Nixon Plans Speedy End To Many Crop Subsidies.

President Nixon will take a different tack to raise farm income without hurting the consumer in his second term in office.

Administration officials plan to tell American farmers the news—and not all of it good—at the annual Agricultural Outlook Conference, which will be held Feb. 20-22 in Washington.

A showplace for more than 50 years, the conference will feature speeches by Mr. Nixon's economic advisers as well as his agriculture secretary, Earl L. Butz.

The theme of the conference is "Future Structure of Agricultural Production and Marketing."

Resistance Grows

Despite a growing tide of resistance among farm-belt congressmen, Butz plans to go full-speed ahead in ending many government crop subsidies. And Butz is positive that the President's new policies will work.

Net farm income soared to a record \$18,900,000,000 in 1972, eclipsing the old mark of \$17,100,000,000 set 25 years ago. Crop prices were up, and live-stock prices set a new record.

"I fully expect that the momentum farmers gained in 1972 will carry into 1973 in such important areas as record export sales, high food productivity, and improved economic prospects," Butz said.

"American farmers are enjoying a prosperity such as they have never experienced before, producing goods for their fellow Americans and the rest of the world in the best cost-price climate for them achieved outside of such full-scale wars such as the First World War and the Second World War," said the under secretary of agriculture, J. Phil Campbell.

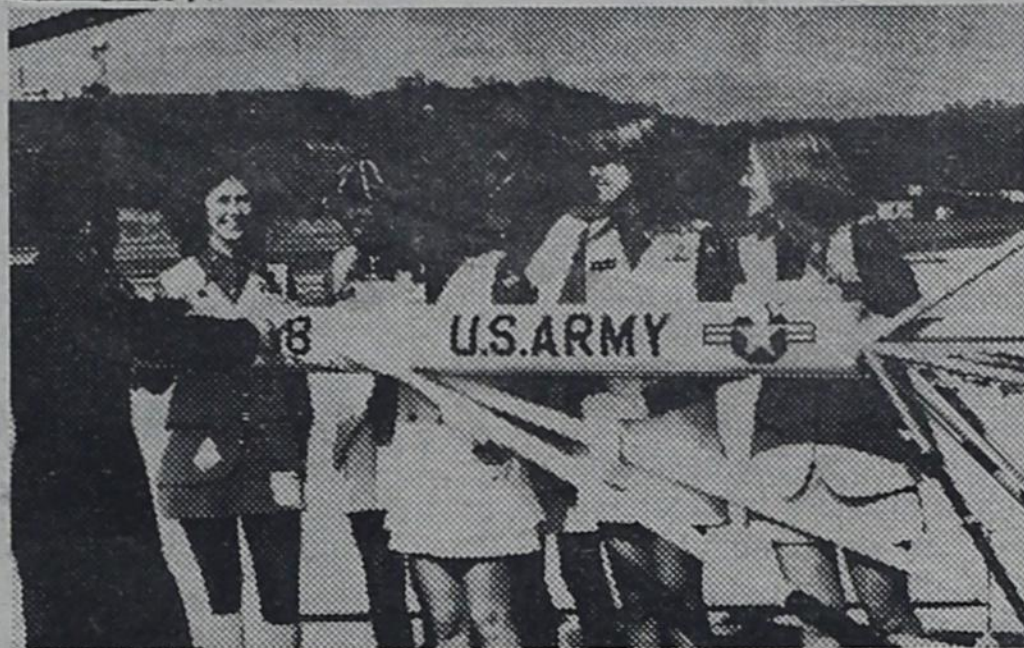
Income Low

While the picture is generally brighter, administration aides point to the fact that farmers make only about 79 percent of the income that other Americans earn.

Even though President Nixon wants this average raised, he is acutely aware that rising food prices arouse the ire of the consumer and add to inflation.

The biggest keystone to the Nixon farm policy is farm exports, currently estimated at a record \$10,000,000,000. If this momentum can be maintained, there will be little need for federal crop controls and payments, officials said.

When formal talks begin later this year with America's leading trade partners, President Nixon is expected to push for a lowering of tariff barriers for U. S. farm products.

Congress May Balk At Drastic Budget Cuts

President Nixon has made it clear that his bare-bones budget leaves little room for lawmakers in Washington to create new programs next fiscal year.

Because of drastic slashes in expenditures for education, housing, and other social welfare programs, congress is expected to go over the \$268,700,000,000 budget with a fine-tooth comb and to fight some proposed reductions.

The budget, as Mr. Nixon sees it, is \$18,900,000,000 more than this year's and contains no tax increases.

