Let's Back - -

A Sewer System For Ropesville

Soren Kierkegaard wrote these words in his Journal, "He who is unwilling to undertake any enterprise might, nevertheless, if he had an open eye, lead a life rich in enjoyment, merely by paying attention to others..."

The point that Kierkegaard (Danish theologian of the 1800's) is making has to do with men and their approach to life. Many of us approach life with ourselves as the center. Always we ask, "Well, what is in it for me?" Me! Me! Me! We cry, until we surely must die. We cannot live and exist with ourselves at the center and core of the world. This is also the proclamation of the Christian faith. We cannot find out what life is all about if we try to make life bow to our needs and whims. As Jesus said:

Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit.

(John 12:24)

But many shy away from becoming Christians in a real sense because of this very teaching. They think they cannot dare to die to themselves but always try to keep up a good reserve just in case this Christian thing does not work. And so life always escapes uncomprehended.

The Christian Faith is only apprehended when one comes to know through faith that Christ has died for him and thus he can dare to die for others.

It works in this way. Suppose that some one of your acquaintances begins to gossip about you, to cut you down before the community. Now this is a dreadful strain upon you as a person and if your enemy is adroit at his task, you may come to be the village scandal. There are two choices before you: (1) you may go about to the residents of the community trying to justify yourself against each new bit of gossip from your adversary. This won't work because anyone who is out to get you will always be one jump ahead of you and they will find out your weaknesses which are true and therefore out of the bounds of your self-justification.

(2) You may ignore any attempt at self-justification and simply try to live the life which Christ has commanded. And one way you may do this is to pay attention to others IN THEIR NEEDS. So long as you have only yourself in view, your world is as small and narrow as your self. When you begin to widen your view by paying attention to other selves, then your own self is enriched and the one who is gossiping about you cannot steal those riches.

A self is enriched when it pays attention to others. A self is destroyed piece by piece when it turns inward and makes its own self the center of its thinking and doing.

Margie Cake
Bring to boil in sauce pan:
1 stick butter
1-2 cup Crisco
1-4 cup cocoa
1 cup water
In mixing bowl blend:
2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
1-2 teaspoon salt
Third mixture:
1-2 cup buttermilk
1-2 teaspoon soda
2 eggs
Beat mixtures together.
Grease and flour cake pans.
Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes.

ICING
Bring to boil in saucepan:
1-2 cup butter or 1 stick cico
1-4 cup cocoa
6 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
Add one box sifted powdered sugar. Beat until spreading consistency desired to frost cake.

WMU MET MONDAY

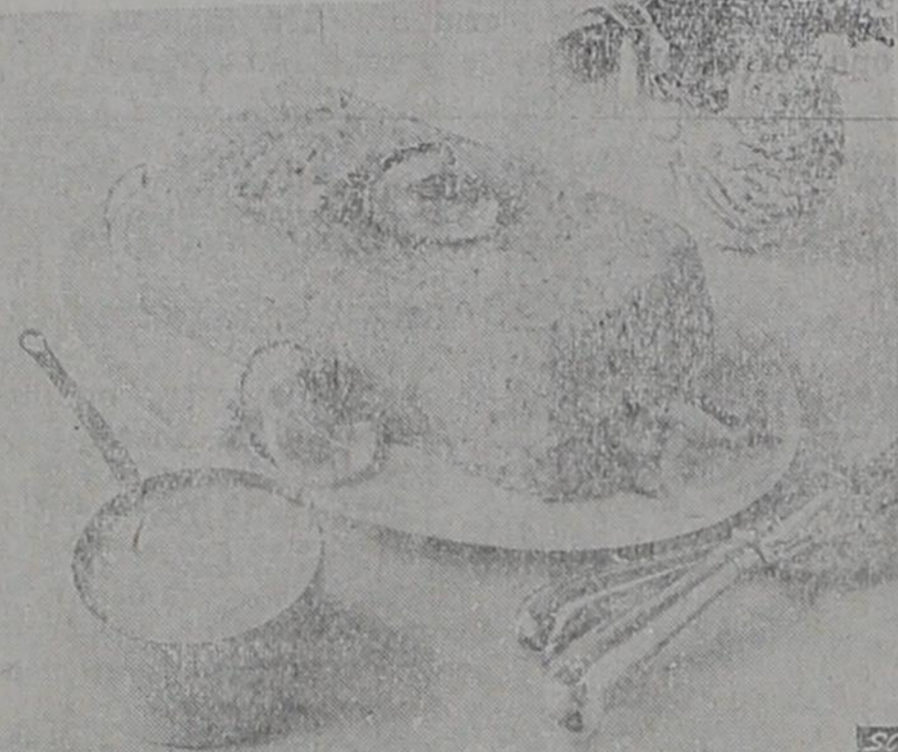

Filling Fare From The Sea



Salmon Loaf Supreme makes a delicious virtue out of a necessity, or a preference, for meatless meals. The recipe, as developed by the Borden Kitchen, links pungent good taste with high protein. It's an ever-ready meal since most of the ingredients—canned salmon, nonfat dry milk and dehydrated minced onions—are pantry-shelf favorites.

