It has been a long time since we had anything to say, that we've almost forgotten how to talk.

Keeping quiet usually keeps one from being noticed, and the less we're noticed the better we feel.

We've just been thinking that, come election time, there are going to be so many Republican votes cast in Texas that the Democratic Donkey will tuck his tail and hunt a greener pasture.

BIRD SEEKS ELECTION AS COUNTY CLERK

CHARLES W. (Charley) Bird, 30, a Levelland gasoline plant employee of Pan American, has authorized us to place his formal announcement of his candidacy for county clerk subject to the November general election.

Bird is the last of five candidates to announce for the post. He has assured placement of his name on the ballot by presenting a petition to County Judge Louis Owens prior to the deadline this past Monday.

Bird is a former assistant manager of Piggly Wiggly in Levelland and a former manager of Bob's Super Market, a post he held before the sale of the store to J. B. Haskins.

A NATIVE of Goldthwaite, Bird lived 12 years there before moving to Snyder, where he finished high school in 1948. He was a member of the Snyder football team.

Jimmy Bearden, County Health Officer of Levelland, was in Ropes Saturday and told the Plainsman that the lakes and towns in the county were to be sprayed for the killing of mosquitoes. It is noted that in the area of the South Plains several cases of sleeping sickness has appeared and it is stated it is carried by a certain breed of mosquitoes.

When this became evident and was reported to Civil Defense, they immediately set aside \$5400 to be used in the killing of the lethal pests.

Mr. Bearden stated that the lake areas would be sprayed by airplane, while the towns would be sprayed with a fogging machine pulled by a county pickup.

"You can tell the people of your community," said Mr. Bearden, "that they need not worry about the dust being used, as it is the same dust used by Lubbock and other cities in the area."

He stated that two kinds of poison will be used—one kind where there are grain and cotton crops, and another kind where there are no crops.

Lakes within a mile and a half of Anton, Sundown, Whitharral, Smyer, Levelland, and Ropesville will be sprayed. The amount of money available will not permit the spraying of lakes a greater distance from the towns, and that way more than 70 per cent of the county will be covered, Mr. Bearden pointed out.

He also stated that the flight range of the disease-carrying insects is about a mile and a half.

First Loads Grain Marketed

The first loads of grain were marketed in Ropes on Wednesday of this week, with both the Goodpasture Elevator and the Ropes Grain Corp. receiving loads. The load brought to the

Goodpasture Elevator was brought in by M. P. Parrish, of near Meadow. He had 17,160 pounds which brought him \$342.00.

The load brought to the Ropes Grain Corp. was

raised by H. D. Blake, who farms between Ropes and Meadow. The regular market price was paid, plus a bonus.

Last year the first load was marketed on August 8.

It Could Be a Bumper Crop

Charles Shannon, manager of the Ropes Grain Corp., told the Plainsman Wednesday, "If it rains, we will have a bumper crop."

"We now have a better early feed crop than last

year," pointed out Charles.

"The late feed depends on the weather—we need rain now. The dry land grain is better than it was last year. I looked at a dry land crop Tuesday morning that I be-

lieve will have 3,000 pounds to the acre."

It is apparent, unless some unforeseen catastrophe occurs, that we are in for one of the largest crops that has ever been produced

in the Ropes territory—that goes for both grain and cotton.

Up to the past few weeks this has been more than a reasonable year—now, with irrigation wells running, the

cotton crops on the irrigated land promise to be above average, and the dry land, if we get rain within a short time, will pass last year's figures.

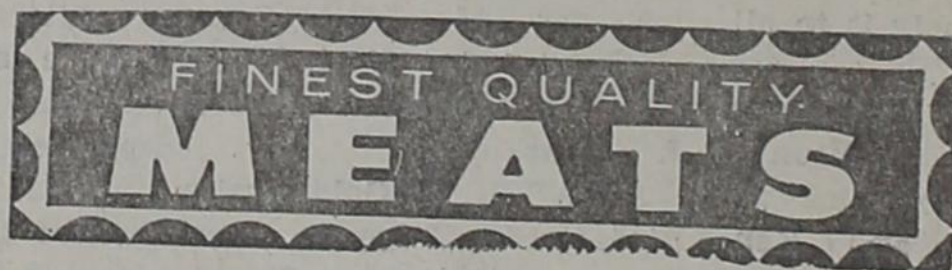

Sen. Preston Smith To Be Delegate

Sen. Preston Smith, who represents this county and 10 others in West Texas, has been appointed a dele-

gate from Texas to the national Legislative Conference to be held in Chicago Aug. 31 through Sept. 2.

