DOZEN NATIONS

HIT WHEAT DEAL
Washington (UPI) -- The proposed sale of \$250 million worth of American surplus wheat to the Soviet Union is drawing fire from an unexpected quarter -- the United States' maritime allies.

A dozen leading maritime nations are expected to protest jointly against President Kennedy's insistence that U. S. vessels get preference in transporting the wheat to Russian ports.

Some of the nations, led by Norway, already have protested individually to the State Department. They argue that the America-first policy is a breach of customary practice in a purely commercial deal.

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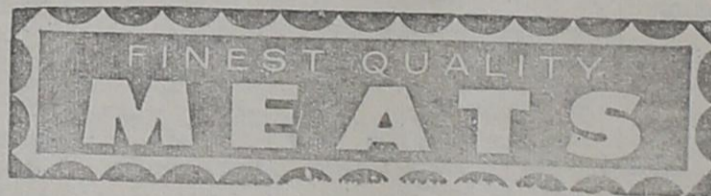
