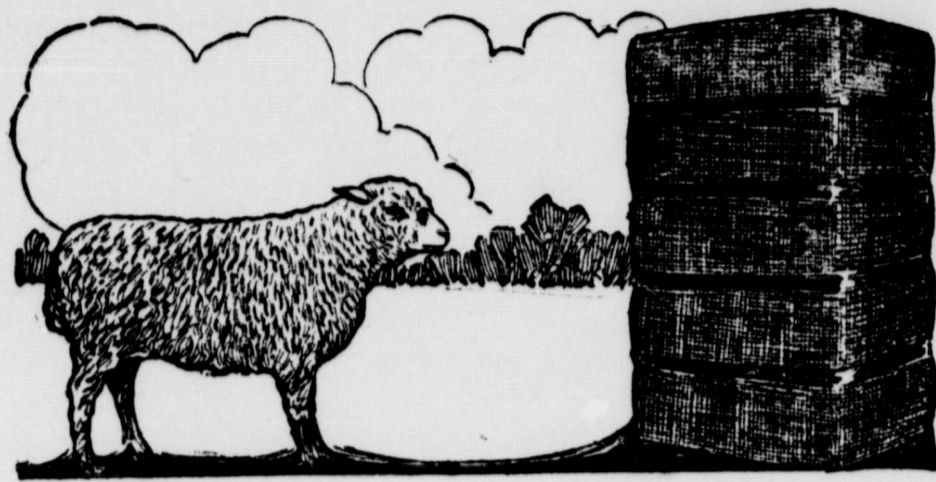
After the election day, all defeated candidates that were out for office can very near give an approximate list of all hypocrits in the county.
