Farm Bureau Speaks As we walked through the out Against Farm Labor Regulations

ACT PROVIDES NO AUTHORITY

The following article was taken from the October 1959 magazine, "Texas Agriculture":

Spokesmen for Farm Bureau told a U. S. Labor Department hearing Sept. 10-11 in Washington that the Department's proposed regulations affecting farm labor housing, transportation, and wages should not be

Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell announced the proposals March 13 and gave as his authority the Wagner-Peyser Act of 1933. A storm of protests immed-Thousands of people were lately went up from the American Farm Bureau Federation and a number of state Farm Bureaus, including Texas. Other agricultural groups, except for one, joined in the protest. The TFB held a mass meeting April 17 in San Angelo to protest the issuance of regulations which would bring agriculture under strict government regulation in the field of farm labor.




