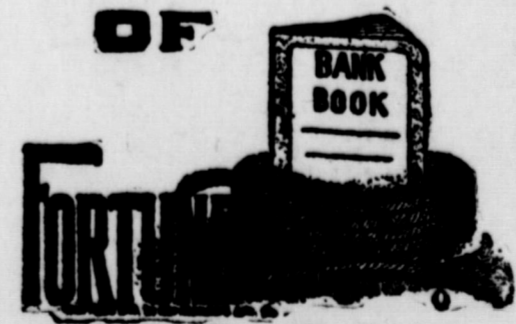

Seven years ago to meet an automobile out on the country roads was a rare occurrence. But if you start now in any direction from Odell, you will go but a short distance until a Ford car will pass you.

European war Peace rumors are again receiving space in the daily newspapers. But since there has been so much peace talk put out and nothing of any note has ever been accomplished toward ending the bloody struggle across the Big Lake, the average reader of the papers doesn't give these Peace rumors much thought.

The body of Col. Paul Waples, who was accidentally killed near Fort Worth last Wednesday, was laid to rest in the Denison Cemetery Sunday evening. The passing of this Texas citizen, to our mind, leaves a vacancy in the ranks of Fort Worth's influential men that will be hard to fill. Not only will Fort Worth miss him, but all Texas will suffer a loss. Because on most all occasions when some worthy movement

was on foot for the betterment of the State and country at large, Paul Waples was usually mentioned among those who were behind it.

If we are to lay any weight on the the occasional complimentary remarks we hear about the progress of the Odell Public School, now under the management of Prof. T. J. Doss Superintendent, Prof. H. M. Lowe, Mrs. T. J. Doss, and Miss Euna Killingsworth; the present term promises to be one of the most successful in the history of the school. Odell it seems has always been fortunate in getting a competent set of teachers to look after her school interest and the Reporter sometimes thinks the people of the district do not appreciate the school as they should.

Agricultural Journals, Farm Demonstration Agents and those who are keeping in touch with the high price of cotton seed, are warning the farmer to store away plenty of seed for planting next year. Twenty cents a pound for the staple will be the cause of many farmers who here tofore have not planted a cotton crop, to try their hand and they will want seed. And more so, these Agricultural papers say, that the fellow who has never tilled the soil, is going to rustle next spring for a few acres of land, a mule, and some cotton seed.

To say that the farming class of people in Wilbarger County as whole just now, are in good circumstances financially, in our opinion just mildly expresses the term. For we believe the farming element in this country is in better shape than they have ever been in the history of Wilbarger County. Of course 20 cent cotton is responsible for their prosperity, but cotton is worth the price to grow it, and more so, since the farmer is often referred to as the "back-bone of the nation", he is entitled to a good price for everything he produces and sells.

Since all along this fall it has been a very common thing to see from twenty to thirty bales of cotton, that was grown out of Odell's trade territory, on the street here at one time, to our mind it is pretty good evidence,

that local buyers are paying a little better price for the staple than cotton dealers at neighboring towns. If cotton buyers at some of these nearby towns think they can put one over the farmer when it comes to grading and buying their cotton, they will find out in most cases that it is they, and not the farmer who are fooled. The farmer these days soon finds out where to go to get the best price for what he produces. He gets his daily newspaper with market quotations and a majority of them can class cotton as good as the average street buyer.

Did you ever stop to think that there is plenty of land in this part of Wilbarger County that is paying its owners more per acre this year than they have been valuing an acre of land at. Of course this land has a cotton crop on it and cotton has sold at twenty cents a pound and better this fall. But it is an evident fact, that if cotton holds up to the twenty cent mark for another year or two, some of these old sandy land farms are going sky high in valuation. The cotton crop in this country was produced this year under, what seemed to the growers, very unfavorable circumstances. No rain to speak of moistened the cotton fields until late in the summer, yet these same fields are yielding the farmer all the way from a third to a half bale of cotton to the acre. When a bale of the staple, not counting the seed, sells for from seventy five to one hundred dollars and on some few farms an acre of dirt has grown a bale. Doesn't it seem that a whole lot of the land in this part of the County is undervalued.

Struggle for Self-Control

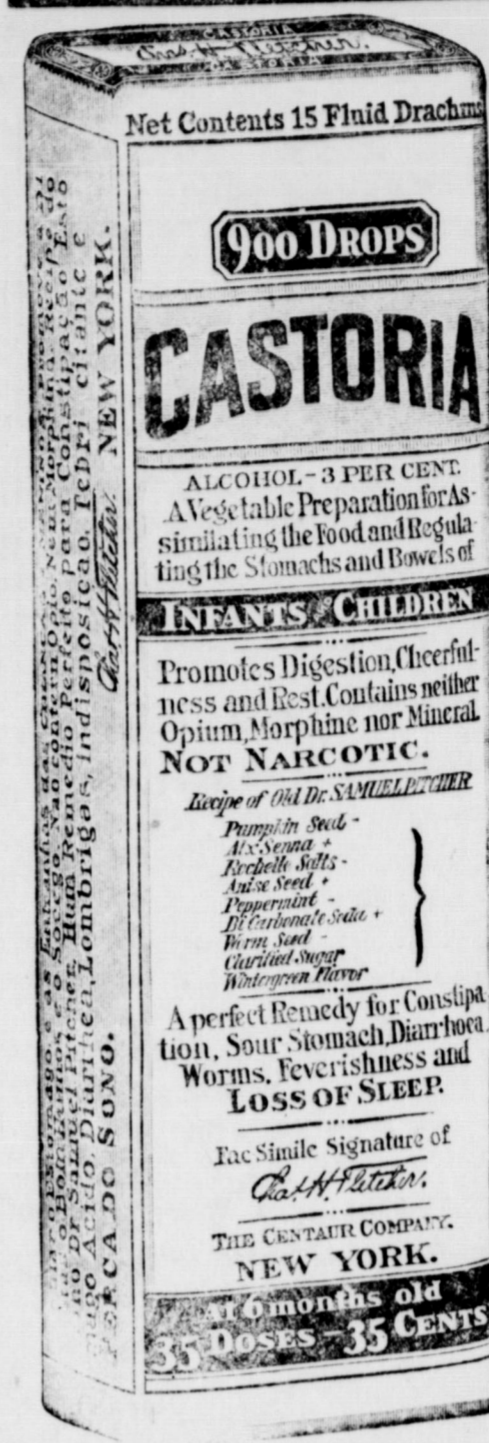

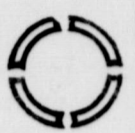
