"Just a few words to let you know that I haven't forgotten you yet. I have been intending to write for some time, but I have just been putting it off.

"I suppose Odell is a busy little burg by this time. Would sure like to be there, but you know its a long way to "Tipperary" now.

"I don't think it will take us long to finish this business anyway. And probably I will get to see my home again.

"Tell A. P. Morris to be sure and take care of those egg cases Ha. Ha.

"I am not with my company anymore. I am a military police now. I had a letter from W. M. Scott a few days ago and he said cotton was twenty six and half cents a pound. Well that is good. I am proud to hear of that. I think the farmers around

Rev. Lynn Says The New Year Holds Many Bright Opportunities Also Alluring Temptations

Watchman, what of the night? And what of the morning? The morning cometh. Inquire ye.

These extracts of God's Word recorded in the Prophecies of Isaiah, hold for us a profound lesson of life, if indeed we are wise enough to dwell beside the great and inexhaustible storehouse of the Infinite One.

With the Chosen People as well as with the Civitan Greek Roman, etc., the night was divided into several times of watching. The first, second and third watches and so on. Watchmen were stationed on the watch towers, that the people might dwell in safety within the City walls.

Spiritual uses were also made in a figure of the watchmen of Israel on the wall. In the instance of the Text the watchman is being addressed as one who is Prophet, as well as watchman on the wall. And the question is ask of him, what of the night? He answers, the night is coming on, and then seems to pause and continues, also the morning. And then the question is addressed as to the morning. The watchman answering, the morning cometh. And seems to emphasize the importance and wisdom of looking into the wonderful possibilities of the coming morning.

We think with sadness of the neglects and with heart rending grief, of the unkindnesses that have left the scars on the bosom of our beloved companionship in the journey of life. When I stand by the yet open grave of the old year that has slipped away and to repose in the sacred graveyard of the past, there steals into my life a sacred sadness because I feel that the dear old year that went away last night, was many ways indeed my friend. And as we stand today on the great divide between the one gone and the one coming, on the summit of the one and in the foothills of the other, let us take a retrospect and an inventory.

Watchman what of the night that has just passed away? What has it been to you and to me along the way? It has been a home in which to live and enjoy the blessings that God out of the richness of his wonderful commiseration, has given as we have journeyed in the way from the cradle to the grave and in this hom of life we have been provided with uncherishable riches of Christ. It has been a shop place, a field, a world in which we are given time and opportunity to work in the great plan of the Eternal in our creation and redemption, and with the great purpose of God in bringing us to his final ideal of spiritual manhood out beyond the Stars.

## Fire Destroyed Fain Farm Residence Sunday

Blaze Had its Start From Bad Flue on House-No Insurance

The Fain farm residence two miles east of Odell burned Sunday morning between 8 and 9 o'clock.

The farm is rented for the coming year to Jesse Cline and he and his family moved into the house one day last week. The place was cultivated by Luther Anderson and J. H. Adams last year.

The fire is said to have originated from a bad flue. Mr. Cline stating that he and his family had finished eating their breakfast and were seated around the stove, when they heard the roar of the fire above them. And as the wind was blowing strong, they soon discovered their efforts to save the house would prove futile, so begun immediately to move out the household goods.

Practically all the family bed clothing was saved and some furniture.

The farm is owned by Mrs. Fain at Vernon. And the house that burned was one among the oldest houses in this part of the county. No insurance was carried on the house and the fire was a complete loss for Mrs. Fain. However she will rebuild.

The good, honest devout life is only the more blessed and profound is the blessing when crushed by the hand of sorrow. The Jasmine flower when crushed fills the room with a delicious fragrance and the life of a good man or woman often when crushed fills the world with a most holy incense. But I do not weep today on account of the griefs and sorrows that have cast their shadow and then passed on. They had a mission to fill, a service to perform and have done their ministry and leaving a benediction have left me stronger and buoyant with hope. But my friend I weep today because of the sins of the past. Oh, why was I so thoughtless as to wound the great and compassionate heart of my tender Christ and to sin against the sympathetic and infinite love of my Heavenly Father. Oh sin! My sin, thou dreadful spectre of the night! Turn from me thy frightful face, for how can I look back into the night, when a monster like thyself stands to torment and to laugh by the grave of my buried hopes? ## FOLLOW CAMPAIGN OF JOSHUA

British Army Duplicates Victory of Head of Israelite Hosts, Marching Over the Same Ground.