Deficit Seen

It is based on the concept of full employment. This means that the budget was made under the assumption that unemployment would be at four percent or less. Since it won't be that low, the government will lose revenue and wind up with a deficit of \$12,700,000,000 rather than a \$300,000,000 surplus if unemployment dropped to the four percent mark.

What is expected to anger for public housing and the construction of new hospitals.

"The time has come to get rid of old programs that have outlived their usefulness, or that have failed," the President said. "Whenever the return on our tax dollars is not worth the expenditure, we must either change the program or end it."

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INDEPENDENT IN ALL THINGS
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**Education's
 Value Doubted**

In recent decades, as technological progress came rapidly and the number of skilled or technological jobs steadily increased, greater and greater stress and importance has been placed on education. Countless studies have shown that the educated boy or girl earns more, on the average, than the less educated.

However, a recent \$500,000 study, financed by the Carnegie Corporation indicates that while education does play a part, and is of course desirable, it plays a far less important role in dictating one's earning ability than has been assumed.

A three-year study by a Harvard team shows that better schooling, while desirable, has much less effect on chances of economic success for poor children than has been widely believed. Better schooling, the study says, would have had "surprisingly little effect." Schooling's effect on children is estimated at about 25 per cent.

Cognitive skill, one's ability to manipulate words and numbers, reach logical conclusions, assimilate information, cannot be equalized by schools, the study says.

But neither does cognitive skill play the major role on one's earning capacity. (Schools largely codify and sometimes solidify cognitive differences children bring to school with them, the report says.)

What largely determines one's earning power, however, though education unquestionably helps, is not schooling, cognitive skill, heredity, home background, IQ or any of the other social influences so many have stressed in recent years. Such things as luck, personality, chance, the ability to psyche out the boss, or get along with the right people, chance in meeting the right people, appearance, the ability to synthesize large quantities of information, character, industry, etc., account for three-quarters of the variations in peoples' incomes.

Thus the sacred cows of more money for schools and more schooling, while desirable, are not all-important in determining incomes.



**Klein's Future-

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- There's been a flurry of recent speculation over the future of Nixon Administration Communications Director Herb Klein. It's true press secretary Ron Zeigler's work has pleased the President and Zeigler is highly regarded, a comer. It's also true Klein had decided some time ago he wouldn't remain another four years.

Klein and Zeigler have made an effective team and the first four years of their work, until Mr. Nixon was reelected, was obviously the most important period. Klein has been with Nixon since both came out of the Navy after World War II. And working for the President is not an easy job by any means, nor should it be.

Klein is highly respected by members of the press, who would deeply regret his leaving. But he could unquestionably find less demanding and more permanent work, and the strain and stress of his job has been considerable, for years.

