The Agriculture Department has arranged to relieve the shortage in 25 western and southern states of fats and oils for cooking purposes according to report of July 2 by this Department.

The states getting this relief and described as receiving less than their share are Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Florida, Kentucky, Tennessee, Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Utah, and Wyoming.

The Department said these states should begin to receive increased supplies between July 5 and 10th.

Mr. Horan said a June 15 inventory showed that 288,400 tons of sugar is stored in California, 21,000 tons in Oregon, 29,500 tons in Washington, 36,650 tons in Idaho, 48,450 tons in Montana and 41,600 tons in Utah.

He was born April 17, 1868, at Hope, Mo. He taught school in that state several years before coming to Texas. Since 1915, he had maintained a home at 1642 Orange Street in Abilene.

He was married in Missouri to the former Addie M. Russell, who survives. Also surviving are four children, Paul L. Oder of Hollywood, Calif., Earnest F. Oder of Sweetwater, J. Russell Oder of St. Louis, Mo., and Mrs. Irion of Memphis, Tenn.; a sister, Mrs. Wallace H. Douglas of Smithville, Mo., a sister-in-law, Mrs. C. H. Bradley of Delano, Calif., all of whom were at his bedside.

Funeral services were held at the University Baptist church in Abilene of which he had been a member for many years, Saturday at 5 p. m. with the Rev. C. A. Powell of Rule, a former pastor, officiating, and the Rev. W. C. Ashford, Southside Baptist pastor, assisting. Luther Webb conducted the music.

STAMFORD RAISES SCHOOL TAXES TO \$1.50 BY ELECTION VOTE

In a school election Tuesday, the Stamford school district voted to increase the special school tax from \$1.00 on the \$100 valuation to a maximum of \$1.50 on the \$100 valuation. The vote was 272 for, and 115 against.

Increased teachers salaries are expected to result from the additional tax voted. Proceeds of the bond issue will be applied to remodeling Bomer Heights school, making necessary renovations at the high school and to meet future building needs.

Lone Star Canning Bulletin Boost To Food Preservation

Cooperating with the Department of Agriculture's appeal for National Home Food Preservation Week July 15-22, Lone Star Gas Company's current recipe bulletin stresses modern methods of canning fruits, vegetables and meats to assure Americans a better diet and help the famine stricken of the world.

Copies of the bulletin, "Cooking With Gas," are available without charge through the company's business offices or requests may be mailed to Lone Star's home economics department in Dallas at 301 S. Harwood Street.

National food preservation week will focus attention on necessity of home preservation of food supplies for winter when food is badly needed throughout the world; it will emphasize need for food preservation throughout summer and fall.

The bulletin points out that canning is one of the best means of food conservation and describes the pressure cooker, boiling water bath and open kettle methods of canning fish, pickles and relishes. Recipes for sugar substitutes and those requiring minimum sugar are given.

The pressure cooker method is the nearest approach to commercial canning and will handle any kind of food, the bulletin says, and the water bath method is "recommended for canning fruits, tomatoes and tomato mixtures." The open kettle method "may be used for preserving and pickling."

One section of the bulletin is devoted to containers, lids and sterilizing. Other points stressed are pre-cooking or blanching of fruits and vegetables, and how to detect food spoilage. It warns, "don't throw away food value! In pre-cooking vegetables and fruits, use the cooking liquid to fill the jars. Valuable minerals and vitamins leak out into the water, and will be lost forever if the water is discarded."

Dr. Cox Gives Advice On Bites By Rabid Animals

With a sharp increase in the number of persons being bitten by rabid animals in East Texas, and similar occurrences reported in other sections of the state, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, recently warned all Texans to be on the alert for symptoms of this disease when around domestic or wild animals.

The 2,166 animal heads received for examination by the State Health Department during the past year have shown 687 positives, including incidence among cats, dogs, horses, rabbits, rats, squirrels, skunks, guinea pigs, coyotes, gophers, racoons, hogs, sheep and prairie dogs.

Rabies is transmitted to man through a bite or having a cut exposed to the saliva of a rabid animal. Bites through clothing are not as dangerous as bites on exposed surfaces, because the saliva is wiped off as the tooth passes through the cloth.

If a person is bitten, the offending animal should be penned, if possible, for a period of ten days observation. If the animal is normal at the end of that time, the case can be dismissed. If it is necessary to kill the animal, this should be done in such a manner that the brain is not destroyed, otherwise, an examination to determine whether or not the animal had rabies will be impossible. If the head is sent to the State Health Department, care should be used in properly icing it to prevent decomposition.

Premium list and instructions will be ready for distribution by August 1, concludes the committee chairman.

Back of all the talk of inflation and price control is the undeniable fact that heavily increased production is our only salvation.

