mountains. It is supposed to have been a hide-out for bad men.

They entered Yellowstone National Park at the south entrance and went out at the north entrance at Mammoth Springs. The beautiful drive through the tall green pines and wild flowers was something to see, also the Yellowstone Grand Canyon and the many waterfalls. They enjoyed watching "Old Faithful" acting up. Mrs. Bond states they sat with several hundred people, waiting for "Old Faithful" to perform. It was so cold and windy they thought surely it would soon turn into snow or real cold weather, but by afternoon it was warm.

There were so many places of interest to stop and enjoy, and everywhere were people by the hundreds from almost all of the states. They did not see too many from Texas until they were nearer home.

Mr. and Mrs. Bond left the park and went across into Alberta, Canada. They stopped at Ft. MacLeod, the first fort that was built. Col. James F. MacLeod and a few men known as the Northwest Mounted Police stayed there to try and maintain law and order. It is now rebuilt to look like it was at first. There is a museum containing guns, clothing, stoves, etc., which were used in the early days.

Their next stop was at Calgary Brewery Gardens, where there was a fish hatchery and aquarium. There were flower gardens of all shapes and colors, and rock rimmed pools of water containing trout of all sizes, mostly large, the kind

we wish we could catch when fishing. It was so lovely, and interesting.

The Bonds went on up to Edmonton, capitol of Alberta Province. All of this land is rolling hills or flat, with wheat planted on it or cattle grazing. The wheat was just being harvested with a few fields already cut, though a lot had not been touched.

Their next stop was Saskatchewan, and to Regina, and from there back into the U. S. Everywhere were museums and lovely things to see. Everyone in Canada was so nice and friendly, and couldn't have treated them better, relates Mrs. Bond. The speed limit was 60 miles per hour, with no one driving over that. There were steel barrels all along the highways to place trash. The highways were so clean, not littered with bottles, paper, etc. There were camping spots and picnic areas ready for people to use.

Mr. and Mrs. Bond came back through North Dakota and South Dakota to the lovely Black Hills. They are covered with dark green pine, and look black at a distance. There are good paved roads all through there, and motels everywhere. They visited Mt. Rushmore National Monument. Mrs. Bond says this is something they had wanted to see for a long time, and it is really worth going a long way and to a lot of trouble to see. There is parking space for several hundred cars, and Rangers to direct people and give talks. There are paved paths and steps in walls to the foot of the monument. Faces of the four great presidents, Washington, Roosevelt, Lincoln and Jefferson are so

plain and look exactly like pictures of them. There were hundreds of people present.

They spent the night at Rockerville, a gold camp of early days in the Black Hills of South Dakota. They next visited the badlands — miles and miles of rock formations that look like every shape and size, some tall which looked like houses. It is really something to see.

Mrs. Bond states that in Yellowstone Park the bears would come and sit by the road, and some sat up to pose for picture taking. Many would stop and take pictures of them and feed them. She says they seemed heal gentle but they never got close to any of them.

They returned through Nebraska and Kansas, and ran into a sandstorm in the latter state, which made them feel like getting back home.

She says there were so many wonderful things to see in the different states that anyone needs lots more time, and hope they can return to some of the places and spend more time.