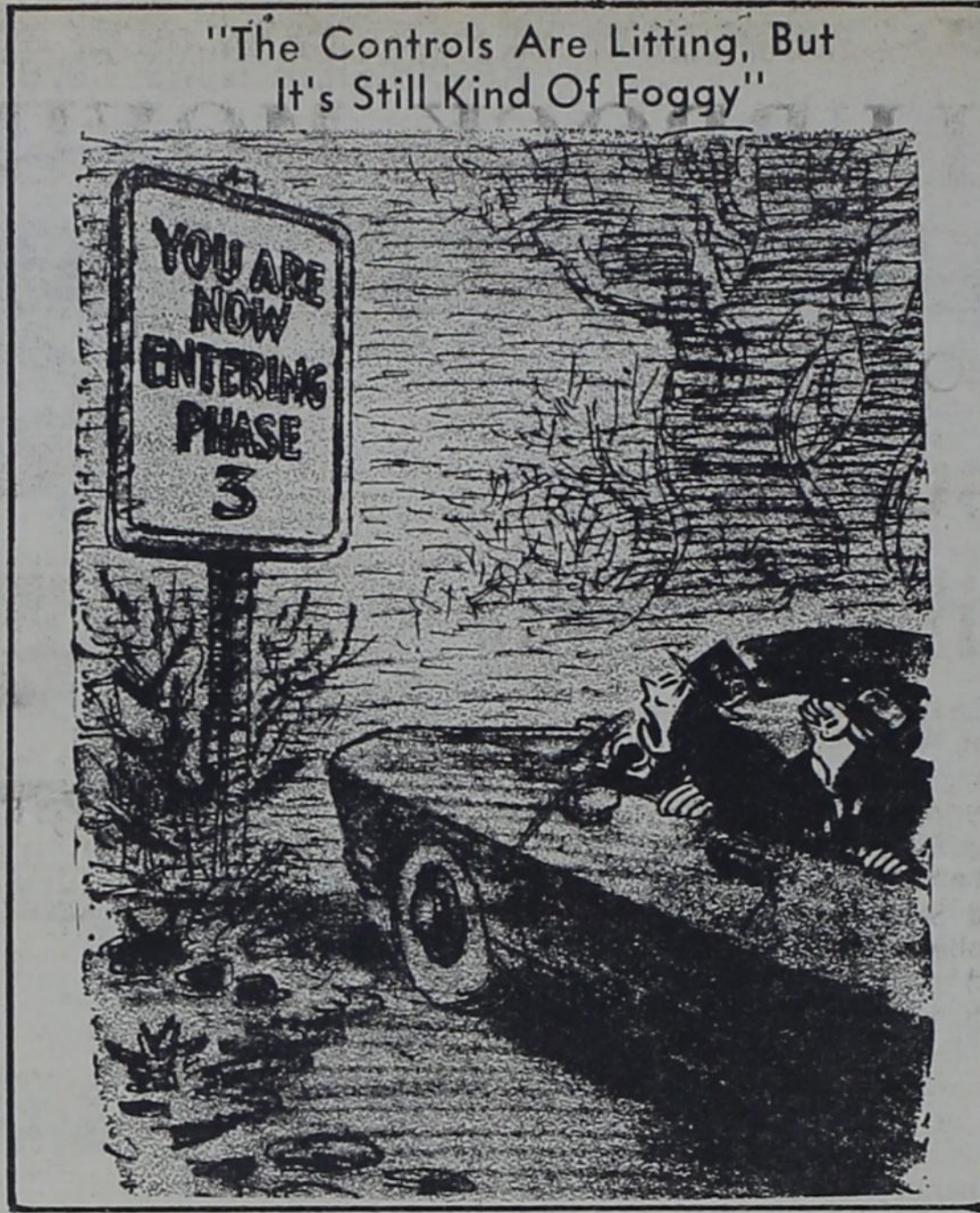
In overwhelmingly Buddhist Vietnam, one of South Vietnam President Nguyen Thieu's handicaps in the rural countryside, seldom mentioned, is that he's a Roman Catholic. Just as Methodist Chiang Kai-Shek was somewhat handicapped in China, as a convert to a

western (colonialism) religion, so too is Thieu.

In this connection, Thieu's daughter was wed in late January. Her husband was required to convert from Buddhism to her and her father's faith, so the wedding could take place, a point not missed by Buddhists, who comprise ninety per cent of the Vietnamese population.

The U.S. Air Force recently proudly announced it had selected a manufacturer (Fairchild) to build an aircraft to support front-line troops. For years the Air Force has neglected this area, often at great cost to the combat infantrymen, and there are many who feel the Army and Marines should have their own close-support aircraft, that they would do a better job, because they would have their hearts in the effort.

The Air Force's primary role is, admittedly, other than close support. To keep the Army from increasing its air role, jealously guarded, the Air Force has talked much about close support. But some wonder what will become of the much-heralded new AX aircraft. For one thing, the Air Force is almost certain to lack the funds for acquisition of any number of these planes if it wants the B-1 and other highly costly weapons now projected.

The Texas Legislature swept away some of the clouds last week and made important moves toward "government in the sunshine."

In addition to passing the revised "open meetings" law -- patterned after Florida's famous "sunshine law" --

House committees approved a new "open records" law for Texas and placed on the House calendar a "free flow of information" bill.

Changes in the Texas open meetings law will allow the public and press to be informed of all "quorum" meetings of public bodies. It was approved 132 to 13 by the House of Representatives and moved over to the Senate Jurisprudence Committee. Closed meetings will be held to a minimum under the exemptions in the new law. It was authored by Rep. Carl Parker of Port Arthur and submitted as a part of House Speaker Price Daniel Jr.'s "reform package."

A marathon five-hour hearing by the House Judiciary Committee -- chaired by Rep. DeWitt Hale -- was held on the "free flow of information" measure. This proposal is H.B. 10, sponsored by Rep. Dave Allred of Wichita Falls.

It grants a "news source" confidential privilege, and allows Texas journalists to get more information about governmental, law enforcement and other matters important to the public.

House Judiciary Committee approved the bill 16 to 4 and sent it to the House floor for debate this week.

H.B. 6, the "open records" measure, will allow the public and press access to most all records of government, city, county and state, that are not closed by state statute. A few other restrictions were placed on the bill -- sponsored by Rep. Lane Denton of Waco.

All of these "government in the sunshine" measures follow the pattern of new House rules which open committee meetings, and follow the trend toward "openness."