Salmon Loaf Supreme (Makes 5 to 6 servings)

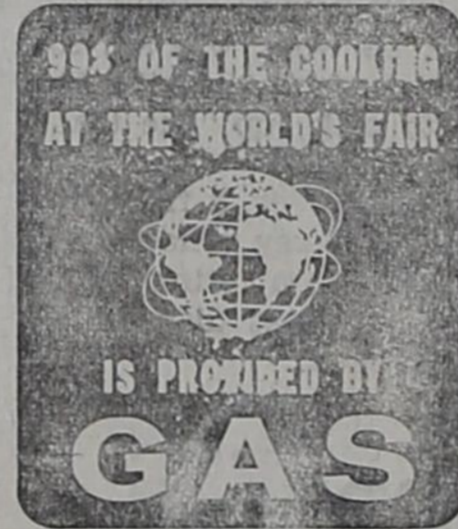
- 1 (1 pound) can salmon, well drained
- 1-1/2 cups liquefied Starlac nonfat dry milk
- 1/4 cup green pepper, finely chopped
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1-1/2 cups fine dry bread crumbs
- 1 teaspoon dehydrated minced onion
- 1/4 cup butter or Danish Margarine, melted

Carefully remove bone and skin from salmon. In a mixing bowl combine salmon, nonfat milk, green pepper, eggs, bread crumbs, onion and melted butter. Mix well. Lightly pack into well-buttered 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pan. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven about 50 minutes. Remove from oven; let stand on wire rack for 10 minutes to set. With a spatula or knife loosen loaf from sides of pan. Turn onto a platter. Top with Gruyere Cheese Sauce.

Gruyere Cheese Sauce (Makes 1 cup)

- 1 tablespoon butter or Danish Margarine
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1-1/2 cups liquefied Starlac nonfat dry milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 Dash white pepper
- 6 (1-oz.) packages Gruyere cheese, cut into small pieces

In a small saucepan melt butter over low heat. Blend in flour. Remove from heat. Gradually add nonfat milk. Cook over low heat; stir constantly until smooth. Mix in salt, pepper and cheese. Cook 20-25 minutes longer; stir occasionally.

