Mrs. Alton Richards Passes Away

Mrs. Alton Richards, of Rule, passed away Sunday at the home of her parents in Olton.

Mrs. Richards, perhaps, is not known to the folks of the Ropes community, but her husband was at one time associated with his twin brother, Afton Richards of Jayton, in the publication of the Plainsman. And, the writer was not personally acquainted with her, but for thirty or more years we have known Alton, and in this time of great tragedy and deep sorrow we wish to extend him our sympathy.

That we can pause to mingle our tears with the tears of our friends in time of sorrow is the surest sign that the spirit of Christ yet mingles with men.

Words of sympathy are just a little inadequate when one stands beside an open grave and sees the mortal remains of a loved one lowered into the bosom of mother earth. Temperature Plunges To New Record Low

The low 56 degrees Wednesday morning set an all-time record in this section—that is, since records of the weather have been kept. In the low sixties is not unusual but in the fifties—it just hasn't happened before.

This week has been marked by light showers all over the territory. Wednesday, August 16, started things to rolling by giving us a shower which knocked the temperature down to a cool 87. On Thursday, August 17, the day was clear with the tempera-

ture jumping to a hot 91, while Friday, August 18, dawned with the sky dotted with clouds and the temperature again reached 91. At sunset there were heavy clouds in the northwest and the electrical display was plainy visible. The temperature climbed to 94.

During the night Friday rain showers moved over Ropes and light showers fell in the territory, while Saturday, August 19, broke with a complete overcast. Between two and three o'clock a driving rain which dropped al-

most a half inch of moisture, struck Ropes lasted about fifteen minutes.

According to reports this cloud brought showers to most of the territory west of Ropes, but little rain fell. The temperature climbed to 87, but Sunday morning before dawn we were pulling out blankets to keep warm, with the temperature in the low 60's.

Sunday, August 20, was another cloudy day and high temperature was officially 87.

Monday, August 21, was marked by clouds floating

across the sky, and the temperature again jumped into the high 80's.

Tuesday, August 22, continued the pattern, with a stiff wind blowing from the northeast. At times during the morning the sun broke through the clouds and at times there were sprinkles of rain. In the afternoon clouds lay on the horizon to the south and west.

It is thought that the wind Tuesday morning was the first norther of the season, and if that is so we should have killing frost in 90 days.

School will begin at Ropes Schools on August 28. Buses will run on their regular schedule and lunch will be served in the cafeteria.

The General Assembly for the Elementary School will be at 9:00 a.m., and for Junior High and High School at 10:00 a.m.

High School Juniors and Seniors will enroll Thursday, August 24 at 2:00 p.m., Freshmen and Sophomores at 2:00 p.m. on Friday, August 25.

One new bus has been purchased for the coming year and a new concession stand has been built. The buildings and grounds have been put in readiness, according to Mr. Fuller.

are left out of Fire Prevention Week will be celebrated throughout the nation on October 8 through the 14th. Fires caused 11,350 deaths last year. For the fourth year in a row, property losses have exceeded one million dollars.

The mourning dove season opens in this part of Texas on September 1 and continues through October 30. The daily bag limit is 15 and possession limit not to exceed 30. White winged doves, the daily limit is 10 and possession limit ten. Shotguns must be plugged to three-shell capacity, and may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles is prohibited. The shooting hours are from 12 noon to sunset.

Texas is furnishing game to other states. Nebraska will receive 100 Rio Grande turkeys trapped on the King Ranch, the state of Georgia will receive 100 deer also taken from the King Ranch.

Hunting licenses this year will cost \$3.15 and fishing licenses \$2.15. A non-resident hunting license costs \$25.00. Hunting licenses are not required of anyone under 17

and over 65 years of age outside the county of their residence. A license is required of and anyone, regardless of age, to hunt deer or turkey.

Game wardens in the future will be known as "conservation officers". There are more than two hundred of these officers in Texas.

Attorney General Will Wilson says rigged bidding has probably added \$400 to \$500 to the cost of nearly every school bus bought in Texas over the past six years. His comment followed his filing of anti-trust suits against 16 Texas firms and individuals accused of rigging bids in the sale of 5,100 school buses costing \$23 million.

CRAZY SITUATION

Either intentionally or unintentionally Congress is setting the stage for socialization of American railroads. It is doing this by failure to repeal or correct outdated laws of its own making. When the rails face bankruptcy, the friends of socialization will start their drive for government ownership of our transportation system.