Sen. Smith was appointed to the post by Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey.

The National Conference is sponsored by the Council of State Governments.

Sen. Smith, appointed to serve on the Texas Legislative Council last year, is the first West Texas senator to hold such a position.

The Legislative Council functions as one of the state's most important group serving as a fact-finding body to investigate departments, agencies and officers of state government as the occasions demand. The Council makes studies and gathers information for use in organizing bills for presentation to the Legislature, and makes recommendations and frames drafts of legislation as it seems proper.

Sen. Smith is one of five senators and 10 representatives who, with the speaker

of the House and Senate President, make up membership of the Legislative Council.

TEXAS DEPT. OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Highway Patrol investigated 6 rural traffic accidents in Hockley County during the month of July, according to Sergeant E. L. Stroud, Patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks have accounted for none killed, 5 injured, and a property damage of \$3,095.00.

This brings the total for the year in this county to 1 person killed, 22 injured, and a property damage of \$21,871.00.

Prior to the first of this month there had been a to-

tal of 929 fatal accidents in Texas. These tragedies resulted in 1,134 persons losing their lives.

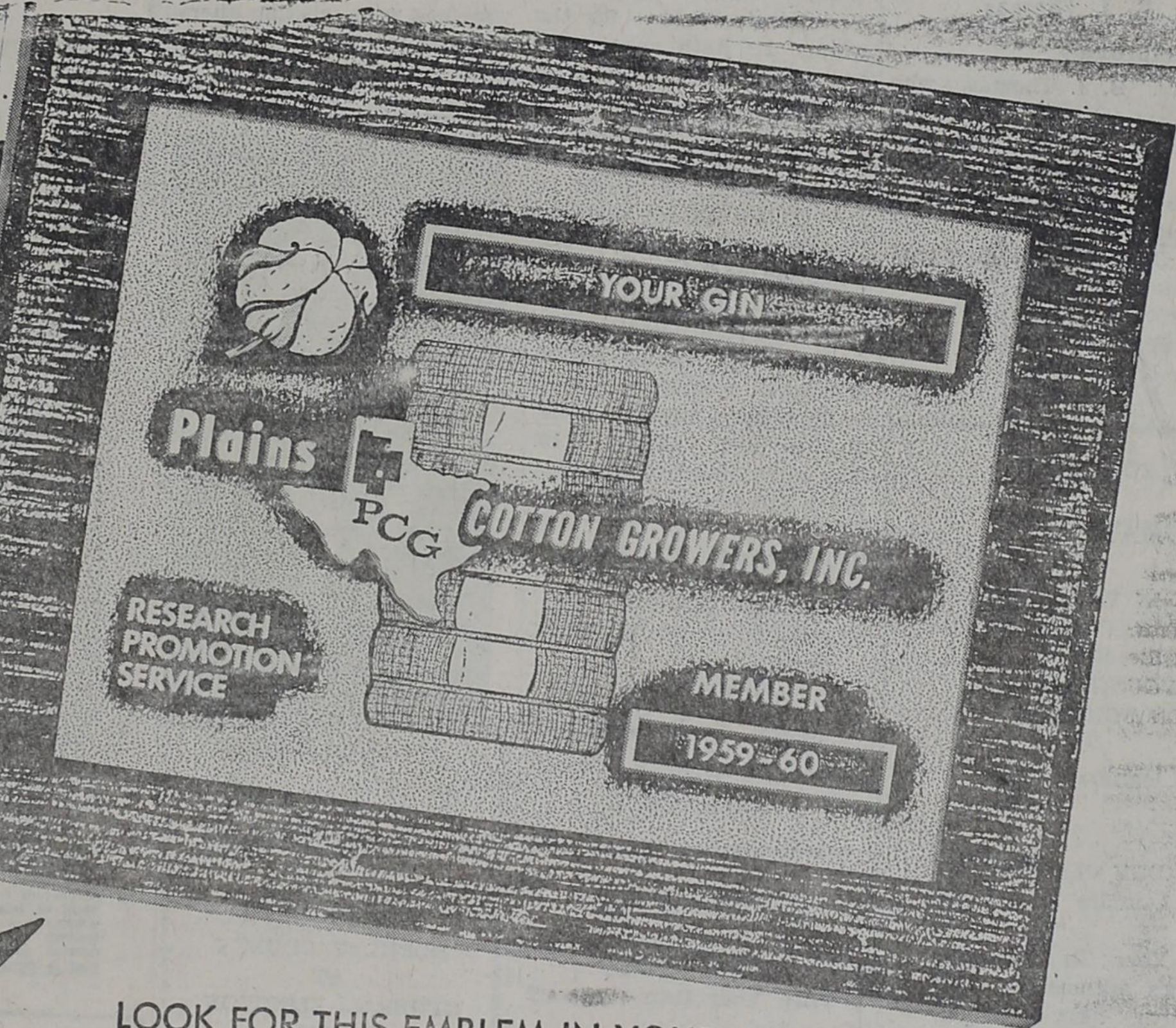

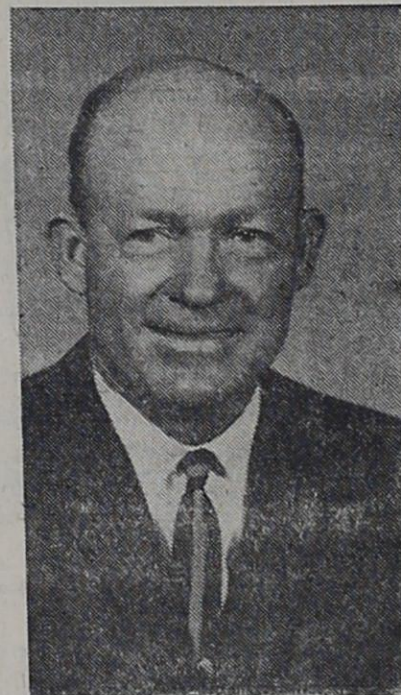

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballots; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest all contracts for a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of interest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any regulatory agency, acting under the provisions of this Section, cancel or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature; then such applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and granted a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