Lasagna Perks Up Appetites



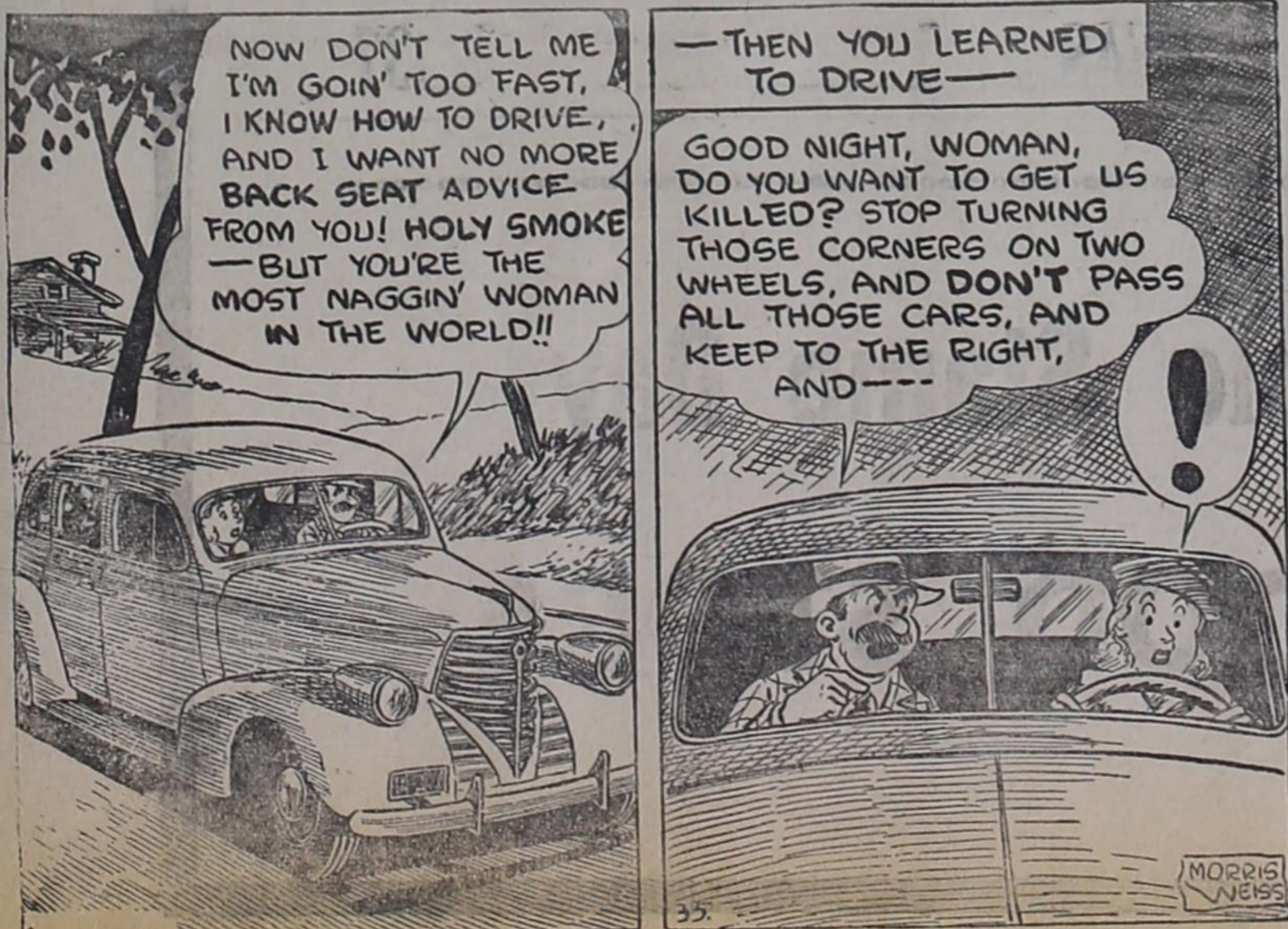

The Borden Kitchen selected a trio of cheeses—fresh, subtly-flavored cottage cheese, very sharp cheese slices and grated Parmesan and Romano—to create this lasagna's high-spirited distinction.

Tuna Lasagna (Makes 6 servings)

| 1 (1-lb.) container Borden's large or small curd creamed cottage cheese | 2 (7-oz.) cans solid pack tuna fish, drained and coarsely flaked |
| 1 egg | 1/2 cup grated Parmesan and Romano cheese |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | 1 (8-slice 6-oz.) package Vera-Sharp pasteurized-process American cheese |

| 1 teaspoon dehydrated imported oregano | |

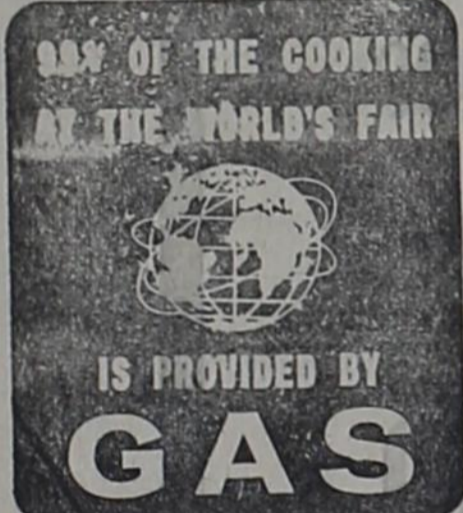
Cook lasagna noodles according to package directions. Drain. Cool slightly. In a medium-size mixing bowl, combine cottage cheese, egg, salt, pepper and 1/2 teaspoon oregano; blend well. Spoon about 1/3 cup of marinara sauce over bottom of a buttered 12 x 7-1/2 x 2-inch baking dish. Place 3 cooked lasagna noodles lengthwise over sauce. Evenly spread cottage cheese mixture over noodles. Cover cheese with tuna fish. Reserve 2 tablespoons of grated Parmesan and Romano cheese. Sprinkle the rest over fish. Spoon about 2/3 cup marinara sauce over cheese. Place remaining lasagna noodles over filling. Pour remaining sauce over top. Sprinkle with reserved 2 tablespoons grated cheese and 1/2 teaspoon oregano. Arrange two rows of cheese slices over all. Cover tightly with aluminum foil. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven 20 minutes; remove foil. Uncover and bake 10 minutes, or until sauce is bubbly and cheese is partly melted.