PEOPLE'S WATCHDOG PROPOSED -- AGAIN--Legislators from Houston and Fort Worth have introduced legislation proposing to create the office of "Ombudsman" in the State Government in Texas.

The idea has been put before the legislature in previous sessions only to receive a cold shoulder. The Ombudsman would be an independent and

politically neutral office with the sole duty of investigating and recommending action on citizen complaints about state government administration, under the proposed legislation.

The two sponsors, Reps. Hawkins Menefee of Houston and Dvid Finney of Fort Worth said the Ombudsman would be able to protect individual citizens by giving them recourse for their grievances against unfair or abusive administrative practices.

The Ombudsman, however, would have only the power to criticize and publicize, but not reverse, undesirable administrative actions.

MICKEY MOUSE DISCRIMINATION?--Houston Rep. R. C. (Nick) Nichols has introduced legislation which he says will eliminate the "Mickey Mouse" discriminatory practices of some insurance companies when it comes to selling automobile and fire insurance.

One bill would prohibit any fire or automobile insurance company from cancelling, refusing to issue, or refusing to renew a policy because of the age, sex, race or place of residence of the person applying for insurance.

Rep. Nichols says "older people are the victims of automatic discrimination when buying auto insurance, even though they may have good individual driving records."

Another Nichols' bill would require that the only kind of life insurance policies which can be sold in Texas would be level term policies which are guaranteed renewable to age 80 -- without evidence of insurability.

"The typical cash-value life insurance policy is one of the most prevalent and least understood consumer frauds in existence," says Nichols. "The simple fact is, at the death of the insured the beneficiary automatically loses the cash value of the policy."

PRAY QUIETLY PLEASE--Sen. Walter Mengden, Republican state senator from Houston, has dropped a bill in the legislative hopper to allow local school boards to establish periods of silent prayer or meditation at the beginning of each school day.

The U.S. Supreme Court says a school district cannot dictate to a class of students the wording of a daily prayer. Mengden says his bill would "get around that ruling through this bill which authorizes private prayer, not as a religious service or exercise, but an opportunity for silent prayer or meditation on either the anticipated activities of the day or -- by those so dis-

Abortions

In spite of statements from some churchmen that they were shocked or horrified by the recent Supreme Court decision on abortions, most people who follow public events closely were not surprised by the high court's decision.

The court didn't require anyone to have an abortion; what it did was prevent churchmen and legislators influenced by them from denying abortions in the early months in various states. In other words, it gave the right to decide this personal question to mothers and their doctors, not churchmen writing rules based on religious theories and faith.

posed -- on a religious theme. **DWI IS A NO-NO, OR ELSE**--Baytown Rep. Joe Allen has introduced legislation to require a mandatory minimum 30-day suspension of operator's license upon first conviction for driving while intoxicated, and a mandatory one-year sentence on second conviction.

Rep. Allen says Department of Public Safety officials tell him "almost a third of all fatal rural accidents were the direct result of drunk drivers. State-wide figures are almost as high."

"Over 700 people were killed on the highways of Texas by drunk drivers in 1971. Consider that nearly 200,000 accidents that same year were caused by drinking and driving and that the rates go up every year, and you get a good idea of the size of the problem," says Allen.

Allen says he has DPS support for his bill, partly because "juries hesitate to suspend a driver's license for a whole year. Consequently, our officers make the arrests, but can't get the driver off the road for any significant length of time."

LAND REPORT RELEASED--Rapid growth over the last decade has contributed to a rising public concern for proper land resources management and for regulation of development of the state's unincorporated areas -- those areas outside the reach of effective municipal jurisdiction.

In most areas of the state, such development is not subject to any governmental health, safety or planning standards, the Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations says in a new report, "Land Use Standards in Unincorporated Areas: Proposed State Legislation for Local Governments."

The Commission notes that despite pleas from many municipal and county officials and organizations of local government, there has been no general legislation adopted to expand county and municipal authority over development beyond the city limits.

In this respect, Texas compares unfavorably with other states, the report stated. County-wide zoning, or its equivalent, is authorized in 40 states and various forms of subdivision are exercised by counties in 37 other states.

The Commission recommends legislation to (1) enable cities and towns to extend development standards applied inside incorporated areas to their extraterritorial jurisdiction, including authority to extend health and safety ordinances governing construction, alteration, or remodeling of structures to the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction; (2) give counties authority to establish development standards in unincorporated areas; (3) encourage "sensible, stable land use practices in unincorporated areas by extending to county government the same general zoning power and related authorizations long exercised by Texas cities."