Everyone knows that black markets are created by an inadequate supply of desired goods in normal, legitimate outlets. This country's price control policies have contributed unnecessarily to that inadequacy. No one will produce an article if he can't sell it for enough to pay the cost. And no manufacturer, farmer, or retailer can "hold the price line" indefinitely in the face of increased wages and operating expenses beyond his control. He must raise his prices or quit producing.

In the case of many agricultural products, the government has attempted to meet the issue through the old advice of subsidies. A child can see the economic fallacy in that a subsidy means that a part of the cost of what you purchase is paid for out of your tax dollars. In the long run, the bill is greater.

Those who try to bring about businesslike administration of price control aren't the friends of inflation. They are the friends of production, inflation's enemy. This country has the greatest production capacity of any country in the world. It has in addition, a highly competitive distribution system which is a miracle of efficiency. Until these forces can operate freely, we shall continue to enrich the black market, and prevent legitimate producers and distributors in all fields from performing the vast services of which they are capable thereby assuring goods at the least inflated prices.

State Fair At Dallas To Open On October 5th

The State Fair, which opens at Dallas October 5, will allot the first four days to 4-H Clubs and Future Farmers of America, announces R. L. Thornton, president of the State Fair Association. All barns and pens will be placed at the disposal of clubs over the state and school age exhibitors will be kings of the show the first five days of the show with junior divisions showing the 5, 6, 7 and 8 and senior division allotted October 9.

This is a new streamlined procedure, says Thornton, that will make more room in the arenas for exhibitions by both groups, shorten showing time and enable boys and girls to return to school with a minimum of time lost.

In order to alleviate crowded conditions that have resulted in former years when animals to be shown in both junior and senior divisions were brought at the beginning of the show and kept till the last days, states Roy Wilson, chairman of the junior farm and ranch committee, the association plans to have all facilities turned over to boys and girls to house and show their livestock.

BIBLE QUESTIONS ANSWERED BY THE VOICE OF PROPHECY

Q.—When does God reward men here or hereafter?

A.—Please read Matthew 16:27: "For the Son of man shall come in the glory of His Father with His angels; and then He shall reward every man according to his works."

Q.—Was there a city called Babylon in the days of the apostles? (See I Peter 5:13).

A.—Yes, Babylon was still a large city in the days of the apostles. Several centuries later it was completely destroyed, and today it is a desolation.

Q.—Do you not believe that those four strange animals mentioned in the seventh chapter of Daniel are new species that will be developed by science?

A.—No. They are not literal animals at all, but symbols of great world powers. Daniel 7:23 says: "The fourth beast shall be the fourth kingdom upon earth." The first beast was the first kingdom, or Babylon; the second, Medo-Persia; the third, Greece; and the

fourth, Rome.

Q. Will not Christ's coming be a silent growth of good?

A.—The New Testament says, No. "For the Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God; and the dead in Christ shall rise first; then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air; and so shall we ever be with the Lord. Wherefore comfort one another with these words." I Thessalonians 4:16-18.

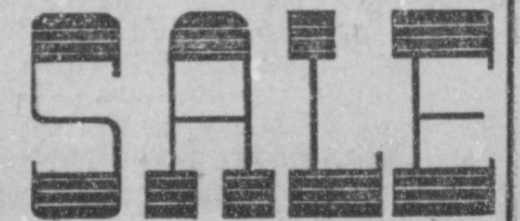

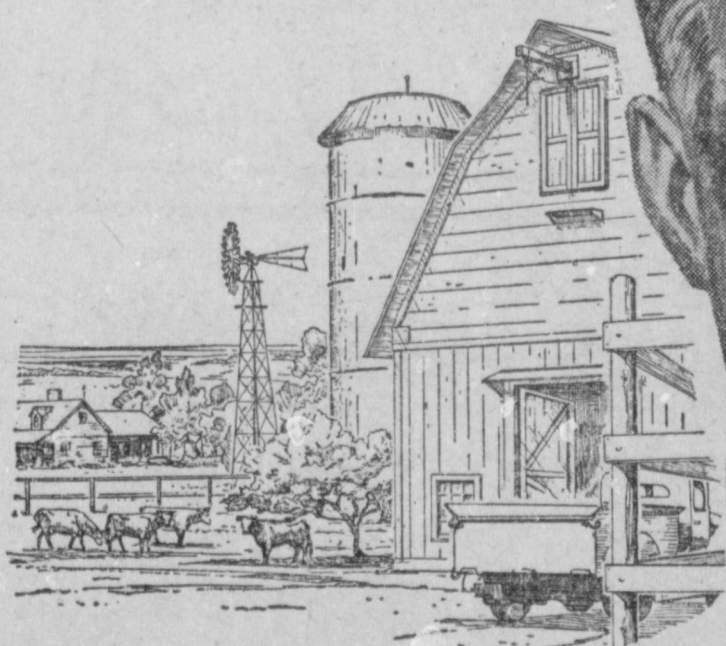