And now the British Mesopotamian army has captured Hebron, 20 miles from the birthplace of Christ, observes the Wichita (Kan.) Beacon.

More than 33 centuries ago Joshua, at the head of the Israelite hosts, marched over the same ground capturing Hebron and putting its king to death. In one of the battles he found the time was too short and so he commanded the sun and moon to stand still while his men fought.

Forty years before, Moses was leading the children of Israel out of Egypt to this promised land of Canaan. He sent out spies, who were overawed by the giant sons of Anak whom they saw at Hebron. All but Joshua and Caleb gave unfavorable reports, and the Lord was displeased at the perverseness and the credulity of the Israelites, and decreed that they must wander 40 years in the wilderness.

"How are the mighty fallen," mournfully sang David as a requiem for his friend Jonathan, nearly 3,000 years ago, and then he asked the Lord for guidance. God commanded him to go to Hebron, and there he was anointed king of Judah and reigned seven years before going to Jerusalem.

And almost 40 centuries ago Abraham built an altar at Hebron and there bought his first land. There was buried his faithful wife Sarah, and also Isaac and Rebekah and Jacob and Leah and Joseph.

The bones of the shepherd patriarchs, of David, the sweet singer of Israel; of Joshua, the mighty warrior; have crumbled and mingled with the sands of the centuries, but the world fights on over its ancient battlegrounds, and mankind, like Sisyphus, rolling the great burden to the top of the hill, sees it roll back and create another task.

But mankind has learned. Upon reaching Hebron it refuses to be awed by the giants who bar the way to the promised land of world peace and freedom.

It is a strange and wonderful drama that is taking place on earth today.

## Futile Disputes.

In stating prudential rules for our government in society, I must not omit the important one of never entering into dispute or argument with another. I never saw an instance of one of two disputants convincing the other by argument.

I have seen many, on their getting warm, becoming rude and shooting one another.

Conviction is the effect of our own dispassionate reasoning, either in solitude or weighing within ourselves, dispassionately, what we hear from others, standing uncommitted in argument ourselves. It was one of the rules which, above all others, made Doctor Franklin the most amiable of men in society, "never to contradict anybody." If he was urged to announce an opinion, he did it rather by asking questions, as if for information, or by suggesting doubts—Thomas Jefferson.

## German Schooling.

German schooling has proved antagonistic to co-operation, although demanding unity of action through mass obedience. Winthrop Talbot writes in the Century. It has failed to foster real co-operation, for co-operation is a method by which persons of their own volition and by no compulsion may work together harmoniously. Only when training and schooling are the common privilege of all is that state of civic development possible which permits society to become co-operative in its action. In other words, a socialized society becomes more possible only as all individual members acquire each the widest vision, and thus the power to co-operate harmoniously.

## Pay of Our Marine Chaps.

The pay of officers and crews of vessels in the American merchant marine is as follows: Captain, \$250 a month; chief officer, \$140; second officer, \$130; third officer, \$120; chief engineer, \$190; first assistant engineer, \$140; second assistant engineer, \$130; third assistant engineer, \$130; carpenters, \$75; boatswain, \$70; oiler, \$60; coal passers, \$50. In addition to the regular wages the officers and men now receive bonuses, which materially increase their earnings.

## Concerning Gasoline.

The war department has estimated that the daily gasoline needs of America for war purposes will be 959,000 gallons for the next few years. Government figures show that the total daily gasoline production in the United States is 6,849,000 gallons.

