Vernon, Texas, Nov. 27-A word to the tax payers of Wilbarger County:

"Did you know that there is a movement on foot to tax you for the building of a road from Cemetery, two miles east from Vernon down the railroad to Vernon?

A road that will cost (it is claimed by many) twenty-five or thirty thousand dollars, that will not be worth five cents to more than one per cent of the tax-payers of the County. Well such is the fact in this case, and you should get busy and see if I am not right.

Your last commissioners' court passed an order for this; one of the most absurd and unreasonable propositions you or I ever heard of.

The vote stood two for and two against the order and Mr. Copelond saddled it on us, and what will it cost him? Nothing to speak of.

You should get busy and see your commissioner and have this matter looked into at once, as I am informed by those who are susposed to know that this order is illegal from start to finish and by all means be stopped at once; else you will have something to regret as long as you live.

This petition was worked up with a view to divert travel over the Gulf Colorado road as it now stands, and if they could do such a thing it would cause thousands to pass through Vernon yearly, and not know it was Vernon?