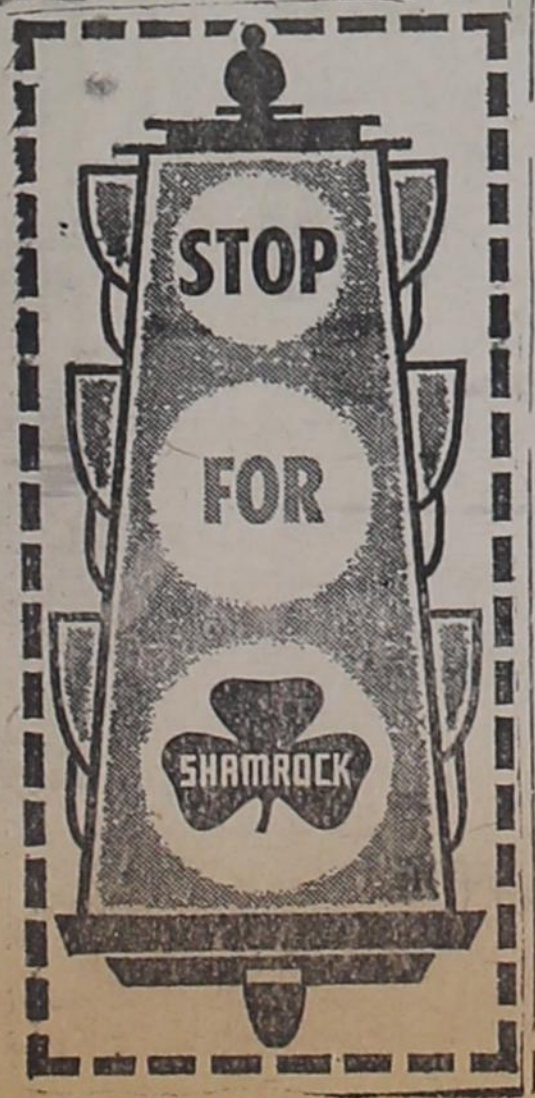

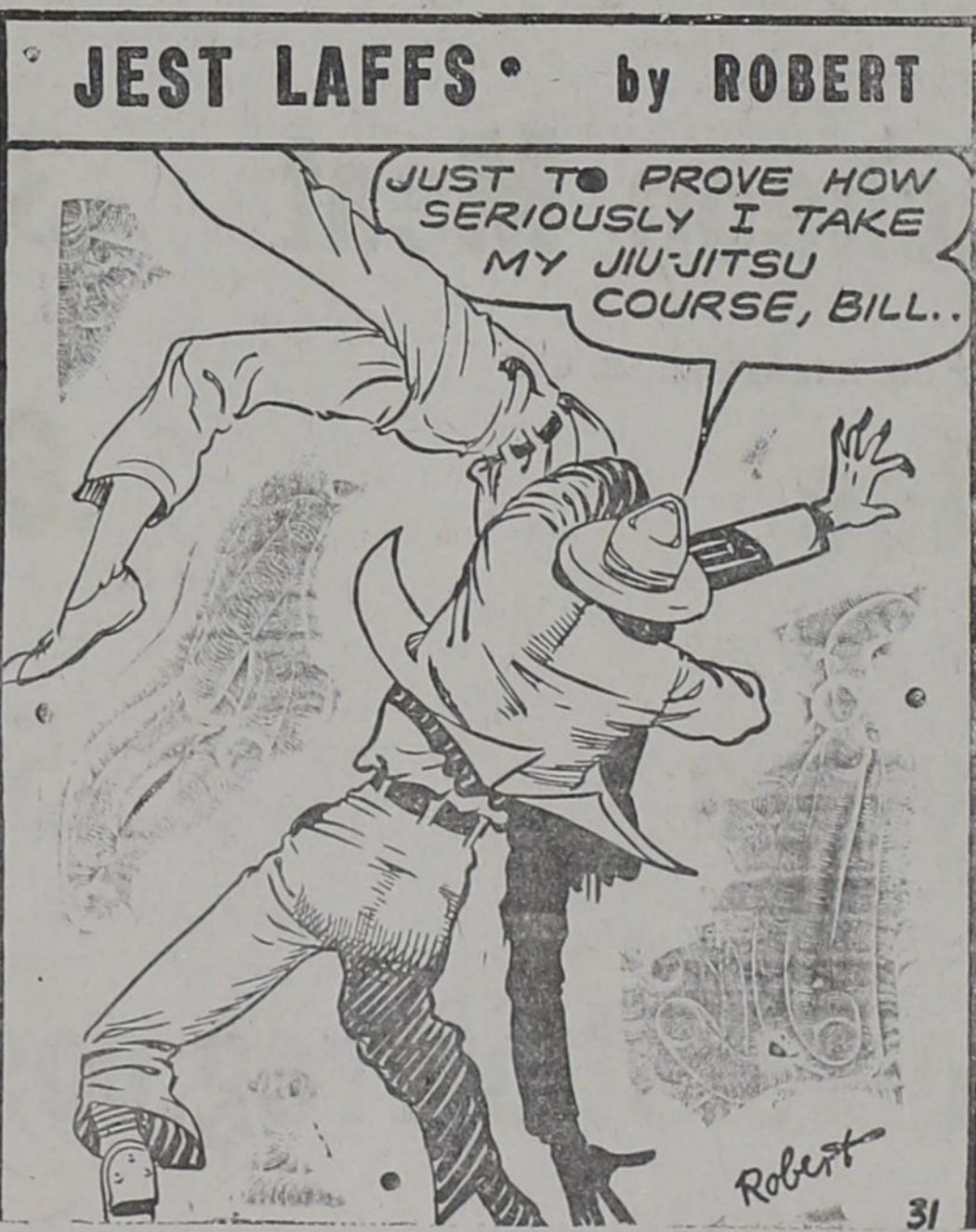