The Bureau of Mines has authorized the publication of a bulletin which states that a saving of 1,500,000 gallons of gasoline may be effected every day by Americans by the careful observation of certain simple suggestions. The bureau of mines would conserve a half million gallons more of gasoline daily than will be demanded by the government to operate its necessary war equipment or to carry on its other necessary industries during times of war.

What Americans need to learn at this time is to conserve gasoline judiciously and sensibly.—Peoria Journal.

## Turn Out Limbs in 48 Hours.

Two Clyde shipbuilding firms have been turning their attention to the manufacture of artificial limbs, says a Glasgow correspondent, and have produced in 48 hours a limb at a moderate cost which is said to be far superior to any other produced in the country. One thousand maimed soldiers have already been fitted, and 9,000 are on the waiting list.

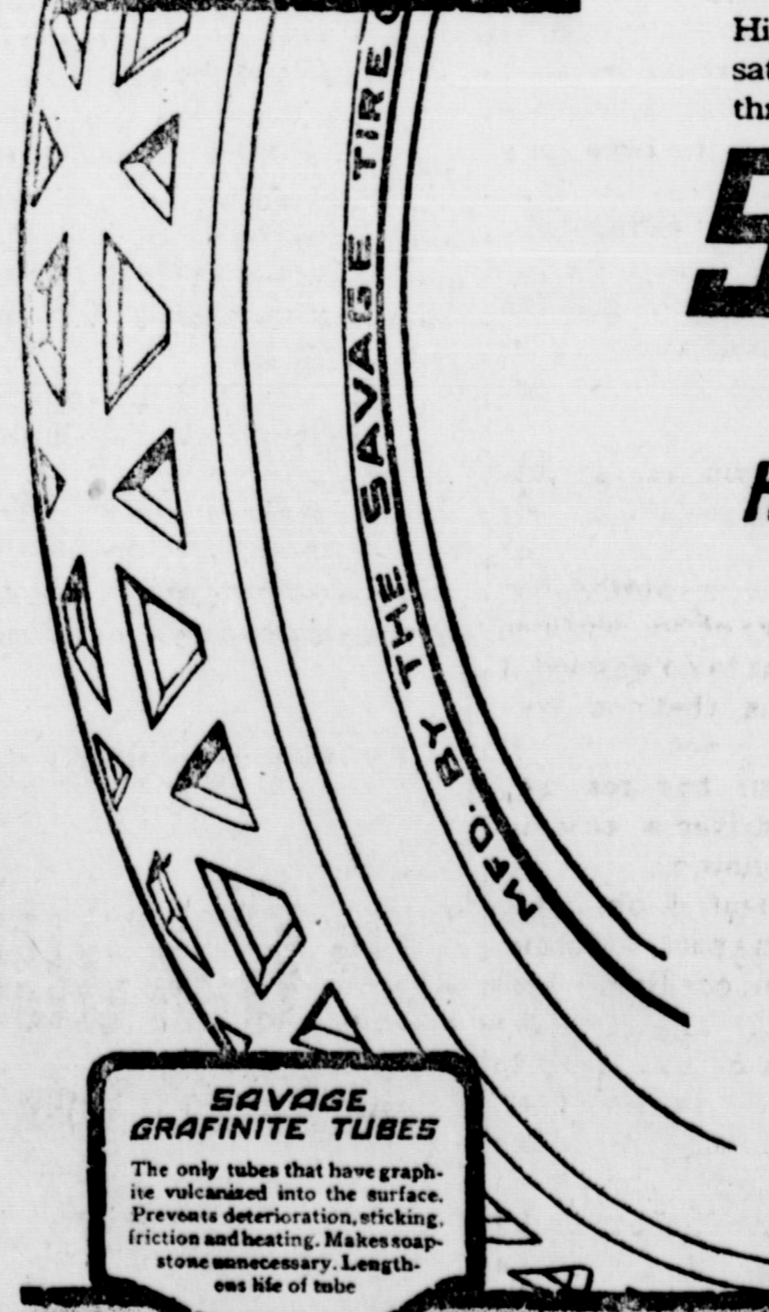

#### BRINGS OUT LATENT TRAITS
