land over the county, as a whole, has been assessed a valuation of approximately \$80 an acre, making a tax rate of \$8 per acre.

Under the new set-up, which was forced by the oil companies for equalization of values, land will be valued as high as \$200 an acre, plus improvement. The tax to be paid is arrived at we understand, by assessing ten percent of the value.

> Weather advisories on television had been telling us that only three counties were affected: Hale, Lubbock and Floyd, and that no storms were to be expected in Hockley. However, a short time afterward the radio blared a warning:

"Hail as large as tennis balls is falling in Lubbock, accompanied by high winds. All points south of Lubbock be prepared to take cover.

This was about 6:30. A few minutes later a sheriff's car from Levelland said over the shortwave, "A tornado is headed toward Ropes-be prepared to take cover."

A heavy bank of sand obscured the cloud. A second warning came in over the Ropes shortwave radio station, "Ropes take cover, a tornado is moving toward you from the northwest."

Two sirens were turned on —the fire siren and the civil defense siren on Jack Ogle's car. In a matter of minutes Ropes became as a ghost town-stores closed and people went home and the majority to storm cellars.

The storm cellar back of the Plainsman office had thirty-two people in it. Seven of these came off the highway. A lawyer and wife from Odessa stopped in and he said:

"I'm supposed to catch a train in Lubbock at 7:00 o'clock for Fort Worth, but a man would be a fool to drive into that. I believe that is the worst cloud ever saw."

As the cloud came in, a 1960 session August 31st. pall of blackness covered the town. The street lights came on. Then the sand cleared and the cloud was plainly visible—it was backed by a pea green background, while the advance guard of clouds whirled and turned in the air. Seemingingly, it was going to pass over the heart of Ropes, but it varied and Jack Ogle

That the Ropes communsaying—the tornado did not drop, neither was their hail in sufficient quantities to do much damage to the newly planted crops.

Bill Foster, four miles west of Ropes at the Foster General Store, said there was a whipping wind in that vicinity that must have reached, at times, hurricane force. But no property damage was reported.