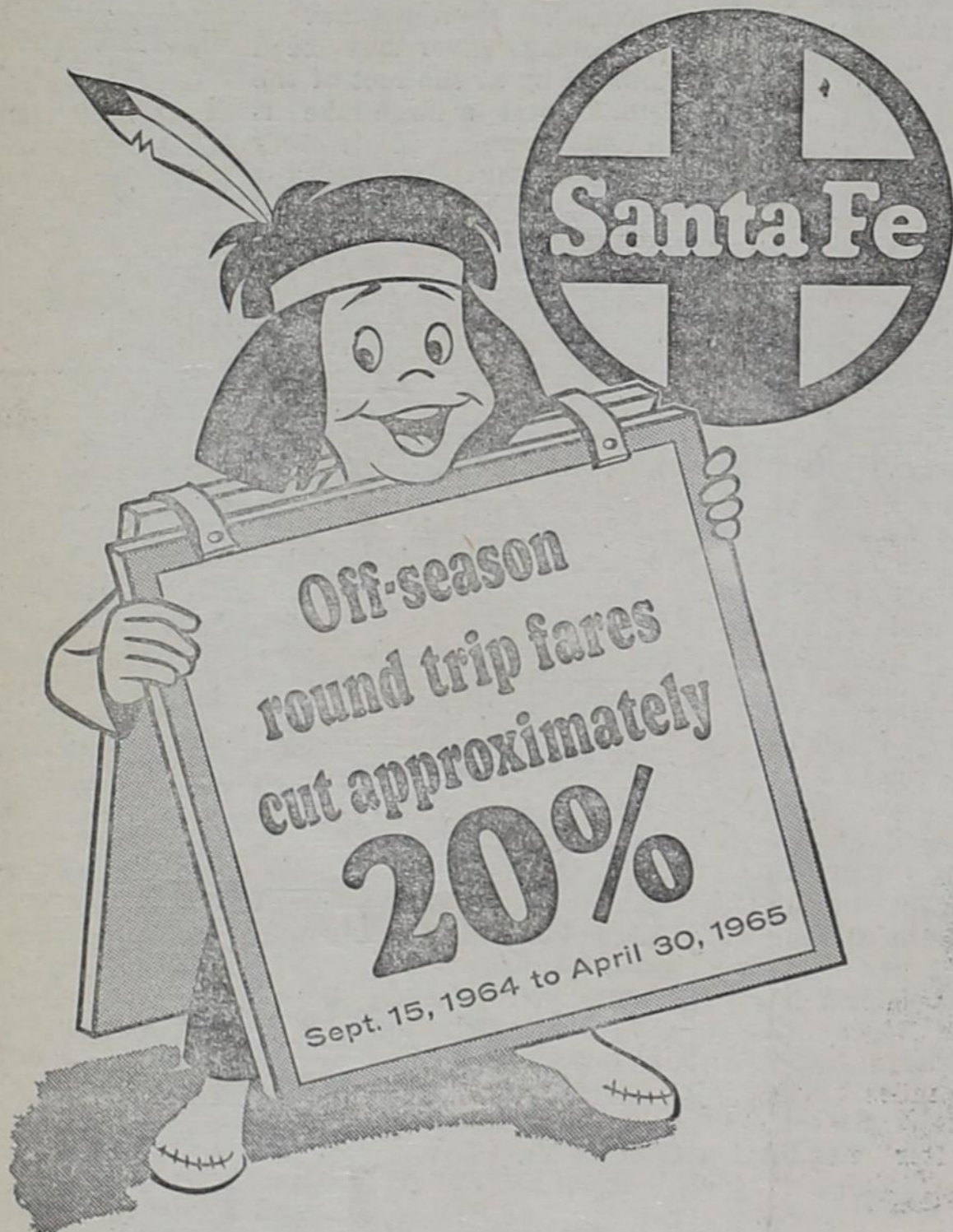

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

**ASCS COMMUNITY COMMITTEES NAMED**  
Hockley County ASCS community committeemen have been elected and the convention to select the county committee is slated Sept. 18.  
The community officials were chosen in a mail balloting.  
Delegates from each of the communities will meet at the ASCS office in Levelland at 8:30 a. m. the 18th to select the county committee.  
The committees include (first name listed is community chairman and convention delegate, second name is vice chairman and alternate delegate, third name is regular member, fourth and fifth names are first and second alternates respectively):  
Community A (Precinct 4), Kenneth Kiser, Brady Helms, Paul Tullis, Pervadus Wade, S. H. Schoenrock.  
Community B (Precinct 2), Albert Storey, Jerry Atchison, W. E. Carr Jr., Horton Garner, Billy Ray Carter.  
Community D (Precinct 1), F. J. Abney, Billy Carter, J. C. Pointer, Don Bell, Preston Reeves.  
Office Manager Jim Steward said 533 ballots were cast. He added that the exact number of eligible voters was not determined.  
Meanwhile, checking of export program cotton acreage will start probably next week Steward said. After a visual inspection, an ASCS representative and the farmer will confer to set the estimated yield which must be sold on open market. If there is no agreement, the ASC will set a figure, on which the farmer can request adjustment by presenting proof after harvest.  
Steward said there are approximately 225 county farms under the export plan, with about 250 to 300 under the domestic allotment program.  
Payments on the domestic allotment plan are being made as soon as farmers comply with adjustment of acreage, Steward added.  
The wheat program singup also is continuing. Steward said not many wheat growers have signed for the program which features a substitution provision with the feed grain program.
