Hog Cholera Reported in Sections Of This County

County Demonstrator Gives Publicity to The Following Treatment

Since Hog Cholera is reported to be among some of the hogs in this community, the following circular letter received by us this week from our county Demonstration Agent H. M. Means, might be of benefit to some of the farmers in this part of the county. The circular which was mailed to Mr. Means, from College Station, by Dr. Frank R. Jones, U. S. Veterinary Field Agent, deals with the treatment of hogs infected with the disease and also gives some valuable information telling how to disinfect and stop the spreading of cholera among hogs.

The letter in part follows.
To Farmers of Texas

Farmers themselves can do much toward preventing the spread of hog cholera, thus placing swine raising and feeding on a firmer and more profitable basis. To this end the following suggestions are offered:
TO KEEP HOG CHOLERA FROM REACHING YOUR HERD

Locate your hog lots and pastures away from streams and public highways, and not allow the hogs to run free range.

Do not visit your neighbor or allow him to visit you, if either of you have hog cholera on your premises.

Do not drive into hogs when returning from market or after driving on public highways.

Do not use hog lots for yarding wagons and farm implements

Do not place newly purchased stock, stock secured or loaned for breeding purposes, or stock exhibited at county fairs, with your herd. Keep such stock quarantined at least two weeks, and use care to prevent carrying infection from these to other pens in feeding and attending stock.

Burn to ashes or cover with quick lime and bury under four feet of earth all dead animals and the viscera removed from animals at butchering time, because they attract the attention of buzzards, dogs, etc. which are liable to carry hog cholera infection.

Confine your dogs and do not keep pigeons unless you confine them.

IF HOG CHOLERA APPEARS IN YOUR HERD

Treat your hogs immediately with anti hog cholera serum, after which they should be kept on a light diet and pure drinking water, and confined to limited quarters that may be cleaned daily and sprayed three times a

New Cotton-Picking Machine

An entirely new idea for a cotton-picking machine has been developed by Dr. F. J. Briggs of

Glencoe, Oklahoma, and embodied in his picker. The machine consists of a steel frame and two broad drivewheels, the two wheels turning on a single axletree, each drivewheel carrying in it forty eight pickers.

These pickers consist of a central rod or spindle, with a small gear wheel on the outer end of each spindle. The inner end of each spindle is covered to the middle with a brass tubing. Through fifty holes in the tubing operate fifty appearing and disappearing, sharp, picking needles. Inside of each drivewheel, midway between the tire and axletree is located a drum. On this drum is a zigzag track, or a track shifting from one side of the drum to the other. As the drivewheels revolve these zigzag tracks project the spindles from each wheel into the cotton row, the spindles entering the row about five inches above the ground, beneath the limbs of the cotton plant. The spindles are automatically thrown into gear and are made to revolve rapidly with a forward motion in the direction the picker is traveling. The spindles projecting into the cotton row causes the picking needles, attached to the spindle, to appear through the holes in the brass tubing, and to pick, as the spindles revolve, the opened cotton without damage to the cotton plant. When the drivewheels have carried the revolving spindles up over the machine the zigzag tracks cause the picking needles to disappear into the brass tubing, releasing the picked cotton and causing it to fall into receptacles. The cotton released, the zigzag tracks then cause the spindles to disappear out of gear, into the drivewheel.

The doctor's first machine picked about 89 per cent of the opened lint. The new and perfected machine, the doctor believes will pick not less than 90 per cent of the opened cotton—Illustrated World.
