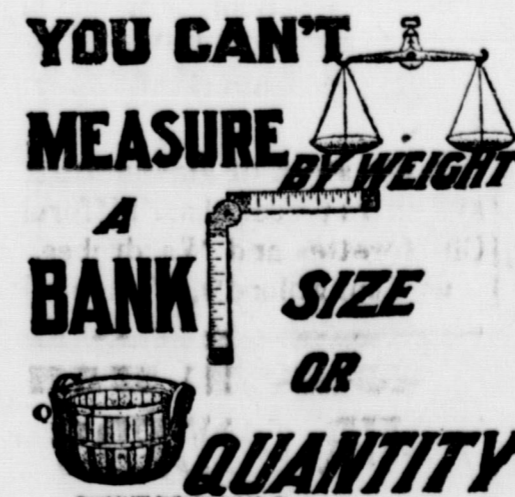

The fellow in Wilbarger county who is continually kicking about the condition of the roads, should be reminded of the fact

that it was only a short time ago when it was almost an impossibility to drive a car over some of the roads. Now there are but few highways in this county that an automobile will not go over. So you see we have made some progress in road building after all.

If you are a citizen of Odell and haven't a good reason for not being present at the Commercial Club meeting tomorrow night, those who will be there will know your interest in the town and community is not very deep. Come out there is some important business to come up.

Do not think for one time the British people are not conserving and economically using their food supply. It is reported that fats, that which heretofore has been thrown away around army camps is now being converted into Glycerin and used in making shells to fight the Huns. The waste it is said, in fighting products amounts to \$400,000 monthly John Bull is in to win this war.

It is occasionally mentioned by some here who are interested in seeing Odell make a more rapid growth, that the town be incorporated. Of course when the idea is mentioned to some who claim citizenship in our little city it has a tendency to shake them up and create within them a fear of heavy taxes. Still those who would favor incorporating ought not to expect the idea to meet with the approval of all at first and the only way to settle such question will be to settle it in some way by vote

Really isn't it a queer thing how little assistance the human race will offer the fellow who is down and out. Let him start climbing and his friends from angle will give him a boost. But let him start down at a time when he really needs their assistance and watch how fast they will kick him. Former Governor James E. Ferguson lately started him a paper at Temple which he christened "Ferguson's Forum". The paper was launched for the purpose of heralding his announcement for another term as Governor of Texas and to explain in his way his side of the question that put him in a bad light with the people of Texas. The fact that Ferguson had started him a newspaper for that purpose would have really been news to the people, but we have yet to see where a newspaper in Texas has ever mentioned it.

The Reporter upon request of some in Odell, time after time, has called the people's attention to the danger of speeding automobiles on main street. But with all the warning that has been put out, even considering that which the local officers have given the public; this reckless car driving in Odell goes on. There is a law that is provis-

ioned by the county to stop this. And citizens of the town who realize the danger of people being run over, and if not killed, probably crippled for life, should go out of their way in assisting the officers to enforce the law. And since there is law to prohibit this speeding the fellow at the steering wheel should be forced to be cautious.

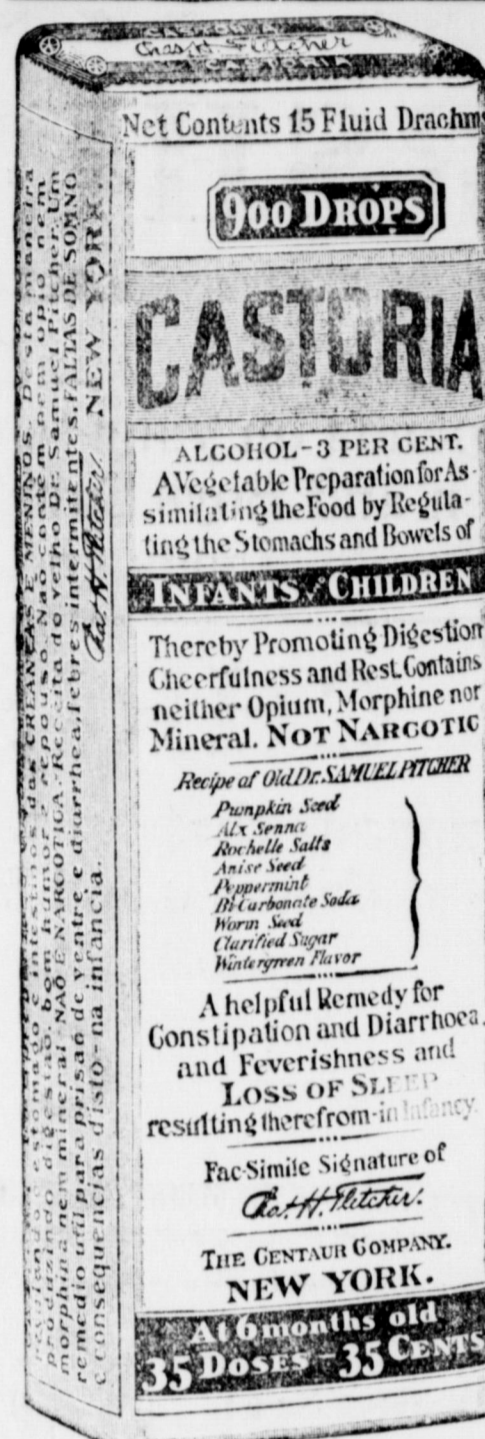
You know him—I know him everybody knows him. He's the main cog in the community machinery—a veritable wheel within a wheel—the dam, the water, and in fact, the whole power

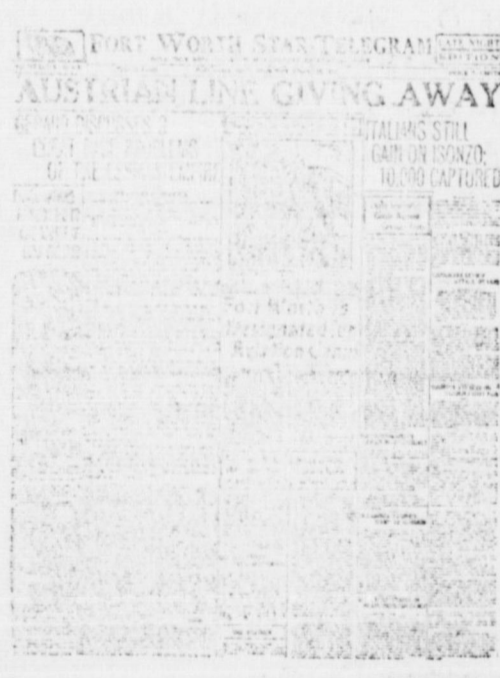
