# Akin Gives Conservative View on Jr. College

The following article, by Charlie Akin of Sundown, is timely, and is something that everyone should read—it tells you about the offer Sundown made to the junior college of trustees:

At the invitation of the Hockley County Junior College board of trustees, the Sundown Board of Education met with the college board on Thursday evening, May 2, at Levelland, and the two

groups discussed the feasibility of establishing the Junior College in the Sundown High School Building which had previously been offered by the Sundown Board for use by the college. Murry Fly, former superintendent of schools at Odessa and currently President of Odessa Junior College, was present for the meeting between the two groups. Without viewing the Sundown school plant, Mr. Fly offered the opinion that the use of the high school building by the college would be unsatisfactory.

The Odessa Junior College was founded in the Odessa High School plant and later, when it outgrew its original quarters, a separate college plant was established. There is no question but that Mr. Fly was basing his opinions on his experiences at Odessa. However, the situation in Hockley County is quite different from that of Odessa at the time the Odessa Junior College was first begun. As a matter-of-fact, there is no parallel between the two situations even at this time. Texas Tech, which is 140 miles distant, is the nearest senior college to Odessa. Whereas Hockley County has two senior colleges, other than Tech, much nearer than that. The population of Ector County is about six or seven times that of Hockley County, not to mention the city of Midland, which is only 15 miles from Odessa.

It is reported that after several years of operation THE ODESSA JUNIOR COLLEGE HAS AN ENROLLMENT OF APPROXIMATELY 600 STUDENTS FOR REGULAR CLASSES. Con-

considering the population of the territory from which the Odessa Junior College draws its students, which NUMBERS SOME TEN OR TWELVE TIMES THAT OF THE TERRITORY WHICH THE HOCKLEY COUNTY JUNIOR COLLEGE COULD HOPE TO DRAW FROM, a maximum of about sixty students is all that might be expected for the Hockley County school. Some of the better informed people on the matter of junior colleges have informed us that we could expect to operate for several years before reaching an enrollment of two hundred students for courses in which they could transfer their credits to most senior schools. And some of them estimate that this might be the maximum number we could expect in the foreseeable future.

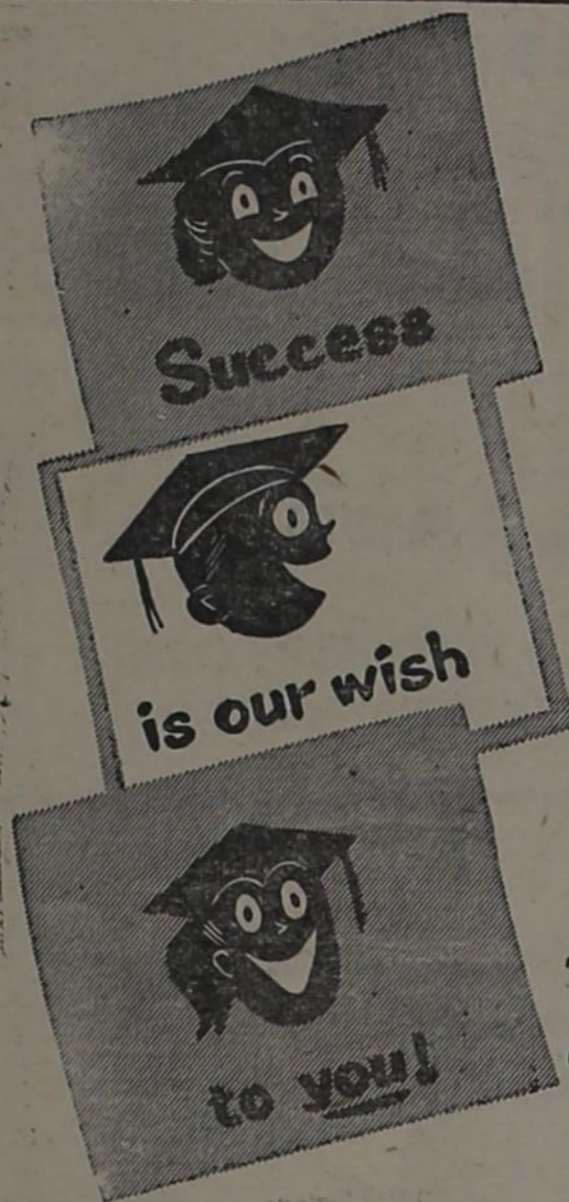
If the judgement of these people is to be taken at face value, then the Sundown facilities would be sufficient to house the Hockley County Junior College indefinitely. And should it be desirable to offer night classes and such courses as "Christmas Package Wrapping", the Sundown plant would still be adequate to accommodate the needs for such.

Contrary to a report published in one of the papers of the county, the SUNDOWN HIGH BUILDING CONTAINS OVER TWENTY-THREE THOUSAND SQUARE FEET OF FLOOR SPACE, rather than 2,400 square feet. This building has one of the best equipped science labs to be found anywhere. Its home economics lab is equally as good as the science lab. Two large rooms, divided by a glass partition, is provided for the commercial department. It has a music and speech room, a large library, two sets of offices, a large room suitable for assemblies, and other class rooms. The Sundown Board of

Education is to be highly commended for expressing a willingness to permit the use of the Sundown High building. In effect, it will mean the saving of a large sum of money to the taxpayers of Hockley County if the Junior College authorities should see fit to accept the Sundown offer. We are all prone to decry the fact that taxes continue to pyramid at the same time living costs have been increasing and our economy has been so hard pressed. The Sundown School Board has publicly demonstrated the intestinal fortitude and wisdom that has been woe-

fully lacking in most deliberative bodies in recent times. To most sober minded people of Hockley County the feeling persists that the trust and confidence placed in the Sundown Board has been well founded. The sagacious manner in which this body has calmly considered the conditions and circumstances involved in the matter of establishing a junior college in Hockley County is convincing evidence of the sincerity of each of its members.

