The Texas Highway Commission recently approved the expenditure of \$217,100.00 for highway safety and betterment and for Farm to Market Road improvement in Hockley County during 1969.

District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock said that a total of 61.5 miles in Hockley County will be involved in the annual program. Work will be under the supervision of James W. King, District Maintenance Engineer, from Lubbock.

The work is part of the Highway Commission's combined Farm to Market Road Improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for 1969.

#### F. H. A. Reports On Credit Programs

Credit programs of the U.S. Farmers Administration helped more than 156 farm families in Hockley County improve their homes, family farms and communities during fiscal year 1968, Supervisor Horace D. Gilmore of the agency's county office in Levelland said today.

Farmer's Home Demonstration loans and grants in the county totaled \$1,491,270.00 in 1968. Gilmore reported that the Farmer's Home Administration, which supplements all other credit available to rural people, has added \$3,124,260 to the county's resources with loans and grants the past two years through a range of programs.

With the turnover of funds invested by borrower families, associations and communities, the agency's work is estimated to have had a \$21,869,820.00 impact on the county's economy during 1967 and 1968.

An estimated 8 families benefited from loans for construction or improvement of family homes in the county during the year. Family farmers who lacked other sources of credit turned to Farmer's Home Administration for \$60,000 in loans to secure farm ownership and improved their farms and \$695,770 in loans for operating purposes.

during 1968. "Many of the 156 farm families served by FHA might have been forced off the land except for this last-resort source of financing," Gilmore said.

The agency also loaned \$637,000 to 84 farmers in the county to overcome losses suffered in natural disasters.

Economic opportunity loans which enable low-income families to equip themselves for income-producing small enterprises—either farming or non-farming production or services they can perform in their rural communities—resulted in small loans totaling \$7,000 to families last fiscal year.

Gilmore said that through 138 county offices, the Farmer's Home Administration in Texas will loan about \$150 million to rural families and communities this fiscal year.

Last year about \$60 million was loaned for operating expenses. Over 4100 rural Texans received loans to improve or construct homes. More than 660 farmers became land owners through the FHA Farm Ownership loan program, and nearly 250 Texas communities received FHA loans to build or expand water systems, sewers, recreation projects and grazing associations.

#### Ag Teachers Work With Future Farmers

Eleven hundred and fifty-four Vocational Agriculture Teachers of Texas are working with forty-eight thousand and seven hundred twenty-two Texas Future Farmers of America this year in helping prepare these young men for the role they will play in tomorrow's agriculture. The task of production of food and fiber for our nation must keep pace with the ever increasing population.

In 1966-67, 48,722 Future Farmers of Texas, in supervised farming programs, produced a labor income of \$5,026,256.62.

High schools in Texas provide an opportunity for their public school system and community to include training in Vocational Agriculture to those young people who show an appreciation for the \$6 billion, 3 million agricultural industry in the Texas economy.

Vocational Agriculture also trained eleven hundred and ninety young men for related employment and opportunity in agribusiness. The training they received in leadership, citizenship and cooperation is valuable as these young men assume their places of responsibility in a changing and challenging society.

#### Voting Information From R. O. Dennis

Voters who have lived in Texas less than a year must apply for a ballot during a 15 day period which began September 6, if they want to vote for President and Vice President in the coming general election. Raymond Dennis, county clerk, announced recently. Applicants must appear in person at the county clerk's office.

This will be the first time that persons having less than a year's residence in the state will be able to vote in a presidential election, Dennis said. A law passed by the Texas Legislature last year permits a voter who moved to Texas from some other state less than a year before general election day to vote for President and Vice President, but for no other offices, if he will have lived in Texas at least 60 days on election day. In order to vote, he must possess all the qualifications required of electors under Texas law except the ordinary residence requirements, and it must also be shown that he was either a qualified elector in another state immediately before his removal to Texas or that he would have been eligible to vote in the presidential election in the state where he formerly lived if he had remained there until election day.

Dennis emphasized that this voting procedure applies only to persons who will have lived in Texas less than a year on election day. If a person moved to Texas before November 5, 1967, he must be registered with the county tax assessor-collector in order to vote in the general election on November 5, and he will vote in the regular manner on election day. However, only those persons who became residents of Texas after October 1, 1967, may register at this time, and they must register by next October 5 in order to vote in the election on November 5. Registration for persons who became residents on or before October 1, 1967, closed last January 31.

Persons voting in the presidential election under this special procedure need not be registered as voters in the county where they now live.

Dennis said that a person who had been issued a voter registration certificate, voter identification card, or other document showing that he was a registered voter in the state from which he moved should take this document with him when he goes to the county clerk's office to apply for a ballot. If he does not have written proof of his registration, it will be necessary for the clerk to obtain verification of his voting eligibility from the voter registrar or other appropriate election official at the place of his former residence before he will be accepted for voting.