Congressional inquiries for years have gone through the face of "studying" the railroad problems, which Congress largely created. Then nothing of real importance is done to correct injustices.

At the present time an inquiry launched by President Eisenhower started before he went out of office is to bring in recommendations by the first of the year. But if Congress follows its usual procedure of playing politics with the rails, it will do nothing. That is the pattern, instead of granting the railroads relief so they can solve their own problems.

Forces in and out of Congress that have been promoting a socialized electric power industry will use a railroad crisis to start their drive for government ownership of the rails.

Russia's railroads and power plants are socialized and Khrushchev says our grandchildren will live under socialism. Our lawmakers seem to be giving him grounds for that statement as they undermine our capitalistic system with socialistics projects of one kind or another.

What confidence will the rest of the so-called free world have in us as it sees our own lawmakers failing to support free enterprise, capitalist system. Russia backs communism in no uncertain terms while we sell our private property short right here at home. It's a crazy picture any way you look at it. We don't deserve the blessings we have when we fail to appreciate their source — individual liberty and opportunity free from socialistic restraints.

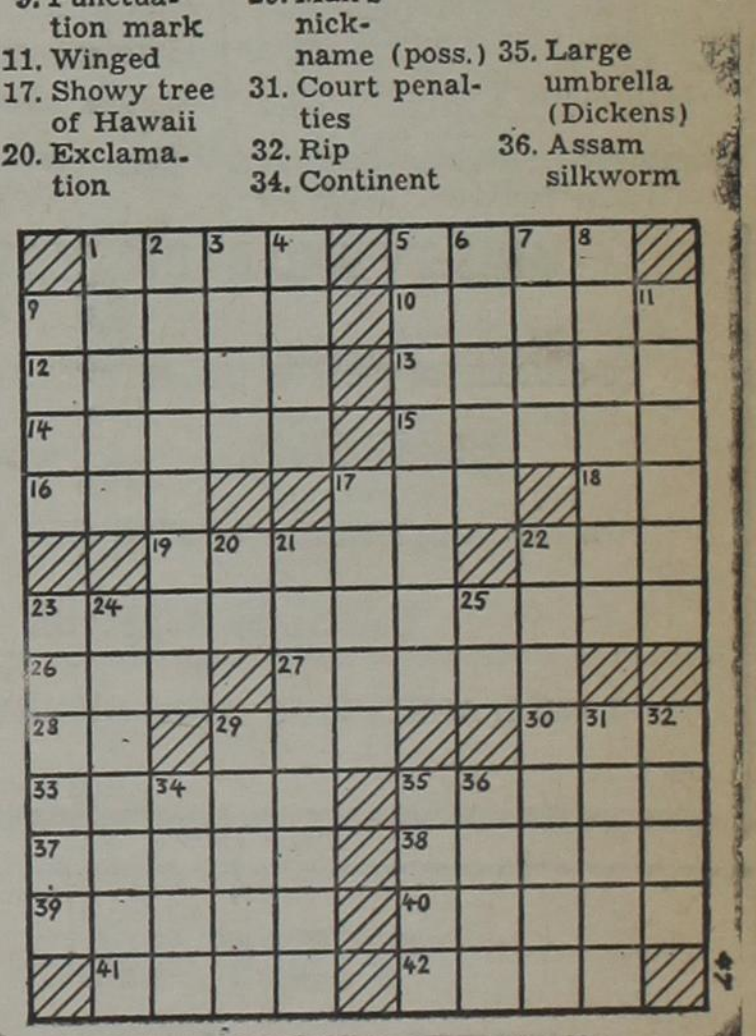

SPICED WATERMELON RIND

3 pounds white portion of watermelon, cubed
5 cups sugar
2 cups cider vinegar
1 cup water
1 tablespoon whole cloves
1 tablespoon whole allspice
1 tablespoon stick cinnamon pieces
1 lemon, sliced

Let the watermelon cubes stand overnight in enough salted water to cover. Drain. Cover with fresh cold water. Bring to a boil. Cook over low heat until tender. Drain. Combine sugar, vinegar and water. Tie spices and lemon slices in cheesecloth bag. Add to sugar mixture. Bring to a boil, stirring. Boil for 5 minutes. Add watermelon. Simmer until cubes are transparent, about 15 minutes. Remove spice bag. Pack in hot sterilized jars. Yield: 3 pints spiced rind.