With ADDITIONAL TAX ASSESSMENTS, the warning becomes nearer a reality Turn to Page 6

that more of the COUNTY TAX LOAD will be shifted from the OIL INDUSTRY TO THE SHOULDERS OF LOCAL TAXPAYERS. This should be given some careful thought by all those concerned. When dreaming of spacious grounds and numerous magnificent facilities for a Hockley County Junior College, we wonder if the cost and operation has been duly considered? It is not the grandeur that will be of worth—if your boy or girl has the necessary desire for knowledge and the advantage of competent instructors, then he or she will come much nearer to realizing the maximum benefits which the institutions have to offer that go in less for pomp and more for sound educational principles.

Mr. Fly's reasoning that the junior college could not succeed if it were established in the Sundown High School, because of what he termed "psychological factors", could be construed by the very same token to mean that any junior college could not succeed because of the psychological factors involved in relation to the senior colleges and the prestige associated with them.

Let's become unique in Hockley County — LET'S VEER FROM THE TREND OF CARELESS SPENDING which appears to be carrying the nation very rapidly toward a state of bankruptcy. Let's do a better job than the others do and let's do it in a more economical manner. Let's educate our youngsters to have respect for the value of a dollar while they are being

exposed to academic training. There is a good chance the Sundown Board of Education will consider leasing the high school building for use as a junior college at a nominal rental. If and when the college outgrows the present facilities offered at this plant, then be guided by the conditions prevailing at that time as to the course to follow from there. It is very apparent that in most instances everybody's business becomes nobody's business, and therein lies the path to the downfall of our economic structure. By setting the example, let's teach our boys and girls the virtue of thrift at the same time we are providing them with higher education. If they have one without the other they aren't properly equipped to cope with the problems of life and will never be able to par the course.

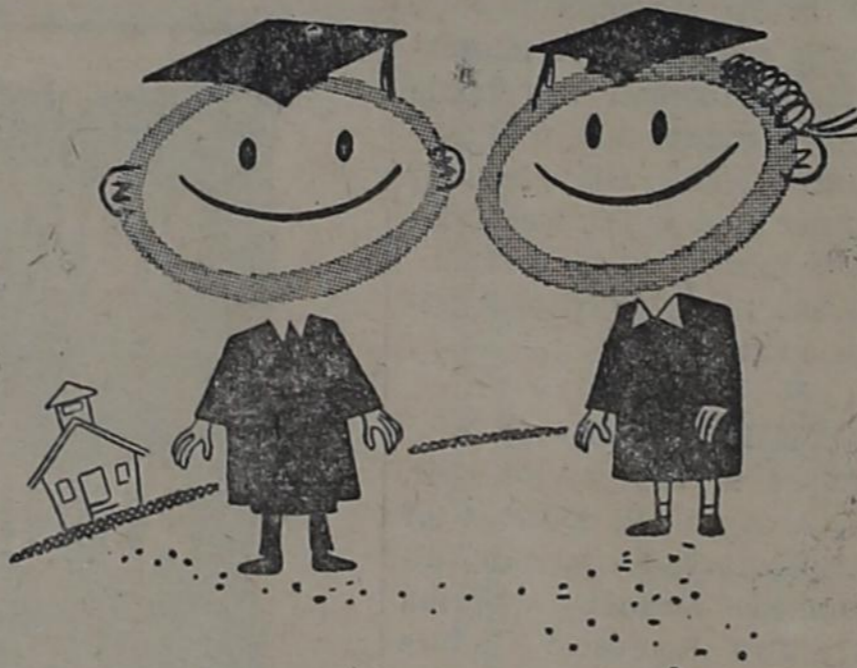

Practically every discussion concerning honesty in state government usually ends with a remark something like this:

"Well, if the people would pay more attention to what goes on in Austin there'd be fewer dishonest officials."

That statement, true as it is, does not reveal exactly how such attention can be created, but it certainly does bring up a question that leads the way to better state government.

How CAN we get the voters more interested in state government?

If a successful answer to that question is found, Texas will be well on its way toward more efficient, honest government.

House Speaker Carr hit the nail on the head the other day when he said state government was "on its way back to real confidence and integrity." But there's a lot to be done before state officials can regain ground lost earlier this session when new tales of bribery and scandal made front page news.

Most state officials are hard-working conscientious people who do their jobs well. They are dependable, honest employees and representatives who command the respect of even the most demanding employer. But they don't make front page news. The dishonest ones, with their explosive schemes, are the ones most likely to create widespread comment.

As for how to get more people interested in state government, there are many people thinking and working toward possible solutions.

This column was begun to furnish more information to the people of this senatorial district. There are similar programs by lawmakers in other parts of the state. The Texas Press Association releases an information column weekly, and news services are furnishing more complete coverage of government activities than ever before.

All these things help explain state government. But if we do the job we need to, someone's going to have to come up with more ideas.
